One was received the other day from a man in the Indian Territory and it read as follows: "Dear Sir-I have discovered a dead shot for the destruction of the boll weevil, so please send me a check for the \$50,000 offered by the state by return mail."

La Salle has quite a number of Artesian wells and the water is excellent for irrigating purposes in nearly all of them. The only trouble with them is the flow is not very strong. Most of them flow about 15 gallons per minute. This, however, may be remedied by going deeper, as a well has just been finished on the Irvin Ranch that flows 70 gallons. Four veins were 'struck in this well, but it did not yield over 30 or 35 gallons until the fourth vein was struck and then the flow raised to 70 galions.
