The efforts of the London county council to drive out the Cockney speech from the schools of the English metropolis hardly needed the opposition given in a book recently issued in defense of the dialect. This book, which is, curiously enough, the work of a man named Mackenzie MacBride, contends that Cockney is no modern dialect, but that it possesses an ancient and honorable lineage running back nearly 1,000 years. 



gent, director of the Arnold Arboretum, Boston, whose service in horticulture is generally recognized both in this country and abroad. His great work has been the introduction into this country of many desirable ornamental trees and shrubs and the test-

ing of their hardiness in this latitude. The George Robert White medal of honor will take rank with the Victoria medal of honor of England and the medal of the Legion of Honor of France, and will have a strong influence in promoting the horticultural

activities of the country. The medal itself was struck at the United States mint in Philadelphia, from 24-karat gold; is 2% inches in diameter, five-thirty-seconds of an inch thick, and weighs between seven

and eight ounces . On the face the figure symbolizes, not the ordinary horticulturist as much as the scientific intellect, whose alm is to improve nature, even to create, if that is possible. The trees in the background represent the allied branch of arboriculture. On the reverse, in the inscription, the name is so designed that it can be replaced by another name each time the medal is

The George Robert White medal was executed by Mr. John Flanagan, a native of Newark, N. J., and a student, first of Augustus St. Gaudens, later in Paris, at the Academy Julien, under Chapu, and the Atelier Falguiere, at the Ecole des Beaux Arts. During the course of these years of study Mr. Flanagan was awarded many coveted prizes, and acted as an assistant to MacMonnies on his fountain for the Chicago World's fair of 1893. Since then he has received commissions for many medals, portrait busts and other works, among the best known being the Brinton medal, the Langley memorial and the Hudson-Fulton and Pennsylvania society medals. Several of Mr. Flanagan's medals have been acquired by the Musee de Luxembourg, the Metropolitan Museum New York, and recently by the Muse um of Fine Arts at Ghent.

SCREENS AND POINT

Must Be Used in Thick Sand a Gravel Beds.

In Digging Wells for Irrigation Scree Should Not Be Ordered More Than Ten Feet in Length-Easier to Handle.

Screens or slotted points must used in sand or gravel beds, especia If the beds are thick ones. In thick beds two or more sections screen, one above the other, should Such screns are often made sections, so that they can be screw together on the spot. Complet screens are now regularly made by well point manufacturers in consid able lengths, reaching to 20 feet or full pipe length. The small size poin are made from standard wrought pip in which holes have been covered with brass wire cloth and pe forated brass jacket to protect cloth. The largest well point machin do not, as a rule, handle over 10-inc pipe. If larger than this, holes mu be drilled, which increases cost ra ldly. For convenience in handling shipping and placing, screens show not be ordered over ten feet in leng This length is preferred by the trace says the Pumps and Supplies.

If a single screen will not furnis water enough, or if the water bearing strata is not deep enough, two or me screen points may be sunk indepen ent of each other and far enough apar so that they will not interfere or ro one another. These screens may the be connected to a common suction pipe or arranged to drain into a con mon central well. Screen points, as rule, should never be less than tw thirds the diameter of the cylinde and for work of this character it is ways better if they are as large as cylinder; the more screne surface t morew ater will come through.

It has been found that the coarsest sand and gravel is frequently at the bottom of the water-bearing strat hence it is important that the scre point should reach into the bed of th coarse material. It is well understo that water flows more freely throu, the coarse sand and gravel and th the screen will not clog up. Then, too, deep driving protects the well against lowering of the water level by other wells in the immediate vicinity, or o the same vein some distance away. In river bottoms, where water-bearing sand is sometimes found 100 feet o more in thickness, it would not be necessary to put a screen point down to the bottom of the strata; but close attention should be given, however, in such case to the relative coarseness of the sand or gravel in which the screen point is lodged. Under no circum stances should it be set in anyth!

The top of the screen point in any case should be some distance below the water level. The water level will be, of course, the height to which the water rises in the well, but on being pumped this level may drop—it gen erally does so-hence it is necessar; to put the screen so low that it will be below the water line even when sur plying the greatest amount of water t can furnish. By keeping the screen sufficiently low, any danger from the admission of air will be avoided.

Properly Balanced Food.

Even silage from mature corn is no a properly balanced food, and clove or alfalfa hav and a little bran show be fed with it. Alfalfa hay is bette than clover to feed with corn silage. and with it it is possible to omit the bran. Alfalfa is a wonderful plant, and some one of the varieties will grow almost anywhere in the United States, while it is nearly drought proof. Every dairyman who has not done so already should try it in a small way; if he can make one acre a success he can then try a larger field. Corn is our other drought resisting crop, and if the moisture in the ground be conserved by about two Inches of loose fine dirt mulch, it is surprising how little rain is required to make a good crop. In times of drought and when the corn has grown too tall for the two-horse cultivator, a fine tooth single walking cultivator will go far toward irrigating the fields.

