## Football Contest

Ron Rowan of Hereford knocked local contestants out of the weekly 'Back the Mules' football contest by taking the first place honors for the past week.

He missed the Southern Cal-Notre Dame tie, Boston College vs. Villanova, Ohio U. vs. Miami (Ohio) and West Texas vs. Colorado State, and guessed the Lazbuddie-Amherst score at 27-6. With the actual score on the tiebreaker being 20-7, he was eight points off on the tiebreaker score.

Close behind Rowan, and winning second place, was Mrs. E.E. Engelking of Route Three, Muleshoe. Mrs. Engelking missed the Texas Tech-Mississippi State game, the Southern Cal-Notre Dame tie, Tennessee-Alabama and West Texas-Colorado State. However, Mrs. Engelking missed out on the tie breaker score. She had guessed the Lazbuddie-Amherst score as 24-12, thus she was nine points off on the tie breaker.

Jim Small missed four games and was 15 points off on the tie-breaker; George Washington also missed four games, and was 16 points off on the tie-breaker and Paul Wilbanks, who won the contest previously this year also missed four games, but was 23 points off on the tie-breaker score.

Twenty-one persons missed five games; 24 entries were off six games; 20 contestants guessed wrong on seven games; five missed out on eight games and one person missed nine games during the past week. This week was a rough week on football fans as evidenced by the change in scoring. During the first few weeks of the annual contest, most people found the contest relatively simple.

Things have changed however, halfway through the season, leads are switching with many upsets each week. Predictions do not necessarily show the true picture and guesses are strictly a matter of chance.

This week, Muleshoe resumes play after an open date last Friday. They will travel to Dumas, which incidentally will be homecoming night for the Dumas Demons.

## County Estimates Varied by Ginners

### North Loss Slight; South Bailey County Hit Heavy

"Countywide, it looks like an average of 25 percent damage in production loss with a possible 35 percent reduction in income due to production loss and quality loss on cotton," said Bailey County Agent J.K. Adams.

He was speaking about the early October 13 freeze which saw temperatures skid downward to the lower 20s within a few hours. Adams had predicted a possible 70,000 bales of cotton due for harvest this fall. He revised his original estimate with a reduction of 17,500 bales countywide, Adams stated, "Now I figure the reduction will be 20 percent over the county, in my estimate, compared to a normal freeze date two weeks later, which would be around October 27 or 28."

Bailey County, along with a wide area, got an additional blow to the cotton crop when heavy rains inundated the area Monday night and Tuesday. More than two inches of rain had fallen by noon Tuesday and leaden skies threatened to dump more unneeded moisture on cotton.

Adams said "Quality cannot go anywhere but down once the cotton boll has opened. Quality will go down much faster in weather like we have at mid-week."

"The classing office will adequately take care of the quality decision on cotton. Micronaire readings are accurate, so there will be no guesses as to the quality figure."

Spot checks with ginners over the area range from a 20 percent estimated loss in production to more than 60 percent in Southern Bailey County.

Where the June 13 rains wiped out young cotton in the southern areas of the county, the replanted cotton, which did not have time to mature before the premature freeze, was damaged heavily.

In Muleshoe, Earl Richards of Muleshoe Co-op Gin commented, "I figure a 20 percent reduction on the cotton we will gin this fall."

said, "Because of the early freeze, we figure we will gin approximately 50 percent of what we ginned last year. Earlier, in fact, just a week before the freeze, we had upped our estimate because of increased acreage allotments. The freeze wiped out the figures and dropped them sharply."

At Needmore, Dale Newsom of Needmore Co-op Gin stated, "We will have a 50 percent reduction in bales due to the hail loss, late crops and early freeze. Our estimate is an average of 25 percent loss countywide."

Benny Claunch at Claunch Gin, Bula, emphasized, "In our own area we have an 80 percent loss of all cotton. This is because most of the cotton down here is late cotton. We were mostly hailed out in June. A conservative estimate would be above 60 percent of what we would have had without the early freeze."

Another Bula ginner, Paul Young of Young Bros. Gin commented, "I sure did hurt us down here. We had a lot of young cotton. Our older cotton is hurt and our estimate is 50 percent of the cotton was lost in the October 13 freeze."

