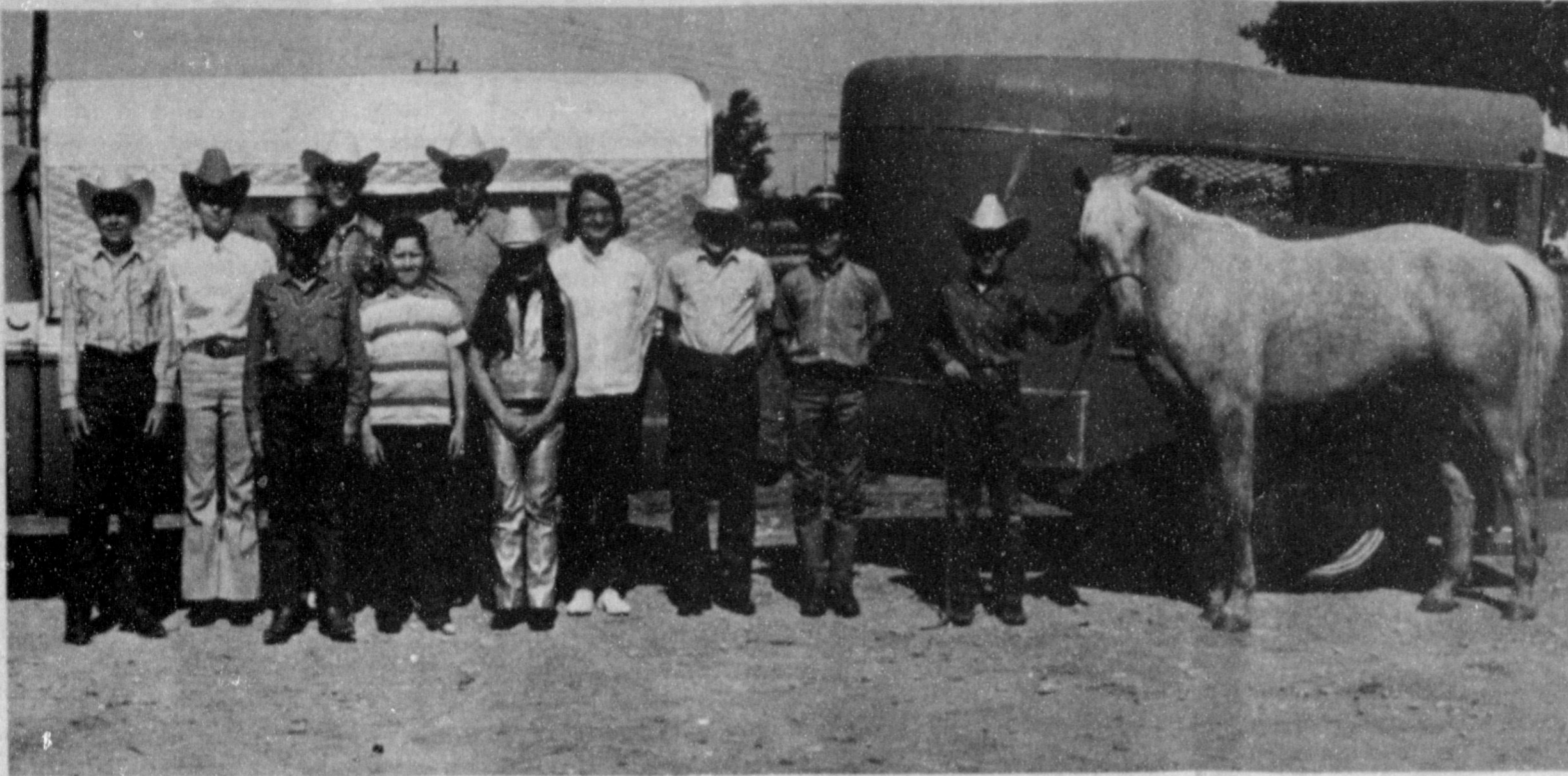

## Speeding Leads Justice Court Cases in June

Bailey County Justice of the Peace Joe D. Vaughn has handled 45 cases in his court during the past two weeks. Leading the cases again is speeding, with 20 cases filed in his court.

Five persons were tagged for having no operator license to be second in number of cases filed. Four each were filed on for being drunk and for failure to appear in answer to citation. A total of three persons were filed on for being parked in the roadway and two for having no registration on their vehicle.

One citation was issued for each of the following violations: parking in the median; minor in possession (of liquor); failure to yield right of way; no commercial license; crossing a physical barrier; expired driver's license and improper left turn.

Chamber of Commerce Manager Jerry Hutton said housing is being sought for from 200-300 pipeline workers who will begin arriving in Muleshoe Tuesday or Wednesday of next week.

Almost any type of available housing is needed said the Chamber manager, but heading the list are furnished houses, apartments and trailer space. Some unfurnished units will also be needed for the estimated two months the workers will be in the Bailey County area.

Hutton added that persons who have extra furniture or furniture in storage could rent their furniture to house and apartment owners for the period of time the pipeline crew will be in the area.

Some of the workers will be bringing their families, but most of them will need temporary, bachelor-type quarters.

