#### Food bank to assist with applications

The High Plains Food Bank will be offering application assistance next Wednesday, August 14, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Clarendon Housing Authority office at 103 E. Fourth Street.

Assistance in making applications will be given to those interested in applying for Food Stamps, TANF, CHIP/Children's Medicaid, Adult Medicaid & Women's Health Care, or Long Term Care.

Interested persons should bring a copy of the following information: Social security cards, ID and or birth certificates for everyone in household; Proof of all income: Social Security, Last (4) Stubs, ect.; Receipt for rent or lease agreement or mortgage payment; Most recent telephone, electricity, gas, water, insurance premium, medical bills, and prescriptions; Proof of resources, such as checking or savings account statement or passbook, life insurance policies, tax statements for real estate; and Immunization Records (TANF and Children's Medicaid only).

Residents have said they have received phone calls or Facebook messages claiming to raise money for local fire departments, but the fundraisers are phony. Blackburn says if people want to support their local fire department, they should give money directly to that organization.

# Couple faces charges of child neglect

A Clarendon couple is facing felony charges after their child was found playing in the street about a block from their home.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn said the child, appearing to be two-years old, was spotted playing at Third and Goodnight before 11 a.m. the morning of July 27. A deputy attempted to locate the child's parents and found a second pre-school aged child inside a locked vehicle.

The parents were found asleep inside a house in the 200 block of S. Carhart Street, and an infant was in the house.

Brandon David Goodwin III, age 24, and Anna Christine Johnson, age 19, were arrested July 31 and charged with two counts each of Abandon Endanger Criminal Child Neglect, which is a state jail felony. Bond was set at \$20,000 for each charge, which is \$40,000 per person.

Blackburn said Friday that the three children were placed in the care of grandparents. As of Tuesday afternoon, Johnson remained in custody in the Donley County Jail, and Goodwin had been freed on bond.

# **Texas sales** tax holiday this weekend

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reminds shoppers the annual sales tax holiday weekend is scheduled for this Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, Aug. 9-11.

Families can save money by not paying sales tax on most clothing, footwear and school supplies priced under \$100. Lists of tax-free items can be found at www.TexasTaxHoliday.org.

Shoppers are expected to save an estimated \$78.9 million in sales taxes during the sales tax holiday.

A complete list of Back to School supplies for Clarendon and Hedley students was printed in our July 25 supplement. Back issues are available at the Enterprise office, and the supplement is also available online at www.ClarendonLive.com.

As in previous years, the law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales and use taxes, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend.

Retailers will not be required to collect sales tax on most footwear and clothing that are sold for less than \$100 during the holiday. The exemption applies to each eligible item that sells for less than \$100, regardless of how many items are sold on the same invoice to a customer. For example, if a customer purchases two shirts for \$80 each, then both items qualify for the exemption, even though the customer's total purchase price (\$160) exceeds \$99.99.

Backpacks under \$100 and used by elementary and secondary students are exempt. Texas families also get a sales tax break on most school supplies priced at less than dent in an elementary or secondary school.

# **HISD** hires hall of famer to lead Owl football team

Hedley ISD hired a Texas coaching legend as their new athletic director and head football coach.

Jack Shely amassed a lifetime record of 206 wins - 93 losses - 3 ties as a head coach or an assistant coach in his remarkable career. As a head coach his record is an amazing 159-78-3. He was inducted into the Texas Six-Man Coaches Hall of Fame in 2007.

In the past he has earned the following awards and honors: Named South Plains Coach of the Year in 1985 and 1993; Amarillo Glove News Coach of the Year in 1985; Henderson County Coach of the Year in 1991; Recipient of the Sam Adams Award in 1995; Coached in the Six-Man All Star Game in 1986, 1995, and 2003; and Served as director for the Six-Man Coaches Association and as Executive Secretary for 16 years.


Coach Shely started the sixman programs in Higgins (Panhandle) and Trinity (East Texas), Texas. He took Silverton to the playoffs for the first time in 37 years, and coached Amherst to back to back Texas Six-Man State Championships in 1994 and 1995, falling just short of the championship in 1993. While at Amherst his record was 9-2 in 1993, 13-1-1 in 1994, and was a perin Carizzo Springs, Jonesborough, and Terrill County.

Coach Shely will not simply focus on offense and scoring. He believes that defense wins championships and will spend the necessary time to develop a defensive minded football team. This year, the Owls are a little thin, due to the large graduating class last year. This year and next year will be rebuilding years, and it will take awhile for the players to learn Coach Shely's philosophy and system.

Coach Shely is accompanied by his wife, Annette, who will teach English in the Hedley schools. Mrs. Shely will also serve as the assistant girls' basketball coach to Coach

# Let's worry about school standards

There's an intense debate right now over "Common Core," a major effort to implement a set of federal education standards in public schools nationwide. The Common Core State Standards thus far have been adopted by 45 states and the District of Colum-

Though it isn't my area of expertise, I've received numerous impassioned emails on the subject. Among them, one person's concerns particularly struck me.