The Kieffer Pear.

Sixteen years ago we planted a kieffer hybrid pear tree. It begar to bear the third or fourth year and has borne some fruit every year since. If the first bloom got killed it would bloom again and bear fruit. There have been only two real heavy crops, one about six years ago and the other this year. Not counting the windfalls and the ones that dropped from the tree and got bruised I have gathered 22 bushels of marketable pears from the tree. After reserving 81/2 bushels for home use I have sold 131/2 bushels for \$12, says a writer in an exchange. The pears were sold right from the free without my having the trouble of taking them to market.



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



AYBE your boy isn't mentally constructed for trade or any of the so-called or-

or fame in mercantile or mechanical lines. If he is that kind of a lad, he may have any one of a number of special leanings. For instance, he might planist, or or an artist.

It is the last occupation (using "occupation" advisedly here) that shall be the subject of this little talk. If your boy has leanings toward painting or the higher forms of drawing-and by leanings means native ability, more than mere inclination-by all means encourage him; for there is a big future awaiting him out in the world, and he will not have to go through so many hardships as he might find in other lines of endeavor before he succeeds. There are plenty of illustrators and painters that make money, big money, and there is room for innumerable others on the same high plane.

However, out of all the millions that take up various lines of life work, probably a greater percentage fall by the wayside in art than in any other line not even excepting the stage. And all of this, or most of it, comes from the enthusiastic praises of relatives and friends for the foolish little drawings, natural to every boy and girl, which are mistaken for high artistic

Because your boy can make drawings that seem fairly good of houses and barns and cows, it means in itself poining more than that he might bedraw a good copyist ultimately and ly does not mean that he is an artist. But if he has imagination and original ideas and can get at the underlying reality, the point, of the thing he is triing to depict, and can push these ideas out through the end of his pen or pencil or brush, he has something in him worth cultivating, even if his drawing, his technique, is faulty.





How a boy who gives promise of artistic ability, not genius, may go about making a success as an artist. Remuneration and opportunities in various specialties.

AYBE your boy isn't mentally constructed for trade or any of the so-called ordinary occupations of life. and doesn't care anything and remunerative magazine illustraabout amassing a fortune

It is the last occupation (using "occupation" advisedly here) that shall be the subject of this little talk. If your boy has leanings toward painting or the higher forms of drawing-and by leanings means native ability, more than mere inclination-by all means encourage him; for there is a big future awaiting him out in the world, and he will not have to go through so he is included among the army of sucmany hardships as he might find in cessful illustrators, and will earn from other lines of endeavor before he succeeds. There are plenty of illustrators and painters that make money, big money, and there is room for innumerable others on the same high plane.

However, out of all the millions that take up various lines of life work, probably a greater percentage fall by the wayside in art than in any other line not even excepting the stage. And all of this, or most of it, comes from the enthusiastic praises of relatives and friends for the foolish little drawings, natural to every boy and girl, which are mistaken for high artistic

promise. Because your boy can make drawings that seem fairly good of houses and barns and cows, it means in itself

But if he has imagination and original in this work alone. ideas and can get at the underlying trawing, his technique, is faulty. Technique can be acquired; but he can and offer the possibility of working up stop scratching his head. After taking never learn to be original and to have imagination.

The art schools are crowded to the doors with students that mistook ability to draw for artistic instinct, and so great is this percentage that more than one well-known and sensible artist has declared that it would be a vast benefit to the people at large if every one of these institutions was transformed into a school of craftsmanship; for the dormant artist will find a way to make himself known, even if there is not a single school to go to.

These remarks are not made to discourage you, nor to hinder your boy if he is an artist in embryo. These observations are only to encourage cau-

But, taking it for granted that your boy has imagination and originalitynot genius or rare talent, but only the average, ordinary degree-he will have shown it long before he is sixteen, as the walls and barn doors and fences and school books and teachers' comments will have made manifest. At that age he can go to art school if he wishes; that is, if you are able to pay his expenses. These will not necesearily be any more than his cost of living; for there are numerous institutions provided with funds giving free tuition to deserving young aspirants.

But if you cannot afford to send him to school, and he must go to work, don't make the mistake of putting him at some trade on the false idea that he can make more money; for he can probably earn as much in the beginning at an occupation in keeping with his ambition, and he will have the greater reward as he advances.


