Some 70 hours after a devastating hailstorm hit the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge Friday afternoon, six inches of hail still was on the ground in protected places.

During the height of the storm, hailstones larger than golf balls pounded the refuge and surrounding area. Most of the damage was concentrated at the refuge headquarters included all roofs needing to be replaced and aluminum siding on the north side of the buildings will have to be replaced.

Refuge Manager B.E. Blair reported that water was driven into the house like a fire hose was turned loose and stood four inches deep in the basement.

He said in excess of \$5,000 damage was sustained by the refuge buildings. He was returning from town when the first reports of the approaching storm were given on the radio in his car. He said he nearly reached the office building near his home when the hail started. Blair called his house on reaching the office and told Mrs. Blair to take their three sons to the basement of the house.

Following the storm water was almost knee deep around the house for awhile. Blair reported that following the storm, when his family could leave the basement of their house, they went to the office, water-soaked where they stayed until the Texas Department of Public Safety could get officers in to the refuge to remove the family to town. THP officer Gene Sisemore said the patrol car was driven through water just below the windows of the car. The Blair family was brought to Muleshoe where they obtained temporary lodgings in a local motel. Clean-up and repair

work at the refuge is expected to take some time.

Over five inches of rain was estimated to have been received during the Friday evening storm and refuge officials report the most water in the refuge lakes since 1951. Goose Lake had been dry and White Lake had .07 foot of water of Friday morning. Monday afternoon was

Weather again takes the spotlight in the Bailey County and Muleshoe area with storms which pounded the county last Friday evening and again Monday night of this week.

Followed by unseasonable cold, the rains came last week late beginning with a drenching rain which bombarded Muleshoe Friday morning, dumping more than two inches of rain in a very short time.

Threatening skies hovered all day and broke loose late Friday afternoon in southwest Bailey County, with a miniature flood, large hailstones up to baseball size and winds which beat, twisted and pounded the hailstones into crops, buildings, trees and livestock.

Charles Daniel of the ASC office toured southern and southwestern Bailey County Monday afternoon and reported that it was nearly impossible at this time to check thoroughly the total amount of damage sustained by county crops, principally cotton crops in the county. He said his estimate at this time would be from 18,000-20,000 acres of cotton completely wiped out in the devastating storms, with an additional 30,000 acres in the county being damaged to some extent. Spotted damage was noted in other parts of Bailey County.

From conversations with farmers on Monday, Daniel said an estimated 50-60 percent of

MAIF Survey Made Tuesday By Government

Harmon Elliott, president of the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation was visited Tuesday by two government members who came to Muleshoe to review with the Industrial Foundation and interested people the feasibility of establishing agricultural vegetable processing plants in West Texas.

Dr. Jackson E. Simpson, Office of Administration of Agricultural Research of the United States Department of Agriculture from Washington, D.C. and Walter A. Meyer, Chief, Marketing Development Department of the Texas Department of Agriculture from Austin were the visitors in town.

USDA and TDA are sending these representatives to the six counties who are participating in a feasibility program for bringing vegetable processing plants to the West Texas area.

The six counties are Bailey, Hale, Lamb, Castro, Dea Smith and Parmer. Discussed this morning with MAIF were the first of three phases in the program and the government surveyors will return to Muleshoe when Phase II is prepared.

They have presented a similar program in Lubbock, Plainview, Dimmitt and Littlefield.

farmers plan to re-plant cotton in the event they can get into their fields by Saturday, June 21, which is the deadline for planting.

When asked the alternatives, in the event cotton cannot be replanted, Daniel replied feed grain, soybeans, castor beans,

black-eye peas and beans, "however," reminded the ASC agent, "in the event a farmer cannot or chooses not to re-plant his cotton he must come in to the ASC office to make application for any other crop he plans to plant to replace his ruined crop."

"For instance," continued Daniel, "if a man is in the feed grain program and decides to re-plant his acreage in grain

sorghum, he will have to drop out of the feed grain program. "Anyone who was affected by the recent storms is urged to come in to the office if they plan to re-plant with another crop," said Daniel, "we are ready to work with you and explain other crops and assist you in any way we can."

County agent J.K. Adams made a tour of the affected area on Tuesday afternoon and brought devastated cotton stubs

by the Journal office late Tuesday. He brought samples from different areas and explained the effect of the various stages of damage. Some of the cotton was shredded stubs, some with the bud gone and some so badly bruised, although it still had the bud that it would be strictly guesswork to know whether or not it would come out of the damage from the storm.

Admas said that one farmer told him that in order to travel from one farm near Maple to his other farm near Three Way, it was necessary to travel 30 miles out of the way because of a huge lake across highway 54 going west from Enochs. Much of the damage, other than crops beaten into the ground was a washout, especially in the Enochs area with deep gulleys cut into the farmland by swift moving water. Long-range side effects are expected to be shown by late-maturing cotton, which will cut the average production figures for the future years and the loss of topsoil due to the washouts.

Admas said he did not know how many farmers in the loss are had Federal Crop Insurance, but stated that those farmers although hurt by their loss, will not be hurt as much as those who had no insurance on their crops.

ter was going over the spillway into the lower lake as fields on upper reaches were still draining into the lakes.

There was considerable loss of wildlife during the height of the storm with an estimated 90 percent of the wildlife on the refuge being killed. Two cows drowned and a calf was apparently killed by hailstones. Blair found more than 26 dead doves around the headquarters and reported rabbits, hawks and snakes all found dead. Trees were stripped of their leaves and small limbs and some bark was removed from the trees by the force of the wind and hail.

Pat Bobo, who has two farms near the refuge, told the Journal that crops on the 640 and 660 acre farms were completely wiped out by the Friday storm.

Following threatening skies Monday night, Blair reported .41 inch of rain at the refuge and light wind. Enochs received one and one-half inches in the Monday night storm and Morton received more than three inches of rain. Light hail was reported at Enochs and Morton.

progress of the summer maintenance program including work on painting rooms in high school, junior high and Richland Hills; installation of a hot water heater, shower, commode and lavatory in the nurses room at Richland Hills; report on patching and resurfacing the high school parking lot which has been completed; a report on new black top paving which is being laid on the street between the swimming pool and tennis courts; the front entrance of the bus barn; parking along the street east of junior high school and 100' x 100' play areas on Richland Hills and Mary DeShazo campuses.
