Would you believe...that the sandhill cranes are the most accurate weather forecasters around? They are indeed!

Last week, the cranes left the Muleshoe National Wild life Refuge by the thousands, winging their way back north to their summer nesting grounds.

Wagon Grocery Store has joined the 'Parade of Progress' in the Muleshoe area. Monday, construction was begun on a new Wagon Grocery. It will be located immediately behind the present location but will be approximately twice as large as the present facility.

June Wagon said the new store will cost in excess of \$100,000 and will encompass some 7,100 square feet of floor space. Included will be 4,128 square feet of selling area; a lounge will cover 272 square feet and they will have 1,200 square feet of storage. The new store will have two checkout stands and for the convenience of shoppers the store will have refrigerated air conditioning. Portions of the store is slated to have industrial carpeting.

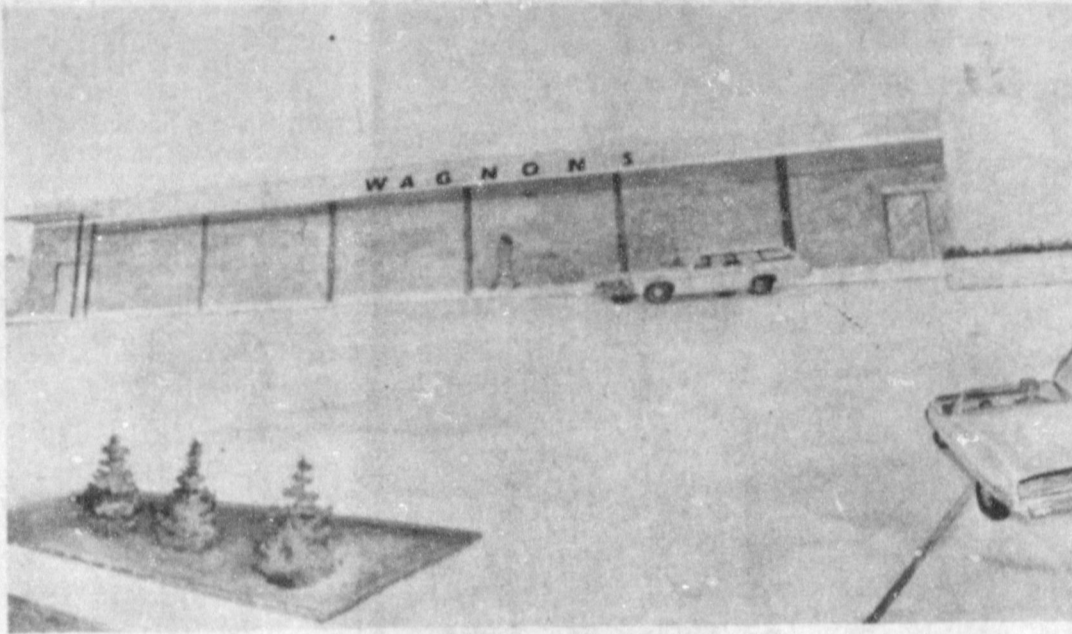
Completion date and opening date of the new Wagon Grocery is set for June 1.

Wagon said the store is all-electric, a Gold Medal store, and will be of brick and tile construction. All new fixtures will be installed in the store.

Upon completion of the new facility, the present Wagon Grocery will be torn down and a 140 x 140 foot parking lot will be in front of the store.

The Wagons opened their first grocery store in Muleshoe in 1939 at a location on Main Street. In 1956, the Wagons moved to their present location on West American Blvd.

Wagon Grocery is operated by June Wagon and Joe Mack Wagon.

### Greenbug Buildup Noted in County

Greenbugs are beginning to move into Bailey County in light to medium infestations being reported in northern, eastern and western Bailey and Parmer counties.

Muleshoe Flying Service began spraying winter wheat in those areas a little more than two weeks ago. Morgan Locker of the flying service said that he had noticed an increase during the past week and that some fields of wheat have become rather heavily infested with the bugs. He added that most of the greenbugs are in irrigated fields. He said that from the initial buildup of

greenbugs that he had noticed a gradual increase and that he is checking the fields every other day.

County Agent J. K. Adams said he had checked numerous fields south of the sand hills on Monday, March 3 and had found little or no greenbugs in that area.

HIGHLIGHTS OF INSECT ACTIVITY -- Spotted, heavy GREENBUG activity was reported from the Panhandle, Rolling Plains, Central Texas and South Texas areas during the past week. Rain and cold weather seem to have slowed insect activity in most areas of the state. WINTER GRAIN MITE activity was reportedly decreasing in the Rolling Plains area.

