GENERAL RAIN COVERS WIDE AREA.

Falls Slowly and is Kind that Does Good -- Continues Cloudy and Misting.

Thursday and Thursday night rain fell in Texas from the Red River to the Rio Grande. In the Northern portions of the state wind did considerable damage, but in Southwest Texas there was no wind, only rain, and it fell gently, Mother earth absorbing all of it.


The precipitation began at Cotulla about dark Thursday. At midnight an electrical storm broke, and quiet a heavy shower fell. Up to seven oclock Friday morning the fall had amounted to .89 of an inch. Cloudy misty weather continued all yesterday and last night bringing the fall up to 1.02 up to 7 o'clock this morning. The rain is worth many thousands to the onion growers. as it will be better than an irrigation. Ranchmen are delighted with the outlook, and and planting of cotton and forage crops on the dry land farms will be resumed as soon as the ground dries out sufficient.

It will unquestionably reaffirm substantially the plank of the last platform which declared for a tariff equalizing the difference in the cost of pro duction at home and abroad plus a rea sonable profit for American manufac turers.