Mrs. Elmer Lee at the Nickels Gin in Goodland said, "Most of the cotton around here is gone. Damage because of the early freeze will run 50 percent or higher."

Mrs. Sherman Sweatman at the Progress Gin predicted a "20 to 30 percent loss on cotton production this fall."

At Baileyboro, Ray Wills, Bailey County Gin stated, "Here we figure at least a 25 percent loss in cotton production. The freeze hurt us, but not quite as bad as it did some of the others."

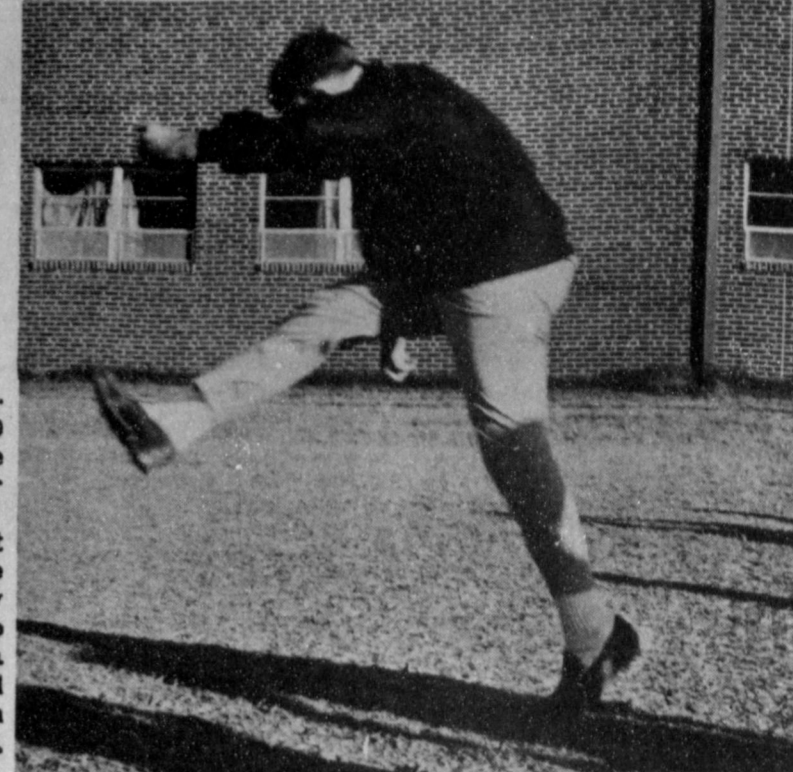
Buck Raggsdale at the Stegall Gin added, "At least 75 percent of the cotton around here was hailed out in June. With the damage to young cotton, we figure a 40 percent loss in production this fall."

A brighter picture is shown in the Lazbuddie area with James Mabry of the North Lazbuddie Gin who said, "We figure a 25 percent loss in the number of bales this year. We weren't hit as hard by the freeze as some of the area."

O.C. McBride of McBride Gin at Lazbuddie predicted only a 20 percent loss in production in his area. He said little of the cotton was young enough to be badly hurt in that area.

Taking all the ginners' figures, and breaking them down into an estimate of overall loss, the cotton production loss could run slightly above 30 percent over the entire county and area.