CONTROL OF GREENBUGS ON SMALL GRAINS-- During the past week cold weather and rain have been experienced in most sections of the state. Under these conditions greenbug infestations will remain rather static and tend not to increase. At temperatures between 55 degrees and 75 degrees Fahrenheit, greenbug populations increase rapidly. Natural enemies of the greenbug reproduce rather slowly at temperatures of 65 degrees Fahrenheit.

### Little League Divides Teams

In the first meeting of 1969 for the Muleshoe Little League officers, March 17 was named as the date for sign-up for new members of the Little League for this year. Sign-up will be held at Mary DeShazo School lunchroom at 7 p. m.

Lazbuddie will register their own players at Lazbuddie at a time to be announced later.

Discussed was the fact that with the Muleshoe Park presently undergoing a renovation process, makes it doubly hard for the teams this year. The baseball diamond was removed at the beginning of the remodeling and cannot be replaced until after the time the baseball season begins. It was pointed out that an additional \$1,200 will be needed to light the east baseball park at Roger Miller Park. The Little League has no funds other than donations and contributions by sponsors of the individual teams.

The Little League officers are not allowed to solicit funds or donations, so frequently, say members, they are forced to do without things needed to complete the teams. This year, more than 250 boys are expected to take part in Little League, as it has grown consistently during past years.

## Students To Plan Park

Thirty-one Texas Tech senior students from the Landscape Architectural class and their associate professor, Thomas Musiak, are presently making Muleshoe their home away from home. For the next five weeks, the students will be working on master plans for the proposed 'Muleshoe Community Park.'

The class is under the Department of Park Administration at Texas Technological College, Lubbock, and the students are acting as consultants in planning and designing the newly proposed park.

In a bond election held on

September 10, the amount of \$90,000 was voted on and approved to be used for parks and park improvement.

Early in December, an option was taken for 109.4 acres of land to be improved for the new city park. The option calls for the land to be purchased for \$450 an acre for a total cost of \$49,230. Location of land under option is bounded by Avenue D on the north; Avenue H on the south; 17th street on the west and approximately eighth street on the east. The option will be for a period of 18 months, from October 28, it was made

between the City of Muleshoe and Muleshoe Development, Inc.

Last Wednesday and Thursday, the students and Professor Musiak were in Muleshoe checking the proposed site for the park and making preliminary plans to help determine the master plan for development of the park.

Loan application has been made for Federal matching funds for development of the park and when government funds are made available, an application will be submitted, complete with the master plan for the park.

Each of the thirty-one students from Tech will sub-

mit a master plan for development and designing the park. The seniors have undertaken planning the Muleshoe Park as their senior project. A slide copy or picture copy of their individual plan will be received by the Muleshoe Park and Recreation Board. With the preliminaries finished last week by the students, they will probably be coming back to Muleshoe from time to time on an individual basis until the plans are completed and presented to the Park and Recreation Board.

Members of the Park and Recreation Board will meet

Lynal Murray, member of the Businessmen's Activities Committee, discussed the possibility of adding additional downtown parking at the regular meeting of the Businessmen's Activities Committee on Tuesday morning.

He said that additional merchants are needed to participate in the project to obtain more parking area. Murray pointed out that other towns with their major tax-producing businesses downtown had the same problem and eliminated the problem to a certain extent with added parking. He said that due to inadequate parking, some merchants were being forced to move to outlying areas where the problem of parking could be alleviated.

Two possible future parking lots have been located and merchants will be contacted at a later date to assist with the program. In the event the parking lots would be added, the situation would

enable a two hour parking limit to be put into effect.

renheit or below. Thus, the possibility of somewhat warmer days following this period of cooler weather greenbugs many increase to large numbers while their natural enemies multiply rather slowly. Producers throughout the state should be alert for a possible greenbug buildup during the warm-up following this period of cold weather.

\*\*\*\*  
CONTROL OF GREENBUGS ON SMALL GRAINS--During February when wheat is generally 3-6 inches in height, control for greenbugs should be considered when populations range from 100-300 per linear foot of row. In South Texas where wheat is generally 4-8 inches in height at this time, 200-400 greenbugs per linear foot of row indicate that control may be needed. Occasionally populations of 25-50 greenbugs per foot of row on very young small grain plants may warrant control. This is especially true where oats and barley are involved since they are usually more susceptible to greenbug damage than wheat.

