Last week, on Monday, the new city hall opened its doors for their first day of business in the new facility. Thursday, the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce moved into its offices in the city hall and on Friday, the Bailey County Sheriff's office, the Muleshoe City Police Department, Texas Department of Public Safety Driver's License Division, two Texas Highway Patrolmen and Justice of the Peace Joe D. Vaughn moved into the new Bailey County Law Enforcement Center.

Friday at 5 p.m., the doors officially opened in the new law center operation. This week, work continues in the new building with straightening and re-arranging well underway.

The law enforcement center was one of several projects authorized by Bailey County voters on September 10, 1968.

A bond issue passed in the amount of \$175,000 to build the new center.

Following several weeks of intensive campaigning on behalf of the new facility, it passed overwhelmingly at the polls on September 10.

On January 13, the Bailey County Commissioners Court opened bids and accepted a \$121,485 negotiated bid from Lampe Construction Co. of Lubbock. Within a few days, preliminary work began for the construction which is located on the northwest corner of the courthouse square.

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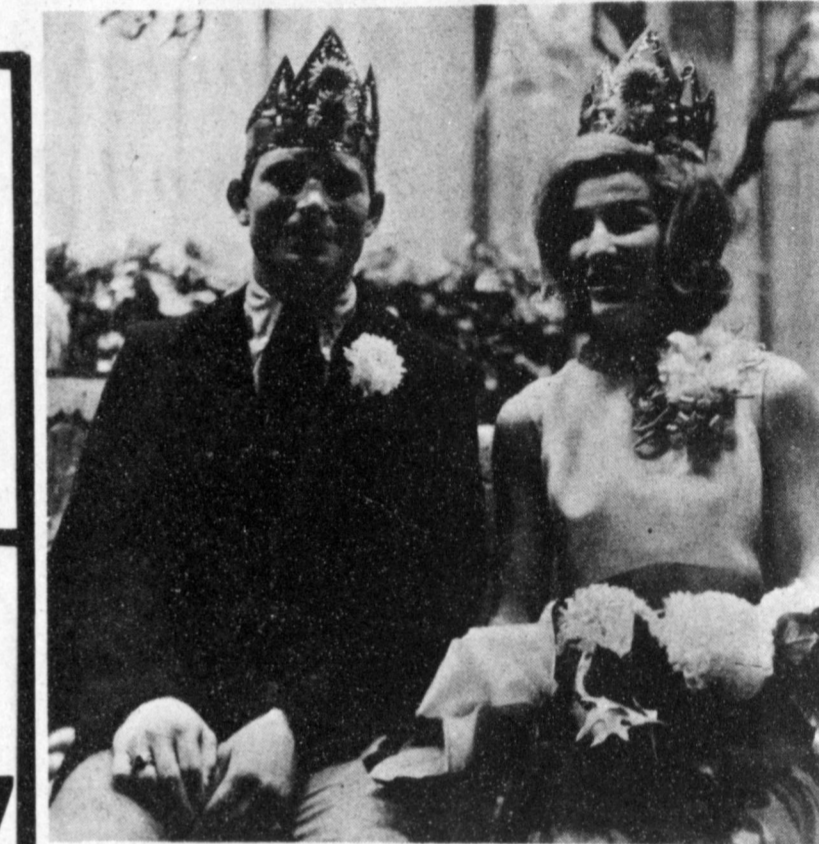

and the basement dug, Lampe moved in for the basic construction of the building. Work continued through the spring and summer on the building, which was well supervised by various members of the law enforcement media of the area.

A planned dedication during the Fourth of July Celebration had to be postponed as part of the steel jail structure did not arrive. Disappointed officers waited until Halloween night, October 31 to open the new center.

All day Friday, work was going on, with everyone who came into reach being utilized to move furniture and records.

The ground floor of the new structure has 4,000 square feet. On the right of the building as you go in the front door are two offices for the Bailey County Sheriff's office and an office for Justice of the Peace Joe D. Vaughn. On the left are two offices for the Muleshoe City Police Department and the driver's license division of the Texas Highway Patrol. Immediately in front of the door is the radio and information center of the building. At the rear is the completely modern jail. There are also record file rooms and a 'mug' room.