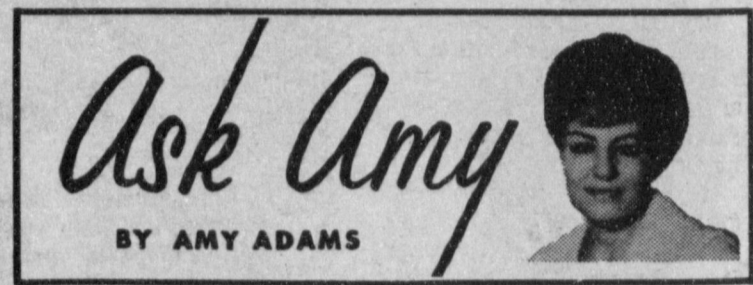

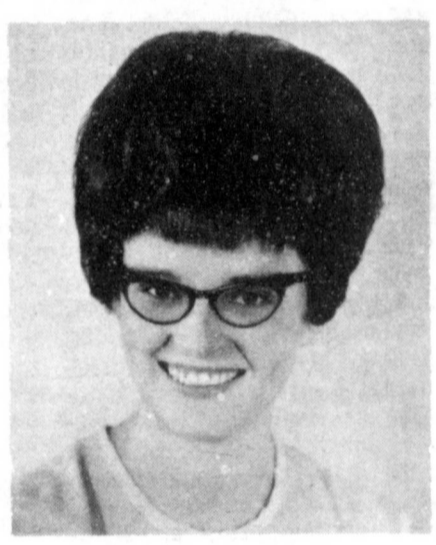

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Texas--More than 100 'fraternal organizations' are being requested by Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. to swear that they are in fact fraternal organizations and not just 'private clubs'.

He says applications are coming in from 'fraternities' that evidently are 'private clubs' and if they are approved it will make a mockery of the five cent tax per drink requirement set by the Legislature on private clubs.

Texas Law provides that fraternal organizations are exempt from franchise taxes.

Among the 'fraternal organizations' presently being asked to confirm their status are the Benevolent Order of the Impala of Texas, Club L'Amour Fraternal Association, Inc., the Fraternal Order of Moon Maidens, The Fraternal Order of Dart Players and the Fraternal Order for the Preservation and Resurrection of Burlesque.

If an organization refuses to answer the questionnaire within 30 days, it faces dissolution. Answering the questions falsely means possible perjury charges.

WELFARE BENEFITS -- According to Welfare Commissioner Burton Hackney, 509 Texas families may be affected

by a San Antonio Federal court ruling requiring the State Department of Public Welfare to pay retroactive welfare benefits not paid since March under the now defunct one-year residency requirement.

Hackney said that if the department had to pay off all the back benefits, it would average about \$75 a recipient per month for that six month period. And, if all applicants on the list were qualified, this would exceed \$250,000. However, he stressed that some of the applicants would be disqualified for other reasons. He said no appeal of the decision was being planned.

Also, Hackney has asked the Texas Medical Association to help his department settle questions of 'misuse' or 'overutilization' of Medicaid Services and benefits.

USED CAR WARNING--Texas automobile buyers have been warned against purchasing so-called 'bargain' autos now being offered for sale in South and East Texas.

H.C. Pittman, executive vice-president of the Texas Automobile Dealers Association, says many of these cars were 'severely damaged by salt water submergence during the frightful ravages of Hurricane Camille in Mississippi and

neighboring states" in August. "This same sort of fraud on the car-buying public occurs following almost every hurricane in the Gulf Coast area," he pointed out, urging used car buyers to check the bill of sale to determine the origin of the vehicles.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES--An employee of a county or hospital district does not have to be a resident of the county, the district, or even the state, says Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin, in a new opinion.

In other recent expressions Martin held that:

Condemnor in a condemnation case should pay the initial court-cost-deposit when objections are filed by either party to a special commission award. He may recover if the county court judgment is for the same or a lesser amount of damages than offered before proceedings commenced.

Valley cable TV company which sponsors a bingo-type game over its facilities is not engaged in a forbidden lottery.

Changes in an individual holding of a wine and beer "on premise" license must be reflected on the license or permit, showing name and photograph.

COURTS SPEAK--A Supreme Court hearing has been set for November 26 on Mobil Oil Corporation's suit to get back \$386,893 in gas production taxes paid under protest since 1966.

Same court has held that Wilson Radio Dispatch, with offices in McAllen, Brownsville, Harlingen and Rincon Camp, owes the state more than \$10,000 in back taxes from its car-telephone service.

A decision by the Corpus Christi board of adjustment to allow radio station KCCT to build a transmitter in a residential area was upheld by the high court.

5th-ranked Missouri will take another step toward a possible Big Eight Conference title, whipping Colorado by 12 points. Oklahoma, rated 12th, will just nip 20th-ranked Kansas State by five points.

