# Muleshoe Bank Deposits Up Sharply

## Economic Trend Shown by Increase

Showing a continued upswing, both the Muleshoe State Bank and First National Bank show increased bank deposits with the current bank calls which were made on June 30.

Muleshoe State Bank shows total deposits of \$7,321,438.24 at the close of business on June 30, an increase of \$1,011,925.34 over deposits on June 29, 1968.

Loans and discounts at Muleshoe State Bank are up \$909,822.20 on June 30 this year with loans listed as being \$4,389,815.17 and last year on June 29 loans were listed as being \$3,479,992.97.

First National Bank shows an increase of \$444,979.96 in deposits over June 29, 1968. Deposits on June 30 were \$6,930,336.30 as compared with \$6,485,386.34 at the same time last year.

Loans and discounts for First National Bank on June 30 were \$4,452,506.32 and on June 29, 1968, they showed loans and discounts of \$3,821,278.14 an increase of \$631,228.18 over the same period last year.

Total increase in deposits shown by both banks is \$1,456,905.30 over the same period of time in 1968.

Other area banks checked at random show an increase in all areas which shows a continued strong economic trend throughout the South Plains area.

relates to the Texas Water Plan. "Time for Action" is a sound and color 16 mm movie on Texas water. It relates the role water has played in past development of the state and the need for additional supplies to meet increased needs of the future.

The film emphasizes how water has become an essential part of our modern way of life and its importance to cities, industries, agriculture, navigation, recreation, fish and wildlife, and other essential uses. Also stressed is that continued growth and development of the state will require increasing quantities of water to meet expanded needs of the future. Ground water, now supplying 75 percent of the state's water requirements, will be depleted to the extent that only one-half of the amount presently used will be available by the year 2020, when the state's total water requirements will be doubled. Also brought out in the film are many other water problems which Texans will face in future years.

The film indicates solution to future Texas water problems can come through the framework of the Texas Water Plan. Implementation of the Texas Water Plan can provide water for meeting future water needs for all purposes in all areas of Texas for all Texans.

