After one tornado menaced Sudan late Tuesday afternoon, snaking down for awhile and pulling back up in the clouds, the tornado cloud reversed after passing over Sudan to the northeast and made another run at that community. However, the cloud passed without hitting Sudan after baring its swirling teeth.

Law enforcement officials tracked the cloud to near Earth, watching the white tornado dipping in and out of the clouds and bouncing over the countryside.

High Plains Says Cotton Weather Good

many High Plains farmer's profit-book, be charted to indicate trends for what can be expected during the coming farming sea-

This is one of the questions that could be answered in the extensive weather recording and reporting data compiled annually by the High Plains Re-

search Foundation. Weather "record keeper" at the Foundation, Jim Valliant, Soil Scientist, said charted graphs of weather conditions over the past years seem to indicate some patterns that follow similar trends through each

"It has been my observation that in years we have a warm February and a cool March, we've had good cotton weather during the summer," Valliant said. If this holds true, this should be a good cotton year due to the snow and cold wea-

ther occurring in March. And if such trends can be accurate, then farmers could plan their farming program and

Can weather, the nemisis to cultural patterns to take advantage of weather.

Among the hardest decisions to be made by the farmer is the proper planting time, Rule of the thumb is when the soil temperature reaches a 10-day average of 60 degrees. However, if the farmer knew approximately when this tempera ture could be reached, he could plant five days earlier while the average was being set.

The charted temperature graphs from 1962 to 1968 show that the last cold spell for the season occured between April 26 and May 12 in six of seven years. A study of the weekly weather forecasts during this period could pin-point this last spring cold spell and permit the selection of a more optimum cotton planting date.

Valliant said the weather records could provide a key to weather trends that could pinpoint dates of unfavorable weather and farmers knowing this could take advantage of special cultural practices to produce more income.