The strong co-leaders in the Southwest Conference, Texas and 6th-ranked Arkansas, will continue to roll along. Texas will bomb Rice by 38, and Arkansas will scramble Wichita by 45 points in a non-conference game.

U.C.L.A. and 17th-ranked Stanford grab the headlines in the Pacific Coast Conference. The Uclans will be trying to

## McNatts Enjoy European Sights

"There just wasn't anything we did that we didn't enjoy," said the Ernest McNatts of their three week trip to Europe. Pressed a little further, McNatt said, "Well, I'm a farmer and I was interested in seeing how they farmed over there."

Mrs. McNatt seemed impressed with how much like us the European people are rather than that they are "strange foreigners". They are just not so different." She said, "When I got home, that map did not look as large as when I went over."

They came home with lots of slides, lots of memories and a keen desire to do a lot of reading about the places they had been in order to gain a better understanding of the people and their country.

The real purpose of the trip, which they took alone, was to see their son, Wayne, whom they had not seen in nearly two years. Wayne and his wife, Sharon, live at Weisbaden, Germany where he is stationed with the U.S. Air Force at Lindsey Air Base. Wayne has recently been transferred from Accounting and Finance to a place of more responsibility in Budget Control under Directorate of Budget. His wife, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Tiller of Needmore, is a secretary in a division of Headquarters, USAF of Europe. They are both graduates of Muleshoe high school, have been in Weisbaden more than two years and have about fifteen months more in service before they can return home. Although they like the assignment, they are very anxious for his time to be up.

The McNatts still find it hard to realize that from Lubbock to London was a thirteen hour trip, including a 1 1/2 hour stopover at Dallas and another 1 1/2 hour stopover at Chicago.

They only stayed one day in London, where they took bus tours and saw Big Ben, Piccadilly Circus, No. 10 Downing Street, and Trafalgar Square which was packed with hippies. In the Tower of London they saw the magnificent crown jewels which are heavily guarded (they were amused at the confiscated film hanging nearby-they got the message). Riding the "tube" was an eerie experience.

The traffic in London, and all over Europe, was just hard to believe. They thought every minute they would witness a wreck, and trips in taxis were hair raising. Even the people are packed in small spaces there. One Los Angeles man they met said traffic in L.A. was "not like this".

From London they went to Weisbaden where they were met by Wayne and Sharon. They spent several days with them and took a trip by car down the Rhine River through some of the most beautiful country they saw. McNatt particularly enjoyed seeing the vineyards on the steep mountainsides, with the roads running straight up and down.

They left their children in Weisbaden and took a very fast and very quiet train to Amsterdam, a city with sixty miles of canals and an estimated 1 1/2 bicycles for each two persons. Amsterdam had almost as many hippies as London, they thought. Trolley rides, all leaving from a central station, were most enjoyable. They saw only a few old windmills, left for tourists' images, they felt, and were impressed by the ditches necessary there to drain water off rather than for irrigation as needed at home. Both particularly enjoyed a model toy-town called Modoradam, built like a sunken garden for a tourist attraction.

Leaving Amsterdam, they returned to Weisbaden for a few days and then took a seven day bus tour into Italy, with guide. The entire group were servicemen and their wives, plus four parents belonging to them. The beauty of the Austrian Alps and the ski resorts is something they will long remember.

"The Dolomites", part of the Alps where "dolomite" shows were remarkable, they thought. They passed the lake, north of Venice, where in 1963 a landslide into the lake buried a city and killed 3,000 people. The lake was almost filled with the mountain slide.

Going into Venice they saw what is called the largest car parking lot in the world. In the city itself there are no cars, only the miles and miles of canals.

St. Mark's Cathedral, with its many art treasures was much appreciated and they spoke of the cathedral sinking into the sea, with noticeable different levels of the floor. The statues of men standing by the large clock to strike the hour were amusing to them.

A glass factory was on their tour agenda. They watched a piece of the world famous Venetian glass being blown and said "it looked so easy".

were seen, both to art works and to manuscripts.

In Florence they enjoyed Michelangelo's works, particularly "David", and toured a leather factory. They saw the Leaning Tower of Pisa and said "It really leans".

