



3,602 KILLED IN YEAR JAPAN SAYS

Federal Bureau Issues Report on Fatalities in Mines and Quarries.

Washington, May 20 .- Accidents in quarries, coal mines and metal mines of the United States during

1911 resulted in loss of life to 3,602 men out of the 1,005,281 men em-ployed. The bureau of mines, which since its establishment has endeavor-ed to promote safety and efficiency in the mines and quarries of the country, has just issued its first summary of quarry accidents. It shows that 188 men were killed dur-ing 1911 out of 110,954 men employed, making the death rate 1.69 for each 1000. In coal mines 728, At Standard 2,719 were killed, making the death rate 3.73; in metal mines, 165,979 men were employed, and 695 were killed, making the death rate 4.19. 348 men were employed, of whom Approximately one-half of the deaths in and about quarries were due to the California Legislature to discrimthree causes, in the order named: Explosives, falls or slides of quarry material, and falls or slides of over-

A DEEP WELL.

We have been asked forty times and then some, the past week, what about the prospects for a deep well for water works. There seems to be but one way to put it down and that by stock subscription. There is almost unanimous sentiment for a bond issue to install waterworks system, but as our valuations in corporate limits aggregate only about \$600,000 we cannot issue bonds to exceed \$15,000. This amount would leave only about \$5,000, after putting the well down. Some favor issuing bonds for putting down the well and after the water is secured make other arrangements for piping the town; many do not favor this and we doubt if a bond issue can be carried out on this proposition.

An effort was made by one of our citizens the past week to raise sufficient funds to put down the hole by stock subscription. About half a dozen of our representative men put down liberally, but others refused to take any stock, consequently not much headway has been made It was thought that if a stock company could secure the water then the town could be bonded for enough to put in a system, or perhaps after the well was finished the city might let a franchise to a waterworks company to go ahead and put in a good system.

Any man who has property interests in Cotulla has not the ability to see far ahead when he does not do all that he should do in order to provide the town with water. Any man who can see three inches beyond his nose should be able to see that the town has reached its growth unless something is done to revive life, and in our opinion the first medicine we must have is water. The new comers to Cotulla are decidedly few, and there is a reason for it: A town of dusty streets and treeless and prassless yards have no attraction. You who have property, have a certain value placed on it but we dare say that not in a single instance can you "cash in". Can you cash in within 30 per cent of the value you place on your property? We doubt it, because there are no buyers. Conditions produce buyers or keep them away, and the conditions that exist in Cotulla today does not attract investors nor homeseekers.