In the basement, the two local Texas Highway Patrolmen have an office, there is a kitchen, two jury rooms and a civil defense center. Storage and equipment rooms are also incorporated in the 2,000 square foot basement.

With the move from the courthouse by law officers, the Bailey County Agent and Home Demonstration Agent have moved into vacated offices. Vic Benedict purchased the former Chamber of Commerce office and is opening an insurance office at that location and the Bailey County Volunteer Fire Department is presently moving into the former City Hall and City Police Department.

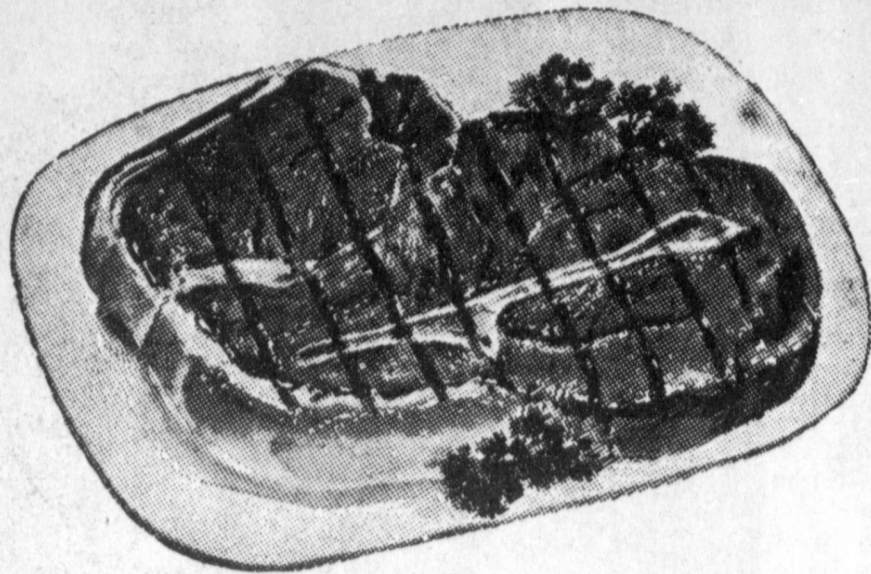

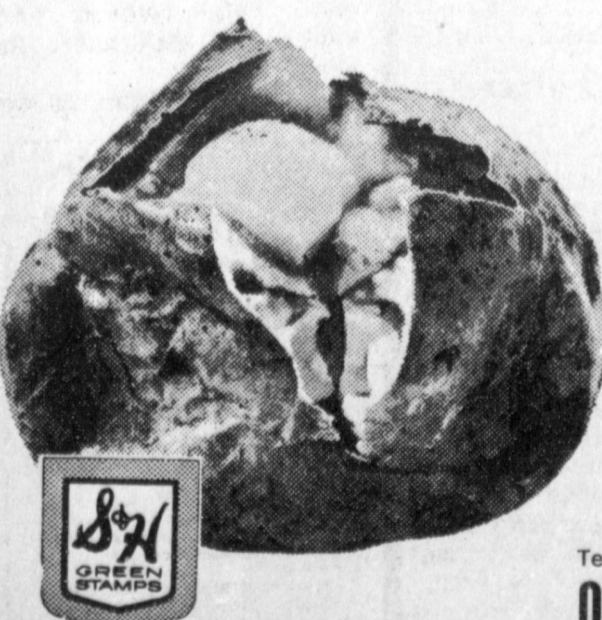

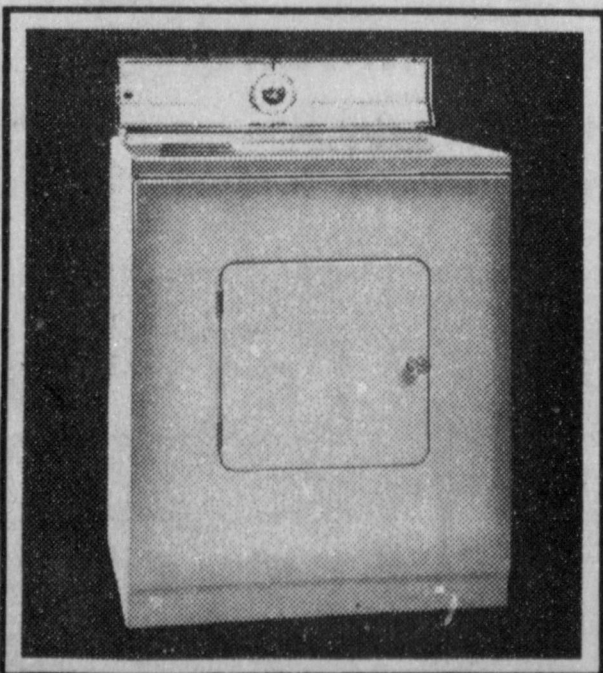

Twin Sons Born To Clements

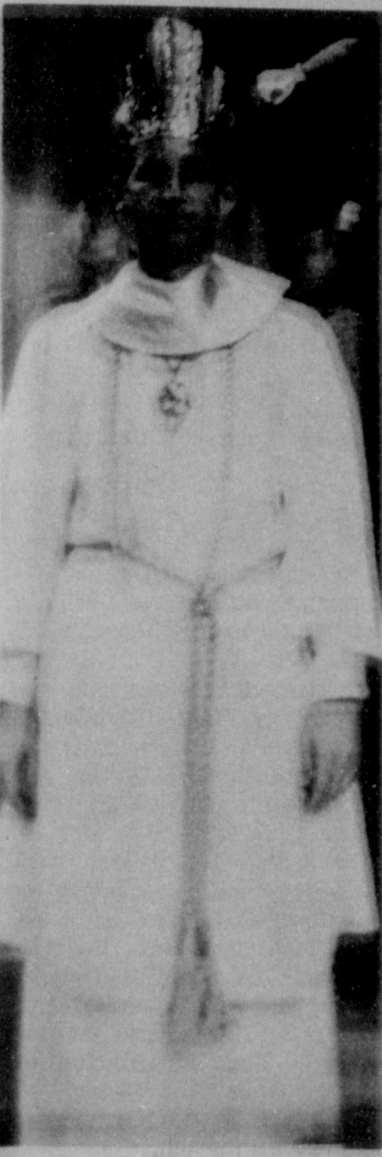

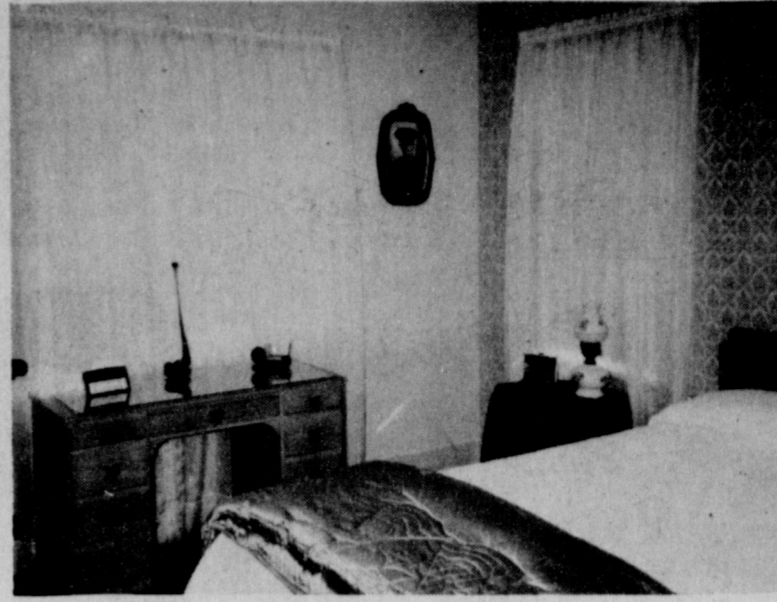

Chairmen for the parade said the Muleshoe Junior High School Marching Band, under direction of Bandmaster Bob Badger, did an outstanding job leading off the parade.