Like other Muleshoe travelers, they felt fortunate to be in Rome on one of the rare days when the Pope made an appearance in St. Peter's square, a part of the Vatican.

St. Peter's Church is the largest in the world, and is built in the shape of a Cross. They, of course, toured the Sistene Chapel, and delighted to see Michelangelo's art on ceiling and walls.

The ruins, the Coliseum and others, and the excavations intrigued them. They felt their guide "made the difference" and especially enjoyed the three days and three nights spent in Rome.

While there they toured the Isle of Capri on a chartered boat and were surprised to see no beaches, no places to swim, only cliffs.

The ancient city of Pompei, which was covered by an eruption of Mt. Vesuvius on 79 A.D. was so interesting to them. Mrs. McNatt said it was buried about 1700 years before excavation started and is about two thirds finished now. Carriage ruts in the cobblestone pavement could clearly be seen.

Just for fun, Mrs. McNatt brought home one of Italy's hard rolls (and it was HARD). She told of one morning when they left their hotel at four in the morning for a tour and since breakfast is furnished in all European hotels (European plan) they were each given three of the hard, hard rolls and a hard boiled egg.

They thought European food good but prefer American. A bottle of wine is always set on the table at restaurants and must be paid for whether or not it is ordered. Cokes are from 20 1/2 to 20¢.

In Milan they saw Leonardo's painting of The Last Supper in the Church of Santa Maria. Milan was a very modern city and the people nicely dressed, which was not true other places.

Returning to Weisbaden they drove on the bus through Sweden, where roads were so sharp and hairpin curves so sharp the bus driver sometimes had to make two tries to get around them. Tunnels are everywhere and one they drove through was five miles long. Many waterfalls were seen, some that looked to be 1000 feet high.

The little principality of Lichtenstein was so beautiful. Here, and in Sweden, they saw many houses with shingles like rock.

The McNatts only spent 24 hours in Paris. They took a bus tour to see the Eiffel Tower, Arch of Triumph and other "must sees". Here they were surprised to observe the girls' dresses not as short as elsewhere.

A seeming contradiction all over Europe was the lack of screens, the few insects and the sidewalk cafes. There were few single family dwellings. Even the farm homes seemed to build in groups and in Holland the cows were kept in part of the farm homes.

Only men waiters were seen in the restaurants, and they

were so careful never to make patrons feel rushed.

In Italy a common sight was a team of big white oxen pulling implements, with an occasional tractor seen. Women pitching hay was commonplace ("perhaps so the men could work in the cafes," they said.

McNatt was amused, when passing through a farming section, at their guide telling them they could sleep until something interesting came in sight. He said Italians raise three crops of vegetables a year and seem to depend on rainfall. "They know how to work that land", McNatt said.

Although they were travel weary when they returned, the sights they had absorbed were reflected in the tone of their voice and the glints in their eyes as the McNatts recounted their travels. THEY LOVED IT.

### From Congressman

#### BOB PRICE

Panhandle Congressman Bob Price joined a bipartisan group of Representatives introducing a bill to control pornography sent through the mails. The bill would prohibit the use of the U.S. Mails to send sexually provocative materials to anyone unless the occupant, in writing, specifically requested the materials from the sender. It also would prohibit the mailing of such materials to minors residing in those states which already have laws prohibiting the mail circulation of obscene materials to the young.

The Texas Republican stated that the bill has grown out of the increasing nationwide concern over the extensive flow of pornographic and obscene materials through the mails. Price said, "I have received many telephone calls, letters, and telegrams from concerned individuals in the Texas Panhandle and throughout the State on this matter."

Price declared, "In this Congress, I have already introduced legislation designed to stop and control pornography. I think that this bill closes the legal door even further."

The U.S. Post Office Department estimates that more than \$500 million worth of obscene material is sold to young people through the mail each year. J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, warned more than a year ago:

"The publication and sale of obscene material is big business in America today...It is impossible to estimate the amount of harm to impressionable teenagers and to assess the volume of sex crimes attributable to pornography, but it influence is extensive."