\*\*\*\*  
SMALL GRAIN --Greenbug (Shizaphis graminum)-Medium to heavy infestations were detected in Briscoe County during the past week. Some control was being carried out in this county. During the week of February 3-7, greenbug populations were noted as follows: (1) Floyd - heavy greenbug infestations over the entire county, (2) Crosby - medium to heavy infestations, (3) Dawson - spotted, heavy infestations

Winter Grain Mite (Pentathleus major) - Heavy infestations were reported in Wilbarger County. Decreasing winter grain mite damage was reported in Young and Archer counties.

\*\*\*\*  
Tapscott) - Heavy infestations were reported in Wilbarger County. Decreasing winter grain mite damage was reported in Young and Archer counties.

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and (4) Flynn - light to medium infestations. Cold weather during this past week has prevented a further buildup of these pests in the Panhandle.

\*\*\*\*  
Heavy infestations of greenbugs were reported from the Rolling Plains this past week. Motley, Foard, Wilbarger, Wichita, Cottle, King and Knox counties reported heavy infestations. Light damage was reported in some fields in Jones and Young counties.

\*\*\*\*  
Very spotted populations of greenbugs were reported from Central Texas during the past week. Control measures were being carried out in many areas before cold weather and rain began last week. Heavy infestations of greenbugs were reported in small grain along the Brazos River bottom in Falls county near Marlin. Insecticides were applied in this area for greenbug control.

\*\*\*\*  
Heavy and widespread greenbug infestations were reported from Uvalde County during the past week. Irrigated wheat, 6-7 inches in height, was found to be infested with greenbugs in excess of 100 per foot of row. One field near Uvalde had been sprayed.

