**GREAT ARMY STARTS FOR GETTYSBURG**

Tents for Fifty Thousand Old Soldiers Are Up on Battlefield at Gettysburg.

**OLD FOES TO MEET ONCE MORE.** Veterans of the Blue and the Gray to Tread on the Ground Where Their Comrades Fell.

Gettysburg, Pa., June 30.—The last of the thousands of army tents has been put in place and all is in readiness for the great army of veterans that will open next Tuesday the Gettysburg battlefield reunion—the largest and most costly reunion of Northern and Southern veterans ever held, and probably the last National gathering of the aged followers of Grant and Lee, whose ranks death is steadily depleting.

**Veterans from Every State.** Already a large number of the old soldiers are here, and others are on their way from the far corners of the Union. The War Department has been notified that 50,000 will attend.

In addition there will be thousands of spectators. Veterans are coming from every State. Representatives of every regiment that participated in the battle of Gettysburg will be present; and will be reinforced by veterans of all the armies, East and West, of the Union and of the Confederacy. Pennsylvania, of course, will have the largest delegation, with 14,000. New York will send the next largest, 10,000, Virginia and West Virginia will send about 3,000. Two thousand each will come from Massachusetts and New Jersey. Illinois will be represented by 600 and Indiana by 800.

On July 1, a half century will have passed since the forces of the Union and the Confederacy were locked here in a three days' death grapple. The great reunion truly symbolizes the restored concord of North and South. Hoary Blue will clasp hands with tottering Gray, and the battle-stained Stars and Stripes will mingle its folds with the bullet-riddled Stars and Bars.

The big camp is pitched on that part of the battlefield which lies southwest of Gettysburg. On nearly 300 acres of contiguous ground 7000 tents and more are going up under the supervision of the War Department. The camp lies partly on the scene of the first day's fighting.

Although each tent is designed to accommodate twelve men, it has been planned to assign only eight veterans to each, so as to make them as comfortable as possible. Each veteran will have a separate cot, blankets and a mess kit which will contain a plate, cup, knife, fork and spoon, and will become his personal property when he breaks camp.

**Only Veterans Cared For.** Only veterans of the Civil War may be provided food, shelter and entertainment within the great encampment of the commission.

"Therefore no woman or child or any man not a veteran will be given food, shelter or entertainment. No veteran should bring to Gettysburg any member of his family or other person whom he will have to obtain food and quarters outside camp unless all arrangements therefor have first been made for them before he or they come to Gettysburg."

The principal events of the celebration will be held on July 1, 2 and 3. In order to avoid congestion on traffic on the railroads and confusion at Gettysburg, the camp will be open Sunday evening, the first meal to be served at supper time. Twenty meals will be served to each veteran during the week if he is in camp that long and the camp will come to an end after breakfast on Sunday, July 6.

**Under One Big Tent.** The exercises will be held in a great tent, one of the largest in the United States, capable of accommodating about 15,000 persons. This tent is at the southern end of the camp, besides the Emmittsburg road down which Lee's army went after the close of the three days' battle.

United States troops, whose camp will adjoin that of the veterans, will do constant police duty. Boy scouts will act as guides. Pennsylvania's State police also will be on duty.

**GEORGIA GOVERNOR FLAYS UNION LABOR**

Brown in Farewell Address Declares Organizations Form Trust.

Atlanta, Ga., June 30.—A caustic arraignment of labor unions in which it is charged that they form the "most widespread and aggressively exacting trust in America" is contained in the farewell message of Governor Joseph M. Brown, presented to Georgia legislature at its opening session here.

Governor Brown's criticism of organized labor is made in connection with his argument for the enactment of laws requiring the compulsory arbitration of differences between employers and employees. He predicted that this upon the strike of employees of the Georgia Railroad and the Augusta Street Railway Company last fall. Both of these strikes, the governor declares, were "manifestly indefensible and contemptible" and "the strikers placed themselves in a state of open rebellion against the laws of Georgia."

"We are brought face to face with the fact," the message continues, "that these unions or combinations of employees of public service and other corporations have enforced their wages above those received by workmen in all other employments of life."

"The trend of the laws of the present day is to suppress combinations or trusts in restraint of trade. Yet while it is a matter of public note that a labor trust is the most widespread and aggressively exacting trust in America, politicians ponder it, because of its voting power."

