to the United States. The smallest is the green-winged teal, averaging less than three-quarters of a pound in weight. The blue-winged teal and cinnamon teal are of comparable size, both larger than the greenwing, averaging about three-quarters of a pound each. Males are somewhat larger than the females.

It will be expected that a few greenwing and cinnamon teal will be found in the migrating flocks of bluewings though normally their main migration (especially the green-winged teal) is a month or so later than that of the bluewings.

THE FLIGHT CHARACTERISTICS OF TEAL: Teal fly with great speed (accentuated to the observer by their small size), usually in close flocks with much seemingly erratic twisting, turning and darting.

City Street Closed By De Shazo School

Following discussion of a written request from Muleshoe Independent School District Superintendent Neal Dillman, city council members voted Tuesday morning to close a street near Mary DeShazo Elementary School during school hours.

Dillman requested the street to be closed on Avenue C from the corner of Fourth and C to the alley east, for a distance of one-half block. The half block area is between the school and a playground across the street.

Also approved was a request from the superintendent to help the school pay the cost of black-topping the road between the swimming pool and tennis court. Cost to the city would be approximately \$933. Councilmen approved the request after deciding the newly paved street would be beneficial to the city as well as the school.

Tabled was a decision to become a member of the South Plains Region of Governments until after a meeting of the Governor's Conference on Urban and Community Affairs. The meeting will be held in Austin from September 7-9 and at least one of the Muleshoe City Councilmen will attend.

Coming under lengthy discussion was the Pro-Rata Ordinance as it will apply to the Country Club Addition for water and sewer service to residents in that particular area.

Other areas of discussion touched on the proposed dis-

patcher budget as approved by County Court. City councilmen voted to pay the city's 60-percent share on a monthly basis as the county is paying at this time; painting or marking parking zones around the schools and downtown crosswalks and the possibility of purchasing a new marking machine.

As the final item of the morning, the city council gave City Manager Albert Field the go-ahead signal to contact concrete contractors concerning concrete work to be done on West Avenue C, from Main Street to the alley on that street.

one to two inches; Bovina, very little rain, not over .6 to .7 West Camp, around one inch; Progress, from one and one-quarter to five inches; Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge, 4.7 inches and Earth, two to two and one-half inches.

On the first day of summer, June 21, the temperature soared to the 100 degree mark. From that time, there have been two days when the temperature dipped below the 90-degree mark. On July 8, it was 81 degrees and on July 28, the temperature was 89.

On the 28th of August the temperature was 84 and on August 27, the temperature was 80 degrees.

Turbulent weather accompanied the roving thunderstorms in some areas Sunday and Monday night. Tornadoes aloft were reported in the Anton area Saturday, two funnel clouds were reported Southeast of Clovis Monday night and possibly other funnel clouds, though unconfirmed were reported.

County Agent J.K. Adams said the rains will be potentially highly beneficial to area farmers as the thirsty dryland cotton and grain has soaked up the rain from the past few days.

THP Recorded Two Injuries During July

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Bailey County during the month of July, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,075.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first seven months of 1969 shows a total of 24 accidents resulting in no persons killed, nine persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$27,340.00.

The 1969 Texas Legislature has provided for a year-round Motor Vehicle Inspection program. Beginning September 1, 1969 the present 1969 inspection stickers will have a numeral insert corresponding to the month of issuance that will be inserted on the face of the sticker corresponding to the month of issuance. The sticker will be placed in the lower left-hand corner of the windshield.

All 1969 stickers bearing a numeral insert will expire at the end of the month a year from now, 1970. All 1969 stickers bearing no numeral insert will expire on April 15, 1970.

Beginning January 1, 1970, the inspection stickers issued will have an orange background and bear an insert numeral corresponding with the 1970 month of issuance and will expire at the end of the month one year from the month of issuance in 1971. The inspection sticker design will change in January of every year to a new base design.

The Legislature added two items to be inspected--the exhaust system and the exhaust emission system. The new inspection fee will be \$2.00.

Prowlers Roam Neighborhoods Within City

Prowlers, beware! Due to a high incidence of prowlers in residential neighborhoods recently, many people are becoming ever more cautious, perhaps too much so.

As a prowler is one of the hardest offenders to capture, and local officers are hard-pressed to catch them, many local citizens are going their own route in attempting to stop the situation.

In several areas of Muleshoe, guns are being loaded as prowler have been spotted constantly during the night hours.

One man, whose elderly mother lives close by his home, woke up Saturday night and saw a man attempting to get into the house where his widowed mother was asleep. Before he could get outside, the prowler made his escape. Several nights before that time, a woman next door started out the back door and a prowler near the back door ran. He was tracked down the alley to a paved street where the tracks were lost on pavement.

There have been other calls received by the police department from various areas of town concerning prowlers and "window peepers."

Officers are afraid that perhaps some innocent person will accidentally be injured by an alarmed citizen attempting to protect his home and family. They warn, if you have prowlers, call the police; do NOT fire a gun at a prowler outside your home and be very cautious because the person could be the boy next door on his way home from the movies.
