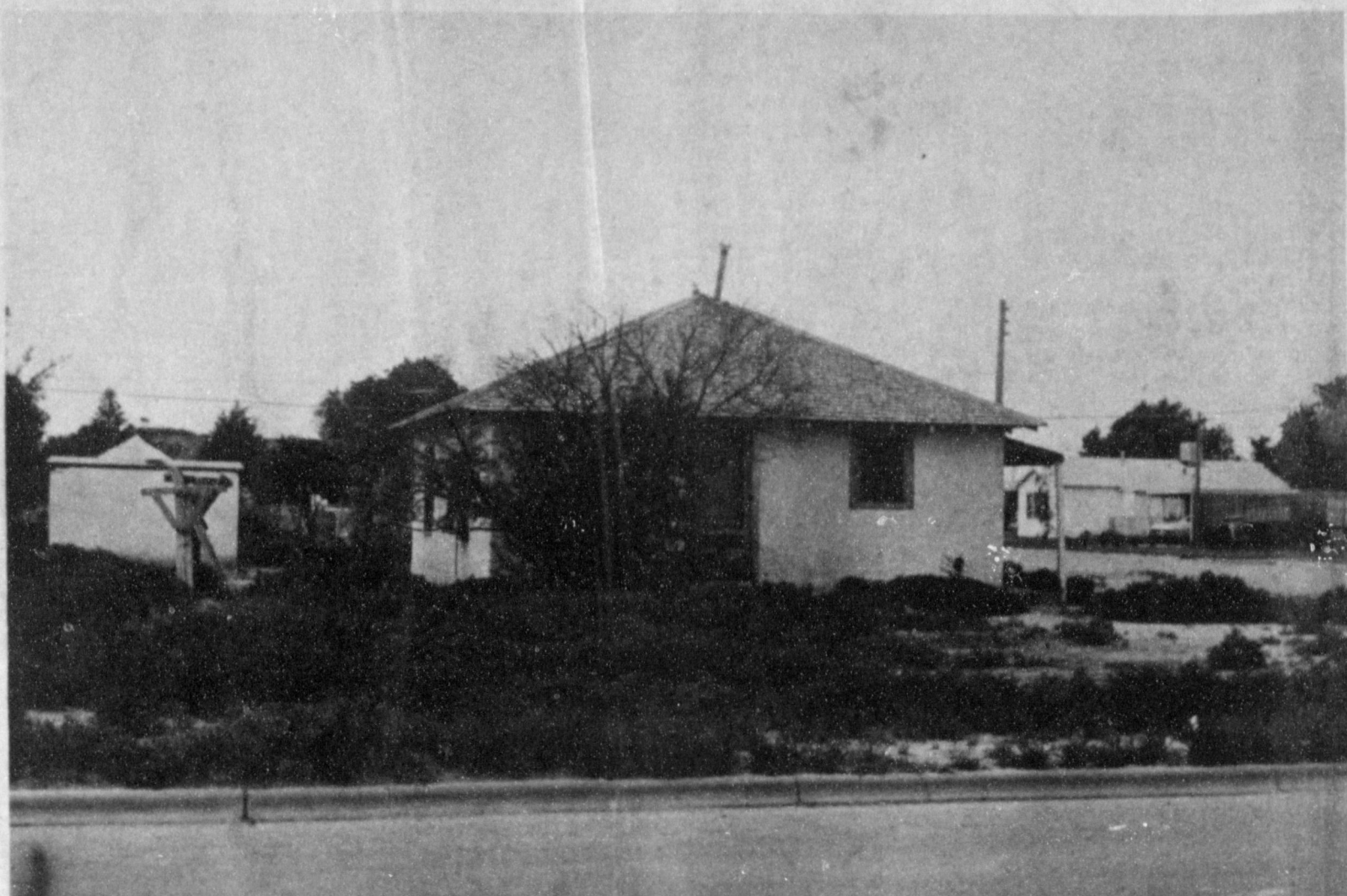

Spring Cleaning In Full Swing

'Be a Neatnik'

Urge Area Leaders

Getting into the swing of things, numerous area people are in the process of cleaning, painting, trimming and in general, fixing up their homes and places of business.

Since the clean-up campaign was launched just over a week ago by the Businessmens Activities Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, cooperation has been rather good to date. Alleys and yards are cleaner and cleared of weeds and debris, fresh paint gleams inside and out on many homes and some junk cars have been removed from yards and roadsides. The Businessmens Activities Committee decided to start the tourist season properly with a clean, attractive town for tourists to see when they travel through the country, so tabbed Curtis Walker as chairman of the clean-up campaign.