"The labor unions by combination which their work through strikes and kindred methods are aggressively levying a toll upon all the other elements of our citizenship. They have organized a trust and demand that all other people buy labor at whatever price they choose to put upon it. And, contemporaneously, they are trying to force by employment all similar workmen who don't join their orders."

"I don't declare that all of the members of labor unions are willful violators of the law. Yet, they are the victims of a system which is breeding anarchy, which already has put the State's Constitution in contempt, which has relentlessly wronged hundreds of thousands of our fellow-citizens who have not offended in any way, which, in plain words, has applied lynch law methods to millions of dollars' worth of property."

## SCHOOL MANAGEMENT AND SCHOOL METHODS

Relating to Pupil Improvement Through Higher Educational Ideals—Progress Comes of Ideals in Advance of Reals.

School management and teaching are the twin arts of "pupil management." In school evolution ideals get to be reals, and we advance as we transform the good into the better. In the realm of educational ideals there is a better and a best which ever beckon us onward and upward.

The School Utilizes All Educational Influences.

It enables the pupil to make more of himself than he otherwise could. It plans to lead the learner to realize all that is best in him. The school stands for civilization, wherever we find a teaching body, as among the ancient Jews, we find an advancing civilization. The school is at once the creator, the conservator and the elevator of civilization. The school stands for human progress. It leads the pupil to profit by the experience of mankind, and enriches him with the accumulated wisdom of the race.

Pupil Improvement is the Central Idea in the School Organization.

We think of all education agencies, even the teacher, as pupil helps. "Is this the best thing for the pupil?" is the vital test of every school measure. School systems are created, school houses are planned, school appliances are prepared, and teachers are prepared and sustained to promote pupil improvement. The school is for the pupils, and school management and teaching are pre-eminently the arts of pupil betterment. Pupils are led to make the most of themselves by habitually doing their best under the best conditions.

The School Organism is a Unit.

The pupil and the teacher are the school essentials; all other educative conditions and appliances are thought of as school helps. The organism exists for the pupil and grows around the pupil. We think of the teacher as giving vitality, and of school helps as giving efficiency to the organism. The central idea, pupil improvement, includes the law of unity. All things are made to work together for pupil good, and school management becomes the art of unitizing school work.

School Evolution is Organic School Growth.

It means the realization of the possibilities of the school as an organism. The family is the embryo school, but the school, as we think of it, comes of the needs of progressive peoples. Savages feel no need of schools. The early schools of a people are astonishingly rudimentary and inefficient. Schools everywhere have been evolved with advancing civilization, but educational progress has been slow, and the lines of progress have been faint. When a school of a people first attains its best, we call the period the golden age. Plato taught during the golden age of Athens and Quintilian instructed during the golden age of Rome. A people may have a golden age, but the golden age of the race will always be in the future, and school evolution will go on as long as civilization continues to advance.

All progress comes of ideals which are in advance of reals. Brutes make no progress, for they create no ideals. Individuals and peoples with low ideals, or who look back, retrograde or merely mark time. Savage tribes look back, and so "mark time." Unprogressive peoples, like the Chinese, worship their ancestors, and so fail to make progress. People and institutions and individuals make progress so long as their outlook is forward and upward. The disciples of Jesus look forward and move forward. At eighty, Gladstone still looked forward and still led the armies of progress. The old education looks back and marks time, but the new education looks forward and moves upward.

They must be desirous of a high character—and must learn to skillfully labor. That may be farming, dairying, housekeeping, cooking, or thousands of other things, but it needs to be a labor for which all true ladies and gentlemen will have respect. A task that needs to be done.

I balm fathers and mothers largely for present social and industrial conditions. Perhaps a "fine haired" teacher may occasionally give wrong impressions, but when found out of sympathy with honest labor—such a one should be relegated to the "has-beens."

## GETTING OUT OF THE RUT.

At last the farmers of this section are getting out of the one crop rut, and the coming season will see considerable less acreage in onions than for many years past. One disaster did not turn them; two only made them plunge heavier, but the third of the present year has run them out of the game. They are now turning their attention to things more certain, and five years from today there will be an entirely different condition. The farmers will not abandon the growing of onions and truck all together, but of course will have only a limited amount so if there is no market the loss will not be felt. The farms will be stocked with good cattle and good hogs, silos will be erected, and there is a probability that dairying will be taken up by the farmers in the valley.

