First Snow Hit Muleshoe Saturday

Large floating snowflakes hit the Muleshoe area around 7 p.m. Saturday night in a sneak attack.

With no snow predicted, area residents were unprepared for the first snowfall of the season. The quarter size flakes silently fell for more than two hours, melting for the most part as it hit the ground. Within a short time, snow had piled up on vehicles which were parked. A depth of more than three inches was noted in places during the silent deluge.