### Ary Receives 20 Year Pin For Service

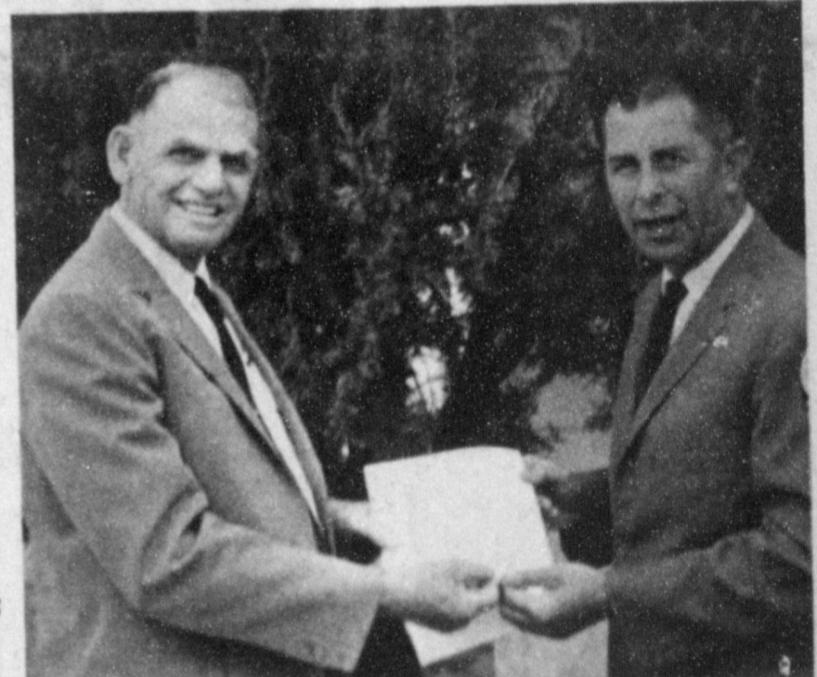
Edd Ary is pictured receiving a 20 year pin and a letter from William T. Krummes, Regional Director. An excerpt from the letter reads as follows:

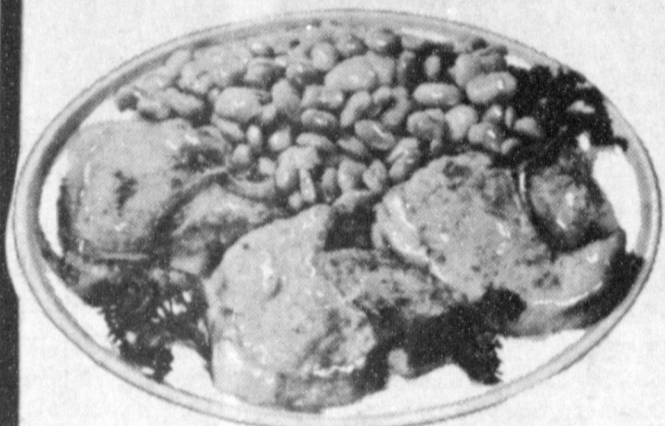

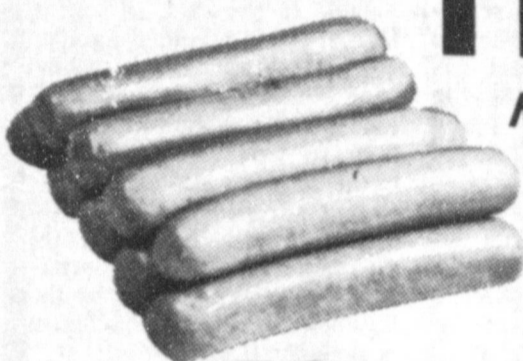

## Loving Care Transforms Landscape

"The desert shall blossom as a rose"...These words of the prophet Isaiah have been literally fulfilled around the Lutheran church and parsonage in Lariat since pastor and Mrs. Peiman took residence there in the spring of 1964.

The first spring, with practically no grass and only a few shrubs on the south side of the house, the sand blew to the north one day and back to the south the next day. Our poor little radishes just barely survived the Peimans well remember.

But the men of church planted Bermuda roots around the parsonage and on the large plot between church and parsonage, and the pastor and his wife slowly developed flower beds around the house and on two sides of the church and in other bare spots, until flower for the church has provided most Sunday's for the past three years; Jonquils and Tulips in early spring until the Mums in late fall. For the past month it has been Iris in more than a dozen different colors, and some roses.

Other flowers blooming at present include Creeping Phlox, Blue Flax, and a shrub known as a Flowering Sweet Pea Tree, which looks very much like a Tree Wisteria.

Later there will be Petunias, Marigold, Balsam or Lady Slipper, tall Pink Phlox, Gladiolas, Dahlias, a dozen varieties of Lillies and some Ever Blooming Iris. Then just before frost the Mums and Golden Glow.

East of the parsonage is the garden which for the past month has provided radishes, lettuce,

Beans, Lima Beans, Corn, Okra, canteloupes, squash and cucumbers. The south side of the garden is fringed with a berry patch, Dewberries, Black berries and Raspberries, and the east side is a row of grapes, and beyond that an orchard of peaches, plums, cherries, apricots and apples. Most of the trees are too young to bear now, but should provide plenty of fruit for the Peimans in another year or two. Between these trees the Peimans are trying to preserve as many wild flowers as possible.

Asked how he found time to take care of this little "farm", the 75 year old clergyman replied, "Preachers need exercise too. And I for one receive more enjoyment and recreation out of digging in the dirt and watching things grow than I could ever get out of chasing a little ball around a nine hole golf course."
