The late President John F. Kennedy said, "The cost of freedom is always high - but Americans have always paid it. And one path we shall never choose is the path of surrender or submission.

"Let us pause this day to honor the many Americans who fought the many battles for freedom. And let us rededicate ourselves to the principles for which they made the supreme sacrifice."

America is still engaged in warfare. To date, more than 35,000 U.S. lives have been lost on the battlefields in Vietnam. This conflict has been going on since 1961, and although peace negotiations have been in process slightly more than a year, little or no progress has been made in securing a per-

Thusfar in the Vietnam conflict, Muleshoe has lost two its fine young men. First was W.T. 'Dub' Hatfield, who lost his life in 1967 and Antonio Orozco, who was killed on the battlefields of Vietnam in early 1968.





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

A Designed Irrigation System

Irrigation water management can be defined as the application of irrigation water according to crop and soil needs. This can be accomplished only if there is a designed irrigation system on the farm that is being used according to the design.

For irrigation water management, with a sprinkler irrigation system, some of the necessary considerations are the proper size main and lateral lines, proper nozzle sizes and adequate water pressure.

Necessary components for a surface irrigation system with which irrigation water management can be managed are uniform grade or rows, proper length of irrigation run, and an adequate water transportation

Therefore, if irrigation water management is practiced, a designed irrigation system is essential. By practicing irrigation water management, maximum benefits are derived from irrigation along with the conservation of one of the very important natural resources of this area's "irrigation water."



Leaving Africa on the return trip, other stops to study cotton production will be made in the production will be made in the areas near Athens, Greece; Ankara, Turkey, and in West Pakistan.

From Pakistan he will make "market calls" in Hong Kong and in Tokyo and Osaka, Japan. In these places he will concentrate on follow-up work with mill representatives who visied U.S. cotton producting areas last fall, including Lubbock, as members of a Cotton Council International trade team.

Anderson said "We made some valuable contacts with mill people in these important export markets last fall when they spent two days with us in Lubbock, and I hope to talk with these folks again to continue and broaden the favorable relationship between spinners in the Far East and West Texas

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
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
