Quail Season

November 8 Pat Donnelley, game warden stationed at Littlefield, told the Journal that 'as far as he knows' quail season will open on November 8 and be open to January

The Lamb County season will be open from December 1 to January 16. A special meeting was held recently and Lamb County residents decided on a shorter season.

Donnelley said bag limit will be 12 quail per day or 36 in possession.

Shooting hours are from onehalf hour before sunrise to onehalf hour before sunset.

He said the pheasant season will be open from December

Bag limit will be two cocks per day and four in possession after the first day.

He also said the head and feet must remain attached to the pheasant.



When our output exceeds our income the upshot may

Our President has declared his intention to curtail extravagance--but, in foreign aid for example, spending decisions are being made by third-and fourth-echelon

During fiscal 1970, you will still be "foreign aiding" 99 nations and 5 territories.

You are financing 4,408 projects and subprojects cattered all over the world.

Many similar projects in the United States were closed down in fiscal 1969 for lack of funds--but not a single foreign-aid project was reduced by as much as \$1. Many members of Congress were spared criticism during their summer vacation. Many, traveling abroad, were flattered and wined and dined by State Department personnel, each eager to perpetuate his share of the big handout.

Senators and congressmen who did visit their own constituencies found homefolks mollified by President Nixon's good intentions and thus less inclined to criticize.

The fact that President Nixon has asked a lesser appropriation than heretofore for foreign aid has obscured the fact that -- with no new money appropriated -- there'd still be almost \$19 billion in the pipelines headed that-

And new budget requests now before the Congress would add an additional \$11 billion.

Louisiana's Rep. Otto Passman, chairman of the foreign operations subcommittee on appropriations, recognizes the magnitude and effect of this continuing dollar drain. You and I see and feel the effects of federal extravagance

in cheaper dollars, higher prices. Congressman Passman sees our nation threatened with

Already the United States is borrowing money from 30 foreign nations. Example, Thailand. And you'd better sit down for this: We have sent Thailand more than a billion dollars in foreign aid of one sort or another. While we were thus aiding Thailand, that country created for itself a surplus of more than \$1 billion.

Now Uncle Sam is in a bind, needs help. Thailand, after much diplomatic wrangling, finally agreed to loan us \$100 million--for 4 1/2 years at 6%.

I know that figures are not very entertaining. A wife doesn't like to listen when a husband reads off the check stubs and a husband resents hearing about household bills. Yet the responsible administration of our affairs requires an awareness of these economic facts of life. however unpleasant.

You see, short-term dollar claims against the United States now total \$35,67 billion. Short-term IOU's due now. If we should be called upon to pay what we owe, we couldn't.



Texas-- A new 50-member governor's committee has launched an historic effort to improve relations among Texas ethnic and racial groups.

Governor Preston Smith called on Governor's Committee on Human Relations at its initial meeting last week to document the problem of discrimination "warts and all" and recommend a solution.

Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. of Lufkin is chairman of widely-representative panel. which includes whites, blacks and Mexican-Americans and a diverse economic cross-section. Former Secretary of State Roy Barrera of San Antonio was named vice chairman and Mrs. M.J. Anderson of Austion, secretary,

"Racial blindness and intolerance in state government. local government, private industry and business and in every other place in which people come in contact with people must be overcome." Smith told the Committee. "Human realtions problems do exist in Texas. That is why

this committee is necessary." Smith pledged "any reasonable step" to help bring about "real and measurable improvements," and he called on all state agencies to "re-examine their employment practices, with a view to this worthy end."

Governor identified as obvious problem areas education. housing, employment, administration of justice, public facilities and services and consumer protection. Special subcommittees will be set up in most of these categories to begin study and investigation