Mayor W.B. LeVeque signed a proclamation, proclaiming the month of May 20 through June 19 as "Clean-up, Fix-up, Paint-Up Month."

He said he was designating the clean-up month, not only from a health standpoint, but also from an industrial standpoint and as an inducement for people to want to come to Muleshoe to live. City Health Officer Dr. B.O. McDaniel said, "it is very important from a health standpoint that a clean-up activity begin at once. Trash and garbage breed rats, insects and disease."

"We urge everyone, property owners and individuals, to make every effort to do their part to make our town safe from disease through weeds, trash and garbage," concluded the health officer.

Businessmen pointed out that although it is next to impossible to have 100 percent cooperation in the clean-up campaign, it is imperative to have as full cooperation as possible.

Memorial Day-1969

The late President John F. Kennedy said, "The cost of freedom is always high - but Americans have always paid it. And one path we shall never choose is the path of surrender or submission."

"Let us pause this day to honor the many Americans who fought the many battles for freedom. And let us rededicate ourselves to the principles for which they made the supreme sacrifice."

America is still engaged in warfare. To date, more than 35,000 U.S. lives have been lost on the battlefields in Vietnam. This conflict has been going on since 1961, and although peace negotiations have been in process slightly more than a year, little or no progress has been made in securing a permanent peace.

Thusfar in the Vietnam conflict, Muleshoe has lost two of its fine young men. First was W.T. 'Dub' Hatfield, who lost his life in 1967 and Antonio Orozco, who was killed on the battlefields of Vietnam in early 1968.

Muleshoe residents will be among those who pause to honor the heroes of all American wars. Several observations will be held during the day to honor the American deaths due to warfare.

Most major businesses will be closed all day Friday, May 30. Included are the Bailey County Courthouse, City Hall, State offices and major businesses including the banks, retail merchants, the larger grocery stores and others.

Migrant Children School Approved

Neal B. Dillman, superintendent of the Muleshoe Schools, received the final approval Friday, May 23, from Lee Frasier, Director of Migrant and Preschool Programs of the Texas Education Agency, for the Muleshoe Summer School Program.

The Summer Program is designed for migrant children who have moved to the Muleshoe School District since January 1, 1967 and whose parent or parents are employed in agriculture or a related processing activity.

Preschool participants must be six years old on or before September 1, 1969. Other students may be in grades one through eight.

The school will begin June 10, 1969 and will end August 5, 1969. Classes will be held from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. on Monday through Friday in the Mary DeShazo School. There will be nine certified classroom teachers, nine teachers aides, a visiting teacher, a school nurse, a director, three lunchroom workers, and four bus drivers.

The schedule will include oral language development, reading, social studies, science, arts and crafts, mathematics and recreation. Transportation will be provided for those living far enough from school to need it. Each child will participate in at least two field trips. Each child will receive breakfast, a hot lunch and a snack each day.

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Speeding Tops Tickets Issued For JP Court

Local Soldier Is Improving After Injury

Sp/4 Dale E. Bell, son of Mr. and Mrs. L.M. Bell, Muleshoe, is showing slow but steady improvement of wounds suffered in Vietnam on May 1.

Bell has been hospitalized in Japan since shortly after he was shot in Vietnam. He expects to return to a hospital in the states within the next two weeks.

In a letter written to Mr. and Mrs. T.R. White on May 20, Bell said he had just had another operation to remove a blood clot from his side but that they should be removing the tubes in about a week.

In his letter, Bell said, "I don't want you to worry about me because I have some good doctors and God taking care of me. You don't know how grateful to the Lord I am that he spared me. Nothing will ever be able to shake my faith in Him now."

Bell went to Vietnam in March around the 15th and had only been there about a month and a half when he was shot by the Viet Cong. Before joining the army, he attended Muleshoe High School.

STATE CAPITAL
Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, TEX.--Filibusters began to slow the tide of legislation passed by the Senate as the June 24 adjournment deadline closed in. However, bills continued to roll through both houses in staggering volume on the local and uncontested bills calendars.

A minimum-wage proposal landed in conference committee. Budget conferees brought out a one-year appropriations bill without knowing whether Gov. Preston Smith will veto it.