The time has come when the irrigation farmer must get on a new boat or sink. He has been living entirely too easy and must go to work. A gentleman recently remarked that present conditions were partly brought about by the fact that money had been too easy, and that is no doubt true. The typical onion grower never pretended to "live on his farm." Everything he ate came from the stores, in many cases even his butter and eggs, and we have seen some of them buy hay for their teams. High priced onions admitted of this method, but those days are past, and the farmer who would be prosperous today must economize from every standpoint and produce most of the things that go on his table right at home. We are glad to say that there are a few farmers in the valley that do this, but they are certainly limited in number.

A farmer hit the nail on the head the other day when he said: "the best way to get rich is the slow way, after all." That fellow has come to the realization that he has been playing at a big gamble and he is now willing to buckle down to business and play a safe game. Nothing can be surer than farming by irrigation when properly carried on, the right crops raised and then utilized to the best advantage, and we predict that the fellow who made the remark will recover his losses in a very few years and be on the road to prosperity.

The disaster has been overwhelming, but it will swing the line of production and in after years we will regard it as a blessing instead of a calamity.

Heavy rains on the upper Nueces did considerable damage to the S. A. & G. railroad Saturday and Sunday last and from meager reports there was great excitement for awhile among the inhabitants of the lower valley. However, the facts showed the first information to be exaggerated, and the rise in the river below, resulted in no damage. In fact no records were broken, and the water lacked several feet of reaching high marks of previous years. Along this part of the valley very little damage can be done to the farms, as very little land has been put in cultivation within the area that is annually flooded. The Nueces has an immense drainage territory, and there is not a year passes but what a flood and often three or four of them passes down, and farmers have considered it unwise to plant crops where the loss was sure to be certain.

Prospects for the cotton farmer is very bright in Southwest Texas, and if weather conditions are favorable the largest crop in many years will be produced. The weather conditions are not to be much more rain, but warm dry weather, and possibly a good rain during the latter part of this month. Even if not another drop of rain falls during the summer, a good crop will be raised and it might be better for no rain to fall than for a continuance of the weather conditions of the month just closed. In this particular section more rain would not damage the crop as it would further north in the Pearsall and Devine country, where excessive rains have fallen three weeks past. At any rate, Southwest Texas is going to make a fair cotton crop, and the prospects are good for an exceptional crop.

A School of Journalism will be established at the University of Texas at the coming session. The establishment of this school is in response to a popular and wide spread demand from all parts of the state. The Woman's Press Association of Texas, Lieutenant-Governor Mayes, former president of the National Press Association, and the students of the University who are interested in journalism, have been insistent in their demands for its establishment. The school will be firmly entrenched upon its inauguration, as it is intended to have a professor and two instructors in charge.

The recent rains did damage to the streets in parts of the town and now would be an opportune time for the Council to fulfill some of the promises they have been making. Some time ago the Record announced that work was going to begin right away, but for some reason, which is beyond our capability of even guessing, not a lick has been struck. It seems that the aims of the Council is not to do anything instead of do it.

Edward Harvey, of Plano, a man who has been teaching a country school, has discovered a new method of coming to college. He entered the University of Texas Summer School recently, after having ridden from his home, a distance of two hundred and fifty miles, on his motorcycle. Rains and bad roads beset him on his trip, but he was undaunted, and registered without delay in the Summer School. Several years ago one student rode from his home in Plainview upon his horse, camping out on the way. He traveled a distance of over five hundred miles.

The heat wave which covered the North and East so long caused much loss of life and suffering. It will probably be our time next, but it never gets to that stage in Southwest Texas.

## SURGEON-CURED HE WILL GET PARDON

Michigan Authorities Trying to Figure Whether "Black Bart" Should Be Free August 3 or Later.

LANSING, Mich., June 30.—Whether Reimund Holzhey, train robber and murderer, whose life sentence in Marquette prison was commuted by Governor Warner to forty years, will be a free man August 3, or will remain in prison 3 months longer by making good time, Holzhey Attorney General Fellows, as to how many days it takes to make a year when a convict is shortening his sentence by an operation was performed which was convicted of murder in November, 1889, and sentenced to prison for life.

In prison he was an incorrigible convict, an apt one in the getting possession of a knife, he overpowered a guard, took his gun away from him and shot one or two other guards before another landed a bullet on his trigger hand, and rendered him powerless. Some years afterward he was sent to the asylum for criminal insane at Ionia, and there recorded in the open air was 99 deemed him a different man. The surgeons found that a piece of bone was pressing on his brain. They removed the pressure and Holzhey was returned to Marquette, became a trusty and is librarian of the prison and also the prison photographer.