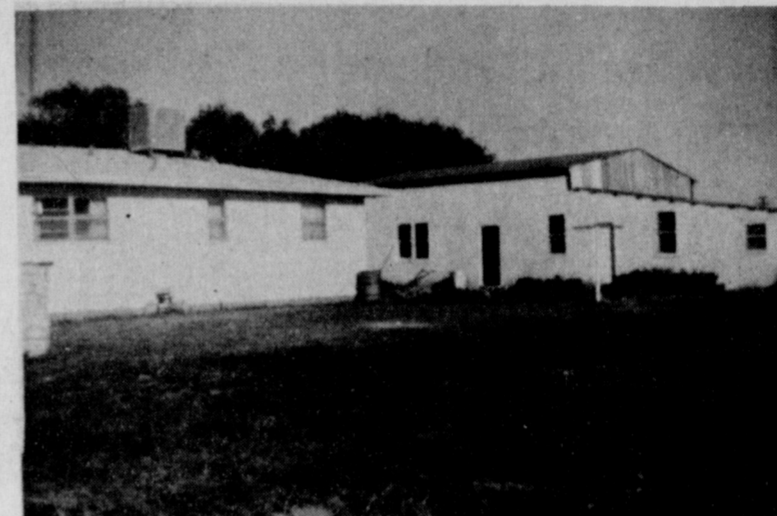

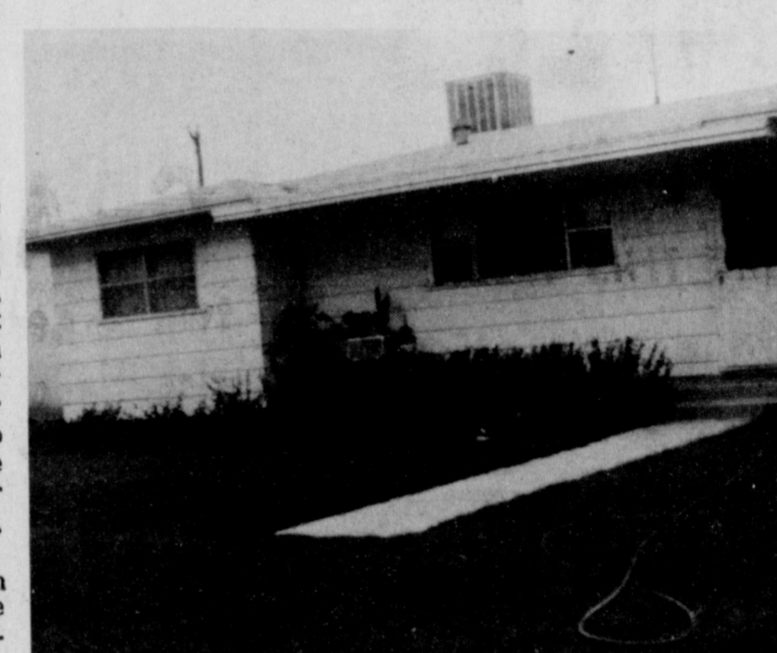