While bills to create a University of Texas at San Antonio, a UT of Permian Basin in the Midland-Odessa area and a University of South Texas at Corpus Christi ran into senate filibusters, other new school measures went to the governor. Among them were UT at Dallas, medical schools at Houston and Lubbock, and a future site left to UT regents, a UT dental branch (probably in San Antonio) and nursing schools at San Antonio and El Paso.

An amended version of the implied consent bill to require breath tests of suspected drunk drivers found its way to the governor's desk. UT regents were given authority to curtail enrollments. A proposed new constitutional amendment (SJR 15) would allow the legislature to establish a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands.

CLUB RULES FIRMED

Liquor Control Board announced its final version of new rules to clamp down on private bottle clubs, effective September 1.

Club "guests" cannot pay cash or share in club services unless in the company of a member or present on his personal invitation. Clubs also would have to maintain written records showing when members were admitted or removed, have a membership committee or governing board to pass on memberships and operate with at least 25 members.

Other new rules include keeping permanent records of all transactions involving the pool system or maintaining separate storage lockers for each member if operating under the locker system, filing quarterly reports to Texas LCB on pool transactions and requirement that regular food service be provided.

THE EYES HAVE IT

A battle that has raged for almost 20 years between the chain store and independent optometrists have been tentatively resolved by the final passage of a "compromise" bill worked out by Sens. Jack Strong and Tom Creighton. Bill sent to the governor spells out a stiff code of ethics and advertising for the industry--something the non-advertising operators have wanted for years.

Big feature provides that there will be no more "one price" ads.

In the future, ads will have to carry the lowest and highest prices of lenses in stock.

On another health front, the legislature has sent to the governor a bill to license and regulate the hearing aid industry. It was passed with the full approval of the industry which worked closely with the lawmakers on perfecting the bill.

AG OPINIONS

Texans not registered as voters cannot serve as school district trustees, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin ruled in a new grove (Fannin County) schools.

*In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

*A legislator can run for office where pay was increased by legislative session when he was a lawmaker if the term doesn't overlap.

*Employment of adult probation officers is not subject to county commissioners' court approval.

*A school board of trustees does not have the authority to suspend a student for any act, such as possession or use of dangerous drugs, unless the board has adopted a rule, regulation or general policy covering such conduct or unless the act violated state statutes covering "incurable conduct."

*National Guard Armory Board may act independent of the State Building Commission on development of armory construction and related projects and awarding of bids.

*A state department head may decide whether to allow payroll deductions of state employees' contributions for group insurance premiums.

*Industrial Accident Board cannot award an attorney a fee for fatal injury cases but can allow reasonable expenses for preparing and presentation of claim.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

State Advisory Council for Vocational Education has unveiled its new master plan for new directions in educating students for industry. The three-part program calls for spending the state's \$16 million federal allocation for vocational education. A formal public hearing on the plan will be held June 7 at the regular meeting of the State Board of Education.

What will the new plan do for the students? John Guemple, assistant commissioner for vocational and adult education, explained it this way.

"The state plan puts new strength in the standards of the vocational and adult programs, set up special advanced courses for highly skilled craftsmen in junior colleges and James Connally Technical Institute in Waco, and even affects the preparation of teachers themselves."

Texas operated more than 8,300 programs in vocational education during the 1968-69 school year. This will increase to 8,700 programs in September of this year.

APPOINTMENTS

Governor Smith has named three former governors as co-chairmen of a committee to lead the campaign for the \$3.5 billion Texas water bond constitutional amendment. Ex-Govs. John Connally, Price Daniel and Allan Shivers will head drive.

Smith appointed former Sen. Wardlaw W. Lane of Center Judge of 123 district to fill an unexpired term.

Retired Supreme Court Meade Griffin was sworn in as special judge of Court of Criminal Appeals. He will sit in for Judge Leon Douglas on cases where Douglas disqualifies himself.

David W. McElwrath of

Combes is executive director of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Texas.

A.F. (Tony) Rodriguez of San Antonio has been nominated as commissioner-director of the US section of US-Mexico Commission of Border Development and Friendship.

Sen. O.H. (Ike) Harris of Dallas now is a member of Urban Affairs Study Committee of Southern Conference of Council of State Governments.

Jose Vela of Waco and Fernin Islas of San Marcos now are members of the staff of the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity, selected by Governor Smith.

S.R. Greenwood, a Temple banker, has been named by Governor Smith to be chairman of the Governor's Committee of Aging.