## PERRY'S FLAGSHIP TO CRUISE GREAT LAKES

Niagara to Visit a Number of Ports After Fourth of July Celebration at Put-In-Bay.

Cleveland, Ohio, June 30.—The official program for the cruise of the restored flagship Niagara of Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry's fleet in the battle of Lake Erie, Sept. 10, 1813, and also the program for the opening celebration of the Perry centennial at Put-In-Bay Island on the Fourth of July has been announced by the centennial commissioners. The Niagara will be present at the leading local celebrations of the centennial of Perry's victory in the various ports of the great lakes, making its debut at the celebration at Erie, Pa., on July 6.

The naval militia vessels attending the Fourth of July celebration at Put-In-Bay will arrive at Erie on the 6th of July and be joined by others of the fleet. The Niagara will depart from Erie on July 11, arriving at Fairport, Ohio, for a one-day celebration on July 12, and subsequently pursue the following itinerary: Lorain, Ohio, week of July 14; Put-In-Bay, July 20; Monroe, Mich., July 26; Toledo, Ohio, July 27; Detroit, Aug. 1; Green Bay, Wis., Aug. 7; Milwaukee, Aug. 14; Chicago, Aug. 17; Buffalo, Sept. 1; Sandusky, Ohio, Sept. 8; Put-In-Bay, Sept. 10 and 11.

## TO USE CAMELS ON SOUTHWEST PLAINS

ANIMALS WILL BE IMPORTED FROM ORIENT.

Valuable in Wastes of New Mexico, Arizona and Other Places Where There Are No Railroads.

Pueblo, Col., June 30.—J. H. Trimble, one of the leading stockmen of Texas, is at the head of an association which purposes to transport camels from the Oriental deserts to those of New Mexico, Arizona and California and the semi-arid wastes of Texas. The association purposes to import 200 camels and place them on a ranch on the Rio Grande, 150 miles south of Cape Verde.

The areas mentioned, although they offer great possibilities to the seeker after valuable metals, are little traversed, either by railroads or wagon roads, such as would be suitable for motor traffic, for the quality of the soil, which is largely drifting sand, makes the construction of durable roadsways impossible. The camel, with its thick padded feet, seems to have been expressly designed by nature for just this sort of travel, and added to its ability to travel over these sandy wastes without tiring, the animals other characteristics of its swiftness, burden-bearing power, and the fact that it can go long distances without food or water, makes it as available for these American desert regions as for those of the Orient.

This is not the first occasion on which an effort has been made to start camel culture in the United States. Jefferson Davis, when he was Secretary of War in President Pierce's cabinet, was the originator of a project for the raising of camels also was made in the neighborhood of Cape Verde, and the old buildings, modeled after a caravansary in Asia Minor, are still in existence, although in a somewhat dilapidated condition.

## TALL MT. MCKINLEY IS SCALDED FIRST TIME

Missionary Erected Cross on Top of the Great Alaskan Peak—Was Long Delayed.

Fairbanks, Alaska, June 30.—The ascent of the highest peak of Mt. McKinley was accomplished for the first time June 7, when the party led by Archdeacon Hudson Stuck, Episcopal missionary to Alaska, accompanied by Robert G. Tatum, Harry P. Karstens and Walter Harper reached the top of the south peak of the mountain, the highest in the continent.

News of the success of the expedition was received in a message sent by Dr. Stuck, who is resting at the base camp. He expects to return to Fairbanks in August.

Dr. Stuck and his assistants erected a six-foot cross on the summit of the great mountain. Observations made with the mercurial barometer indicated the height of the mountain is 29,500 feet.

The expedition, which left Fairbanks March 13, expected to reach the summit early in May, but was delayed three weeks cutting a pass-sack three miles long through ice thrown across the ridge by an earthquake last summer. The party found much evidence of seismic disturbance on the upper ridge.

## FRISCO R. R. LOSE YOAKUM

Dropping of Chairman Means Saving of \$75,000 a Year.

New York, June 30.—B. L. Winchell and Thomas H. West, receivers for the bankrupt St. Louis & San Francisco, began their campaign of pruning expenses by taking B. F. Yoakum, chairman of the board, off the payroll.

According to financial authorities, Yoakum's going saves the company \$75,000 a year and if the receivers carry out the program they are said to have in view they will close the offices of the company here.