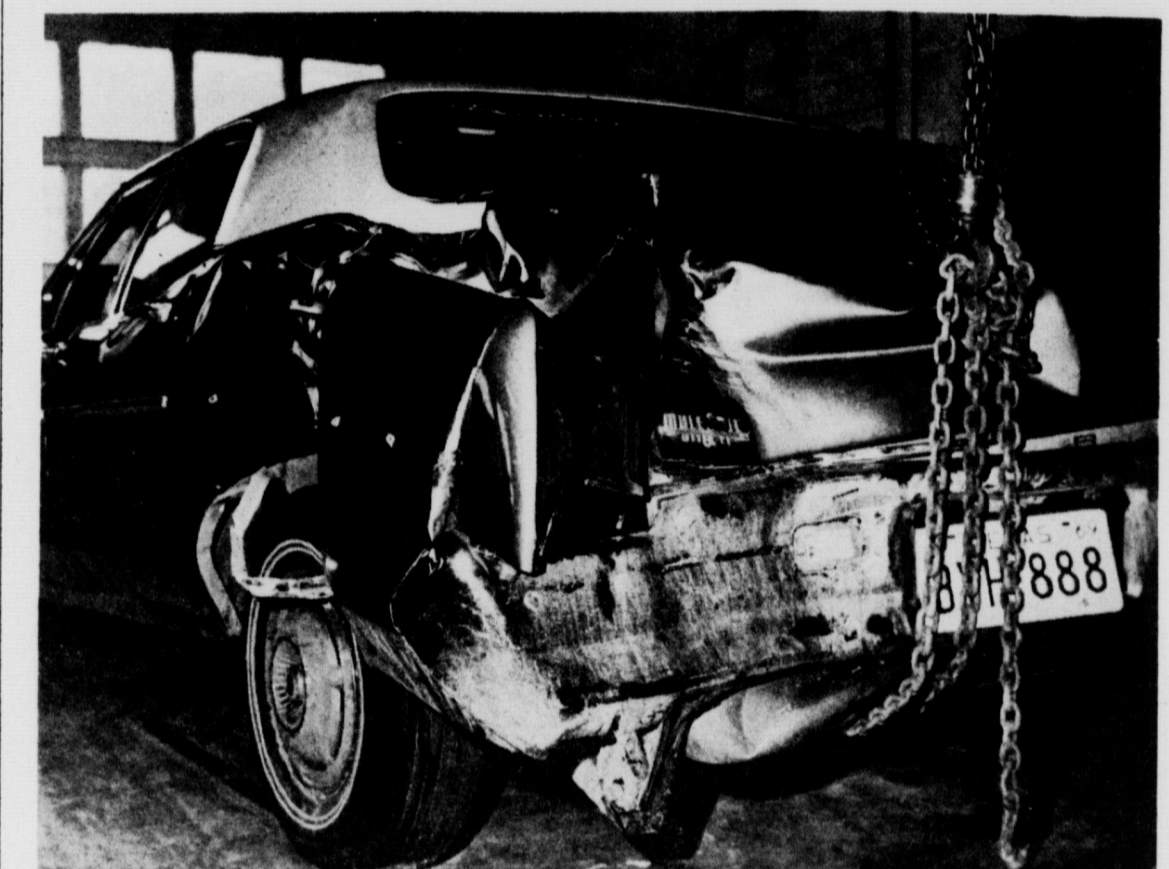

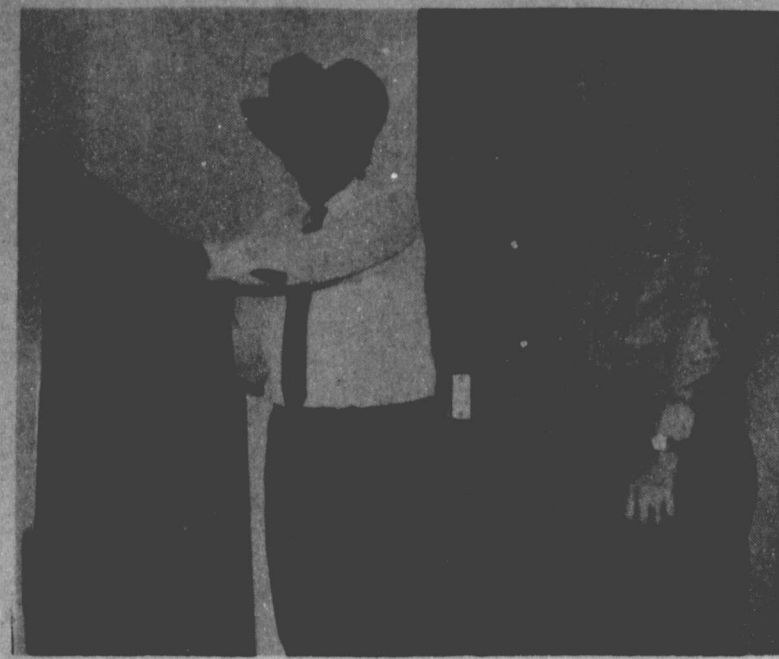