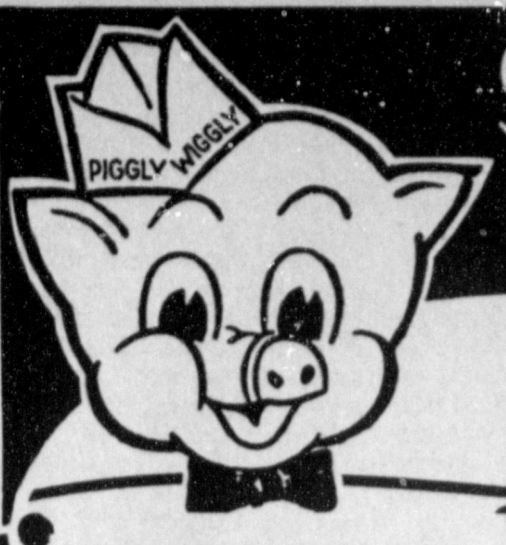

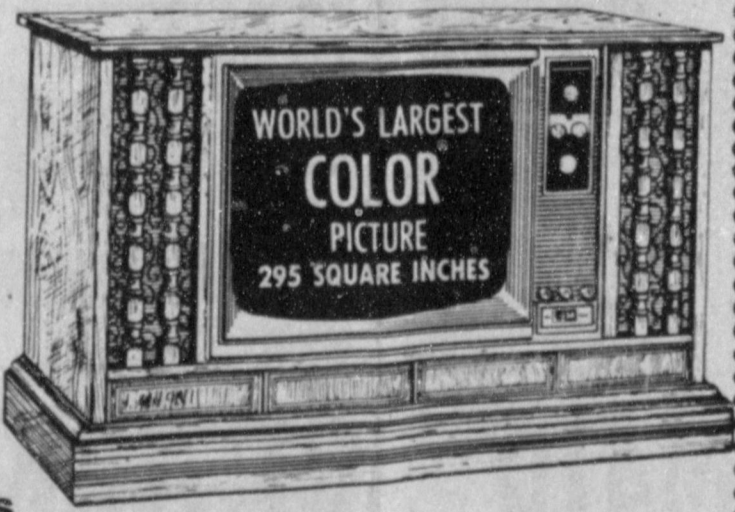
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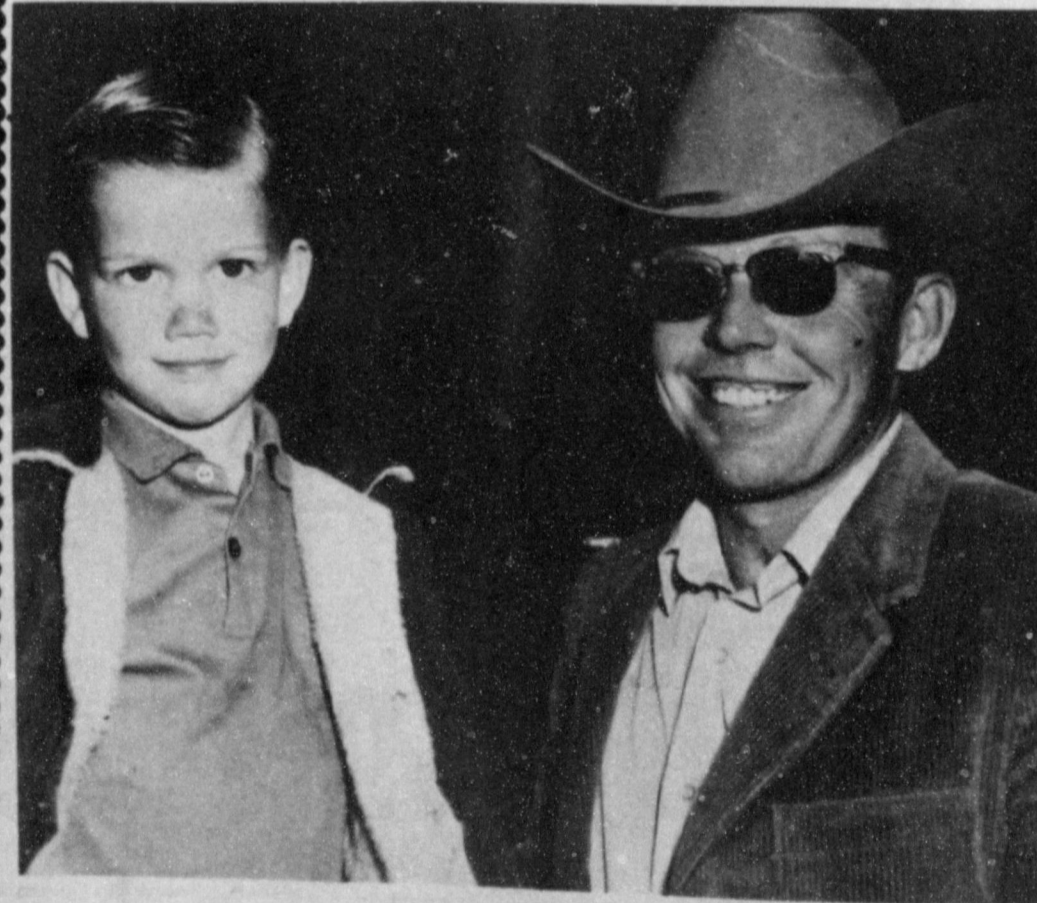

"The only agreement the Communist Government of North Vietnam will honor is one of force," he said.