## SNAKES ON PLANET VENUS

"Life on the Planet Venus," is the title of a remarkable article which has just appeared in the Paris magazine Lectures Pour Tous, and has attracted widespread attention from the boldness of its theories.

According to the writer, who, although anonymous, is believed to be Camille Flammarion, Venus, which is younger than the earth and older than Mercury, is now passing through the equivalent of what is called the secondary period by geologists.

"It is," he says, "a nightmare planet, a nest of reptiles and a swarm of monsters. Under the stifling mist of air, saturated with hot water, lies a vast miry swamp, covered with rotting vegetable matter. From this spring forests of toadstools and ferns in which all creeping and slimy creatures that are vermin here take gigantic proportions.

"Insects are monsters there. Centipedes a yard long trail on their soft feet. Enormous spiders, black and velvety, possess jaws like wolf-traps, filled with poison.

"In the prairies of giant moss grass and the moon, her satellite."

"The writer thinks that owing to the relative warmth of the planet Venus while this period of evolution is proceeding, in the torrid zone of the moon, her satellite."

## MAN, HARDEST ANIMAL

Can Endure Extremes of Heat and Cold Fatal to Other Creatures.

Man may with more or less discomfort endure the climate of any part of the globe whereon he lives.

On the other hand, plants and animals cannot exist in temperatures higher or lower than those to which they have become accustomed. But man moves from one extreme to the other with, generally speaking, but small physical discomfort. Explorers visit the sands of Africa and the ice fields of the North, returning to their normal environments with, in some cases, a distinct improvement in physical condition. Man inhabits pretty nearly every part of the earth, with the exception of the immediate vicinity of the poles.

Men of science contend that the lowest temperatures at the earth's surface are not found directly at the poles, but at some distance to the south of the north pole and at some distance to the north of the south pole. Then, too, it is claimed, the greatest degree of heat is not as might naturally be supposed, to be encountered at the equator, but at some distance to the north and south of that line.

The records and statistics show that the coldest place on earth is in Siberia. The lowest temperature ever recorded in the open air was 90 degrees below zero (Fahrenheit) at Verchajansk, Central Siberia, on January 15, 1885. The highest temperature is set down at 124 degrees above zero (Fahrenheit), registered in Algeria, North Africa, on July 17, 1897.

It is understood that the motive for the resignations lay in the financial difficulties which the system has been forced to face. It is reported that a majority of the Americans in the service will follow their chiefs.

## 17 VICTIMS RECOVERED

Believed 18 Bodies Are Under the Wreckage of Burned Buffalo Elevator.

Buffalo, N. Y., June 29.—With 17 known to be dead, 18 missing and a score in hospitals for whose recovery no hope is entertained, the ultimate total of victims of the fire and explosion that wrecked the big plant of the Husted Milling and Elevator Co. on Tuesday will likely exceed half a hundred. Nine of the 60 taken to hospitals died today.

The police, working with company officials in checking up the list of employees late today, revised their estimate of 23 missing by reducing it to 18. It has been established that these 18 men were in the mill when the explosion occurred and the police feel certain they perished.

## MINISTER FACES CHARGE

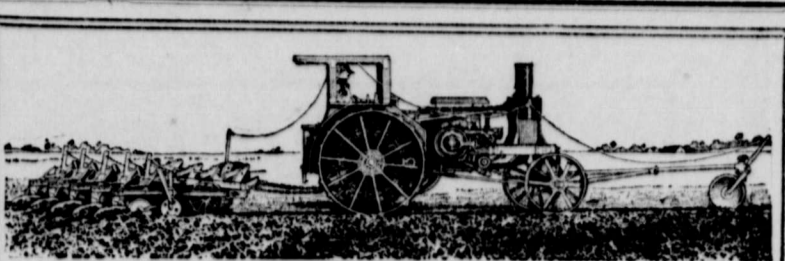
Tearful Tale Told War Eagle Officers Is Disproven.

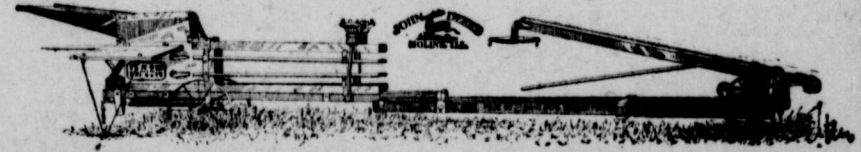