Charles H. Martin, superintendent of the Richmond State School, has been named deputy commissioner for retardation of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

COTTON TALKS FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

L.D. (Don) Anderson, Crosby County cotton farmer and second-year president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., will leave the U.S. from New York May 31 to attend the annual meeting of the International Cotton Advisory Committee in Kampala, Uganda, Africa. The meeting is set for June 2 through June 11.

The ICAC is an association of 42 countries interested in the production, export, import and consumption of cotton. Literally a "world parliament on cotton," it is designed to promote cooperation in the solution of cotton's problems, especially those of international scope and significance.

Anderson was chosen to serve as the cotton producer advisor to the official US delegation by Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin. Also represented on the U.S. delegation will be other segments of the cotton industry and the departments of Agriculture, State and Commerce.

His trip was authorized by the PCG Board of Directors at its meeting May 5 and will be combined with cotton production studies in three African countries and three other "nearby" countries. It will also include marketing visits to Hong Kong and Japan. The trip is a part of PCG's export market development efforts and will consume from 30 to 40 days, Anderson said.

This is the third time and the second successive year that the U.S. cotton producer delegate to ICAC has been a representative of Plains Cotton Growers. The organization's Executive Vice President, Donald Johnson, served in that capacity in 1968 when the meeting was conducted in Athens, Greece. In 1963, the late George Pfeifferberger, then executive officer of PCG, was the U.S. producer delegate in Bangalore, India.

Anderson's cotton production studies in the various countries will be aimed at assessing their economic potential for continuing or expanding cotton production in competition with U.S. producers for world markets. He said "It still seems little strange to me that a West Texas cotton farmer should need to travel so far to look after his business. But sooner or later we will be forced to compete with these countries at world market prices with little

Anderson said "We made some valuable contacts with mill people in these important export markets last fall when they spent two days with us in Lubbock, and I hope to talk with these folks again to continue and broaden the favorable relationship between spinners in the Far East and West Texas cotton."

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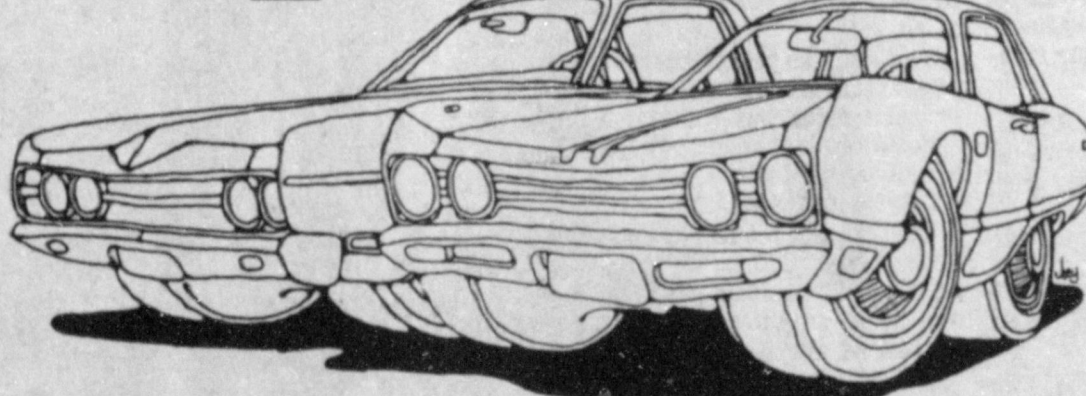

Legislature Amends Student Transfers

Texas parents who wish to transfer their children from one public school district to another --without changing their own place of residence--have been given a new route by the State Legislature.

This new plan is outlined in detail by the Texas Education Agency in a letter which was mailed to school superintendents throughout the state Monday.

The act, passed by the 61st Legislature and signed by Governor Preston Smith on May 9, repeals transfer methods which have been in effect since 1925 and 1935.

Parents will no longer apply for transfer to the county superintendent. Instead, they will now go directly to the superintendent of the school district

they wish their children to enter. The parent or guardian of the child must apply in writing to the receiving school superintendent's office. If the district agrees to receive the non-resident student, the parents or guardian will be notified in writing.

The old June 1 deadline for filing transfer applications will be extended, probably by several weeks, when the State Board of Education meets in Austin June 7, Agency officials explain. The board is also expected to adopt policies for implementing the new law.

Parents who have already applied for transfer to the county superintendent will be notified in writing to contact the receiving school district. If their applications have already been