This person is an expert in the field of education. She is thoughtful, serious, and no foe of public education. Her concerns especially hit home given current fears over privacy intrusions by the federal government. Those fears have swirled around the National Security Agency, the Justice Department, and the IRS. But they don't end there. There are likewise potentially serious privacy problems involving Common Core, which likewise relate to data collection, dissemination, and use.

To that end, my friend is hoping to at least help kindle some public awareness.

"The portion [of Common Core] that I believe is most important for raising public awareness," she writes, "is the changes to the FERPA regulations which have greatly expanded who has access to student data." FERPA is the Federal Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. Changes have been made to FERPA that (some believe) will leave parents uninformed as to how their children's records are shared. "Parents seem totally unaware of what data is being collected," she adds. "In Pennsylvania it is collected under something called the PIMS system, but in other states it has different labels."

There's more. There's also the problem of a rise in "outside vendors and providers to manage student data-again, without parental consent."

How, specifically, would this happen?

For starters, the Common Core standards include a heavy testing component, which involves a great deal of data collection on students. Coupled with this heightened collection of student data is the prevalence of so-called "longitudinal state reporting systems." According to my friend, as part of the "Race to the Top" initiative, a prior educational initiative, states were encouraged to create "robust data collection systems." These systems were touted as a mechanism to provide school districts, state governments, and federal policymakers with more data to analyze trends in student achievement and improve educational efforts. While this might seem benign, notes my friend, we cannot ignore the sheer volume of data that will be collected and how that data might be misused. For instance, most parents have no idea that their child's "personal information" includes not just test scores but social security numbers, attendance records, records of interaction with school counselors, identification of learning disabilities, and even disciplinary records.

All of this is being collected.

And yet, because such enhanced data collection exceeds the resources of many districts and states, schools will be forced to contract the service to corporations that collect, manage, and store such data-and possibly share it. In other words, outside data managers must be employed to maintain this personal data on your kids. Is there any level of oversight to ensure this data is protected?

My friend writes that "this trend of data collection relates to changes in the FERPA regulations by the Education Department in 2011. These changes, made without congressional approval, now allow third party access to student data without the consent of parents. For example, vendors, seeking to market particular products, can access this data."

And there's still more, relating specifically to private religious schools. My friend adds: "One particular concern that I think speaks to Catholic interests is the rush on the part of some dioceses (and other private schools) to adopt the Common Core and buy-in to the assessments connected with such systems (and as such the data collection)."

Indeed, the Catholic press is hot on this issue, realizing the distinct impact that Common Core can have on Catholic schools—the nation's largest segment of private/religious schooling. Nationwide, groups of Catholics have sprung up in protest. The National Catholic Education Association hasn't endorsed the standards, but is helping Catholic schools prepare for implementation.

Perhaps most troublesome, all of this derives from federal/national influences, even as Common Core is instituted at the state level. As my friend states: "the push for the adoption of the state longitudinal data systems and the Common Core assessment collection all stem from national influences. Certainly, the changes in FERPA were undertaken through the U.S. Department of Education."

My friend sums up: "I find the level of data collection on individual students to be excessive, and the transparency ... to be lacking." Such data collection methods "put the federal government in a position to track student achievement in ways that have been previously unavailable due to the sheer size of data mining, and have been (until recently) safeguarded by privacy regulations. As an educator I care deeply about the ability for our nation's school children to achieve high levels of learning, yet I believe the decisions for student learning are best accomplished at the classroom and school level, not the federal level."

We're facing, in essence, unchecked data collection as part of a significant and sweeping federal educational mandate. Are we ready for this, and all its repercussions?

My friend pleads for some "public awareness and dialogue in this area." Who could object to that? - Dr. Paul Kengor is professor of political science at Grove City College.

# Information War on We the People

Last week, Roger wrote an excellent editorial piece on our government's attacks on our civil liberties. After reading it, yours truly decided to dig a little deeper and look a little closer at our government's activities in this area. Unfortunately, the results of my investigation are alarming and disappointing.

There is actually a silent war afoot that the corporate media does not cover, actually the most pervasive war that could ever be waged - against us - we the people. It is a war against the First Amendment rights to freedom of speech, press, and assembly. All these previously protected modes of communication are quietly under attack, and we need to be aware of what is going on.

Like all wars, there is a pretext for invasion. The Iraq War was officially fought to free the Iraqis from Saddam Hussein's tyrannical rule - never mind the profits amassed by the militaryindustrial complex (yes, the militaryindustrial complex that President Eisenhower repeatedly warned us about).