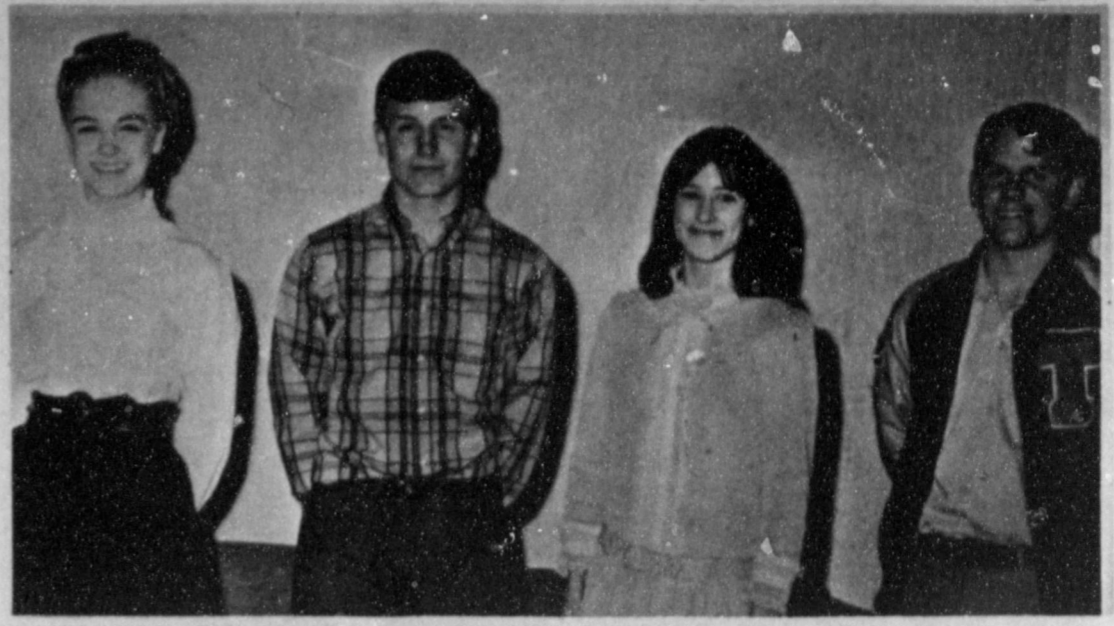

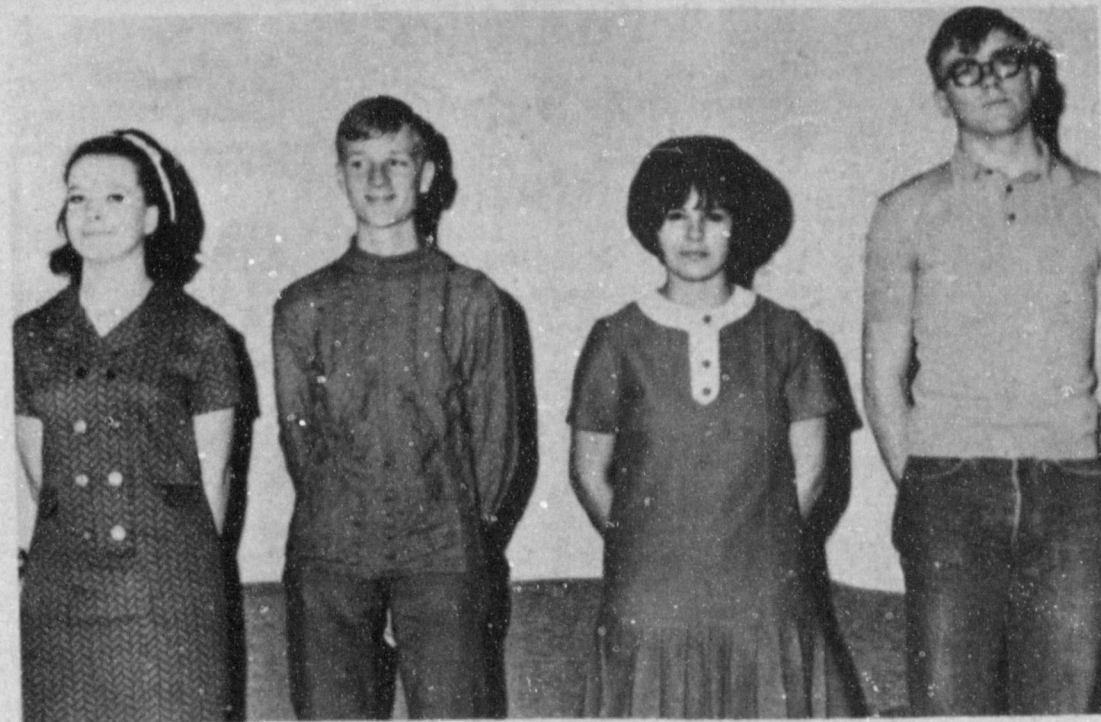

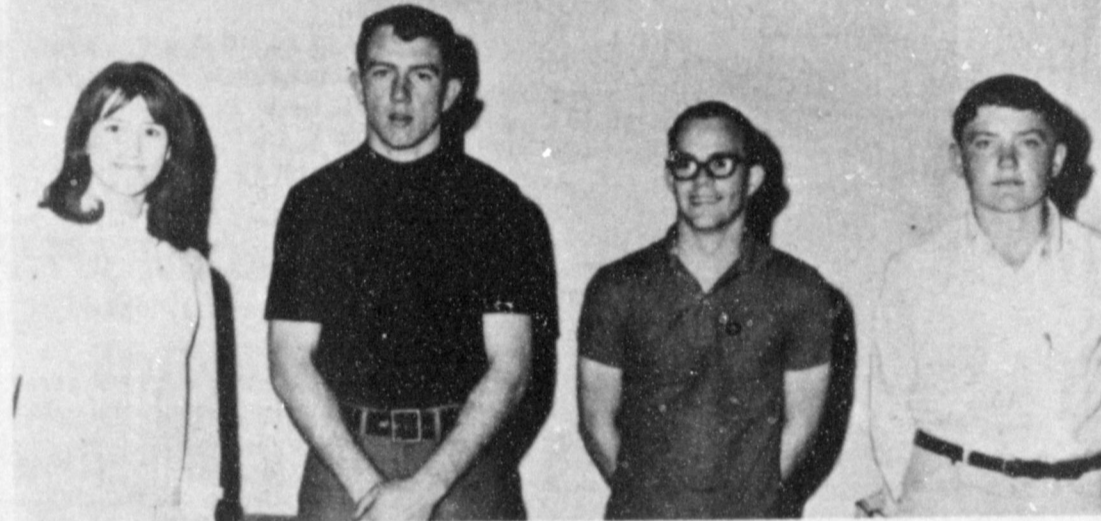