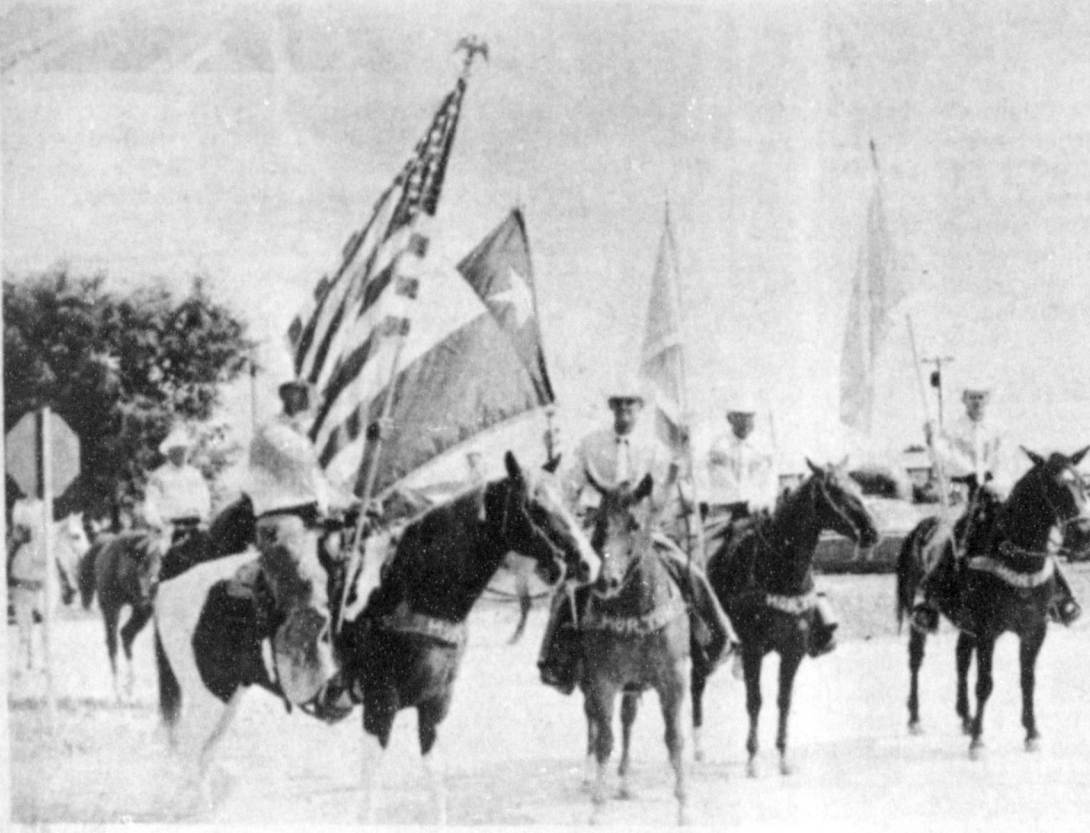

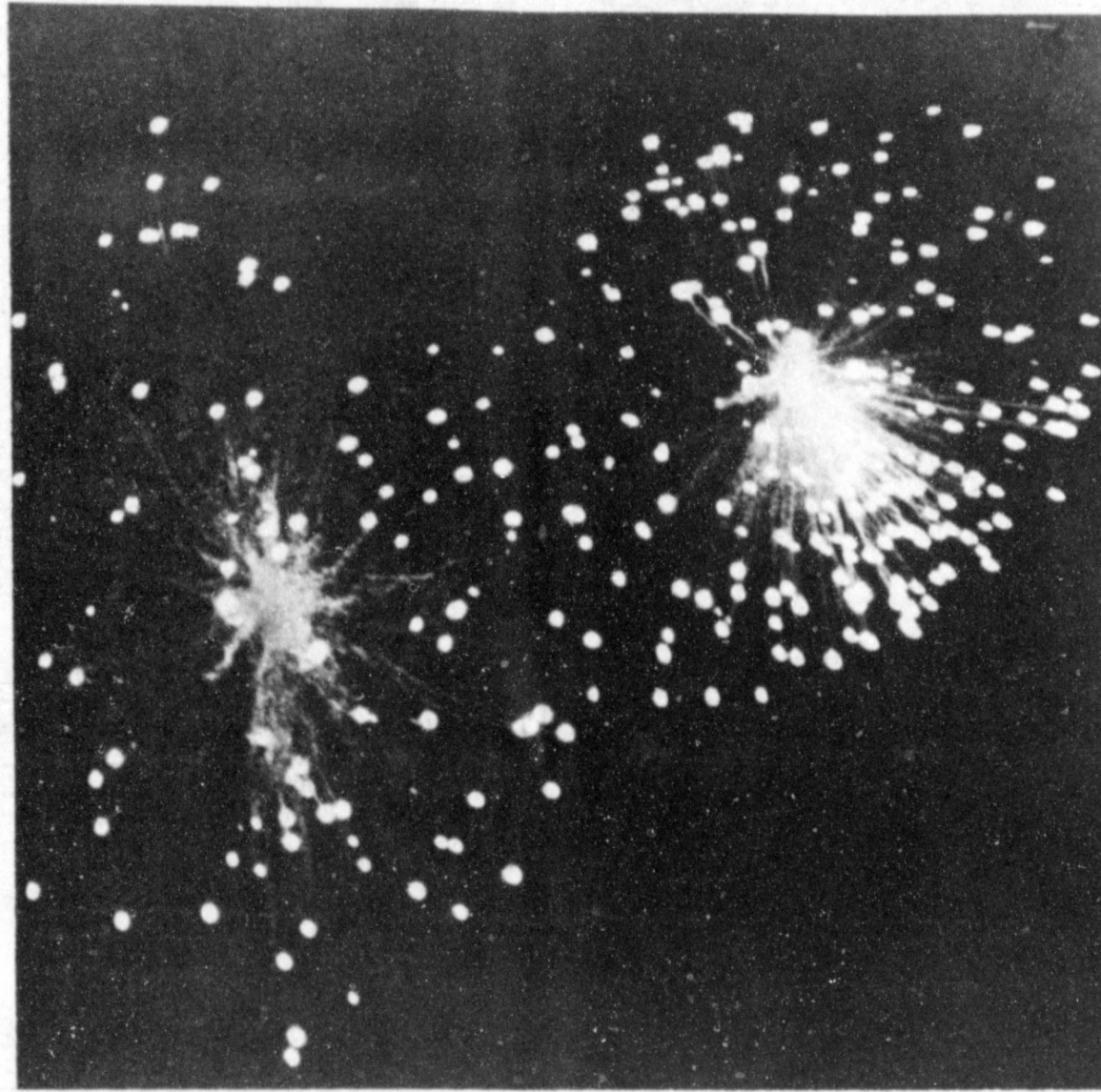

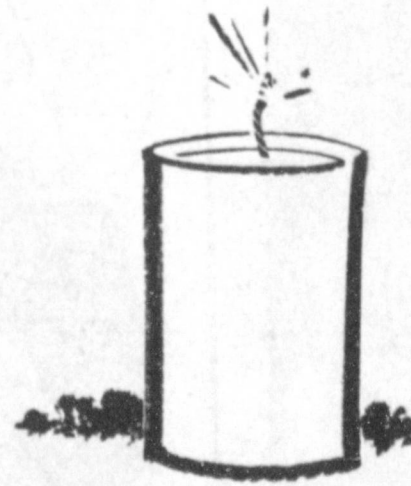