The war in Afghanistan, we were led to believe, was a war to destroy al-Qaeda and the Taliban - never mind that the international oil companies, particularly Chevron, sought to make billions through construction of the Trans-Afghanistan Pipeline for natural gas transport across the region, and the

Taliban were project - or that the secchief executive officer of

sabotaging the retary of state during Dubya's administration was the former Chevron. And, surprise, it may

just be another coincidence that Obama is withdrawing (most of) the US troops by 2014, when that pipeline is slated for completion. Never forget that the first job of the president is to help the rich get richer.

Most Americans, being naïve and trusting, have believed these pretexts, and have supported or helped to fight these wars. Well, the war to acquire and control information is the same. Most Americans believe they need to surrender their privacy to be safe. They believe as a strong grass roots movement, and that mass, warrantless surveillance of all their e-mails, telephone calls, and Internet searches is intended to protect them from another 9/11 attack - or, heaven forbid, worse. They believe that they should willingly surrender their right to privacy and allow the National Security Agency (NSA) to access even their most intimate and personal electronic correspondence. They do not ask questions would want to sell out the safety and security of a "free" nation.

The paradox of giving up one's freedom to defend one's freedom quietly perpetuates with no vigilant media to drive home the self-defeating nature of the expectation. "National security" has become the buzzword for trumping the right to control one's personal information. Yet, hardly anyone asks whether there is a more balanced approach to national security. Is it really a matter of all or nothing – either we are safe, or we retain control over our personal information, but not both?

Folks, the feds (including the Congress) are not interested in preserving citizens' rights to control their personal information. The government prefers to maintain full control of all information in their massive databases, whether or not it has anything to do with potential terrorist plots.

Under the USA PATRIOT Act, if the federal government, in the course of investigating a suspected terrorist plot, learns that you are growing marijuana plants for personal consumption, it can use this information to prosecute you for a federal violation of narcotics laws. Contrary to the Fourth Amendment, the information. The pretext of having discovered your illegal activity while hunting for terrorists would be sufficient to render the evidence against you admissible.

tecting privacy. The government seeks the acquisition and control of information - "Total Information Awareness" authority to obtain it through domestic spying on citizens of the US.

Until we the people come together, demand that the congress restore our freedoms and civil liberties, we will continue to lose precious rights. If we don't do this, it is our fault that we are no longer a free people. Remember the wise counsel of Benjamin Franklin, "Those who give up their liberties for security deserve neither."

Just last year, in May of 2012, the Obama administration permitted itself because it would be unpatriotic, and who to infect the reservoir of public information with government propaganda. "Get outside" she would tell us during the summer. Of course we had chores to do. We worked in the garden, hoeing and picking. We hung out clothes to dry. We cut our firewood during the summer so it would be good and dry when winter came. That meant splitting and stacking also. Our yard needed mowing every 5-8days because of the amount of rain we got in the South.

I bet many of you can remember those "good ol' days." My parents always knew where their kids were. At dark, we knew we had better be home. Neighbors were good "spies" and would help to keep all the kids in check and safe. The biggest "crime" as a kid was for someone to sneak a dip of snuff out or a cigarette that would choke us half to death as we might take a puff when it was "our turn." While we certainly weren't perfect, we just weren't involved in anything "heavy" like drugs and other harmful things that we see today. Many of us never "experimented" with anything and if we did it was around college age, where our folks couldn't see us. What has happened over the years?

For whatever reason, our standards have changed. When I was young, a girl being pregnant out of wedlock was a scandal and embarrassment. There was going to be a wedding and you could bank on that! When we were old enough to have that "birds and bees" talk, I was always told that I would take care of my responsibility or be disowned. A child was to be born "with a name" and not left just for the girl to fend for. Not only does it not bother anyone but often the young man doesn't take care of his responsibility.

Drugs are accepted now as if they were candy. Minors drinking alcohol often don't even try to hide the fact. Parents often enable the situation as this is the new "norm." Parents are enabling their children to have sex by providing the place and "protection." Some only provide the place and raise the grandchildren when they come. What has happened?





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The results of a recent randomized trial indicated that estrogen skin patches may help reduce anxiety in young girls who suffer from anorexia. Anorexia nervosa, commonly known as

Skin Patch May Help Reduce Anorexia Anxiety


anorexia, is an eating disorder that causes people to fixate about their weight, food, and body image. The majority of people with this condition starve themselves or exercise constantly to lose body weight. Anxiety is often associated and may cause a person to stop benefiting from treatment. In this study, over seventy girls that ranged in age from 12 to 18 years, who were diagnosed with anorexia nervosa, were grouped into being on an estradiol patch (100 milligrams twice weekly) with cyclic progesterone (2.5 micrograms for 10 days per month) or a plain patch with no medical benefit. Eighteen months later, the results showed that anxiety scores from the estrogen patch group were a lot lower than the plain patch group.

Transdermal estrogen patches help deliver hormones through the skin into the blood system. A physician should be consulted prior to starting estrogen therapy due to potential serious side effects.
