ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-ONE CARLOADS WERE SHIPPED THIS WEEK FROM THIS DIVISION OF I. & G. N.

Cotulla Loaded Out Forty-One Cars-Yield Turning Out Good-Prices are market to hold up alright, pro-Fair Byt Growers Are Pushing Their Stuff On The Market Too Fast.

Perfect weather has prevaile over the onion belt this week and the harvest has progressed with much rapidity. From Monday morning until Friday night one hundred and twenty-one carloads were shipped from this division of the I. & G. N. Forty-one of these cars were loaded at Cotulla.
