but one way to put it down and that by stock subseription. There is almost unanimous sentiment for a bond issue to install waterworks system, but as our valuations in corporate limits aggregate only about $\$ 600,000$ we cannot issue bonds to ex ceed $\$ 15,000$. This amount would leave only abou $\$ 5,000$, after putting the well down. Some fave issuing bonds for putting down the well and after the water is secured make other arrangements for piping the town; many do not favor this and we
