

## Upland cotton numbers revised

Texas Ag Statistics Service sets the High Plains crop at 4,010,000 bales in its latest estimates released.

Reporting Dist. 1-N and 1-S combined correlate closely with the 41 county region represented by Plains Cotton Growers Inc.

Estimated yields per acre for the 2006 crop are 919 pounds for Dist. 1-N, down from 926 pounds in 2005.

Estimated yields per acre for the 2006 crop are 632 pounds for Dist. 1-S, down from 757 pounds in 2005.

The production numbers are based on projected harvested acres of 2.675 million for the combined Districts. 1.028 million acres have been lost from the 3.703 million acres reported planted.

For the State of Texas, TASS places the 2006 crop at 5.7 million bales harvested from 4.2 million acres remaining from the 6.4 million acres planted for an average yield of 651 pounds per acre.

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

Nov. 2, 2006, was a whole lot better day than the last time I saw Muleshoe, in the summer of '56. ## **Forum** draws small crowd

The county health forum, held Thursday at the Bailey Coiunty Coliseum's meeting room, was attended by only a small gathering of area residents concerned about health issues facing area residents.

The event, which was sponsored by the Texas Department of State Health Services, selected its primary topics of discussion from surveys collected from various locations in Muleshoe that indicated area residents were concerned most about the problems of teenage drug abuse and teen pregnancy.

"A lot of what we do is proscribed by state law and grants we have received, (but) we're trying to identify areas that we can collaborate," said Dr. Peter Pendergrass, regional director of Health Services in Region 1, which includes Bailey County.

According to the statistics presented at the forum, Bailey County's pregnancy rate for teens age 17 years and under are significantly higher, per capita, than the state rate.

The forum plans to meet again after the holiday season.

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## cost of habitat restoration Food safety during the holidays

Submitted by Mandi Seaton, Bailey CEA-FCS

Holidays are a time for family, friends, and food. Many of our fondest memories are of the holiday season and the time spent with family and friends. When families and friends are together, usually food is part of the festivities. Keeping food safe during the holiday season will insure many more fond memories.

Foodborne illness, with it's symptoms of nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, fever, and abdominal cramps, is unpleasant always whatever the circumstances; but, it is especially unwanted during the holiday season. Practicing the following recommendations will help minimize the potential for foodborne illness-causing bacteria and keep holiday foods safe.

- The safest way to thaw food is in the refrigerator. Allow extra time for the food to thaw.
- Wash hands frequently. Clean and sanitize food preparation areas before and after preparing foods.
- Cook foods to the proper temperature. Poultry, stuffing containing meat, and microwavecooked food (let stand for 2 minutes) should be cooked to 165 degrees.

## Thanksgiving Dinner cost is up

According to the American Farm Bureau Federation, the cost of the average Thanksgiving meal this year is only \$38.10 — a \$1.32 price increase from last year.

This year's price reflects the purchase of enough food to feed 10 people, and includes traditional items such as turkey, stuffing, sweet potatoes, rolls with butter, peas, cranberries, a relish tray of carrots and celery, pumpkin pie with whipped cream, coffee and milk.

Each year, the AFBF asks volunteer shoppers to look for the lowest Thanksgiving meal prices, excluding promotional specials or coupons.

Some foods, such as cranberries, sweet potatoes and stuffing have slightly increased in price since last year. The largest contributor to the overall increase in price for Thanksgiving dinner, however, is the turkey. The average cost of a 16-pound turkey is \$15.70, an increase of approximately four cents per pound, compared with 2005

Other foods, however, have decreased slightly in price, such as milk (\$2.93 for one gallon) and whipping cream (\$2.93 for a half-pint).

When comparing this year's average price to the average price in 1986 (\$28.74) when the survey began, Thanksgiving dinner has actually decreased 34 percent. This year's average cost of \$38.10 is equivalent to \$18.99 in inflation-adjusted dollars from two decades ago.

Continued from page 7 beef should be cooked to an internal temperature of 155 degrees. Roast beef, fish, and pork should be cooked to 145 degrees.

Prevent cross contamination by using separate utensils or cutting boards for each type of food; prepare and store raw meats separately from ready-to-eat or cooked foods; and practice good hygiene.


 After eating, cooked foods must be cooled and have been at room stored as quickly as possible. To cool large amounts of food

quickly, separate food into smaller portions, cover loosely, and place in the refrigerator.

· Serve hot foods at or above 135 degrees and cold foods at or below 41 degrees.

• If serving buffet style, put out small quantities of food and replace often. When a serving dish empties, replace it with a fresh one. Never add fresh food to a dish that has been setting out.

· Discard any foods that temperature for more than two hours.



## The Thanksgiving Story

In 1621, after a hard and devastating first year in the New World, the Pilgrim's fall harvest was very successful and plentiful. There was corn, fruits, vegetables, along with fish which was packed in salt, and meat that was smoke cured over fires. They found that they had enough food to put away for the winter.

The Pilgrims had beaten the odds. They built homes in the wilderness, they raised enough crops to keep them alive during the long coming winter, and they were at peace with their Indian neighbors.

Their governor, William Bradford, proclaimed a day of thanksgiving that was to be shared by all the colonists and the neighboring Native American Indians.

The custom of an annually celebrated thanksgiving, held after the harvest, continued through the years. During the American Revolution (late 1770's), a day of national thanksgiving was suggested by the Continental Congress.

In 1817, New York State adopted Thanksgiving Day as an annual custom. By the middle of the 19th century many other states also celebrated Thanksgiving Day. In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln appointed a national day of thanksgiving. Since then each president has issued a Thanksgiving Day proclamation, usually designating the fourth Thursday of each November as the Thanksgiving holiday.