FBI statistics show that sexual violence is increasing at an alarming pace, and Mr. Hoover states that pornography in all its forms is a major cause of sex crimes, aberrations, and perversions.

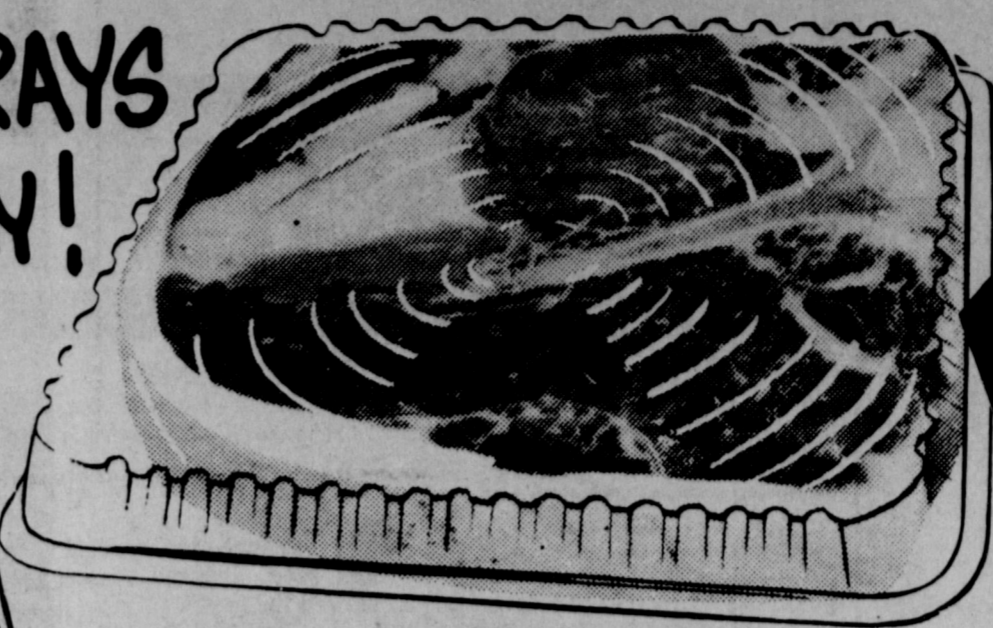
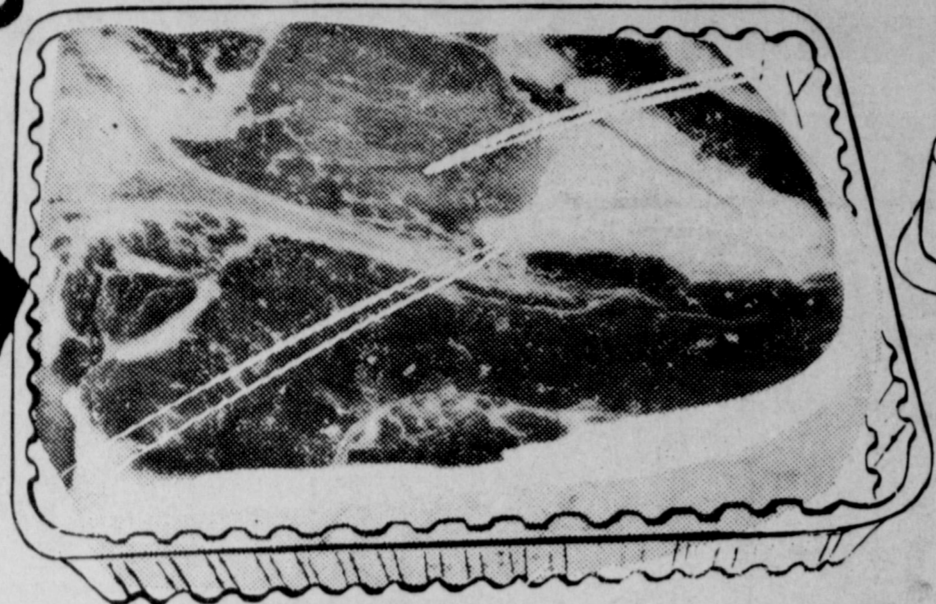
