## SPLIT-LOG DRA

The split-log drag plays an important part in counties that have good roads. Building highing them is another.
Of recent years La Salle county has given considerable attention to building good roads, and at the present date there is over one hundred miles of graded roads in the county, but we fear not enough attention is being given to maintaining these roads, which necessarily must be done, or the time will come when all the work will amount
to nothing. We do not believe we err when we do not believe we err when we state that is using no split county is using and this im drags at this time, and this im plement has been demonstrate
to be the most economical in road maintainance. A drag can be made for $\$ 5$ and operated at a cost of $\$ 6$ per day, according to reports of various road supervisors over the state.
In a report recently compiled by the Texas Commercial Sec retaries there are at present 5 counties in Texas using 656 of these drags, but in the list there are only four counties in Southwest Texas, Bexar, Cameron, Webb and Val Verde. Webb has 2; Val Verde 3; Cameron 24; and Bexar 20. The drags are used about two days after a
