

## RABB NAMED AS COLLECTOR.

Brownsville Man to Get Laredo-Corpus-Brownsville District--Reasons for Appointment.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 28.—Very unexpectedly to most Texans, the President sent to the Senate late today nominations of Frank Rabb of Brownsville to be collector of customs for the Laredo-Brownsville-Corpus Christi district, and Zach Lamar Cobb of El Paso to be collector of customs of the El Paso district.

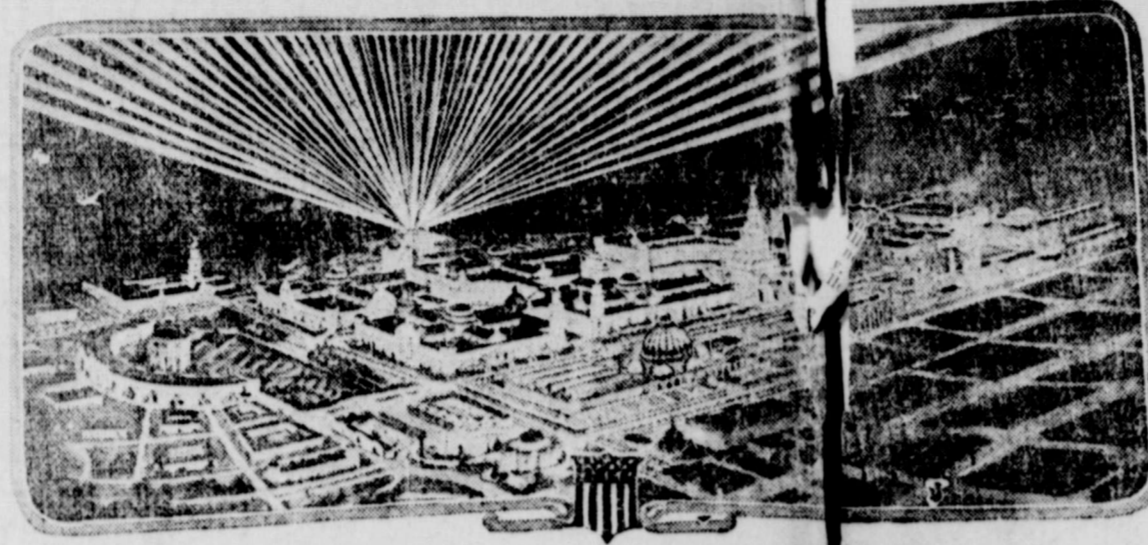
The appointments were made at this time owing to the emergency situation which exists along the Mexican border, where are understood to be in accord with his administration politically and generally. That is the explanation given at the White House and by Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo and Postmaster General Burleson. The understanding is that Senator Culberson, who has been recuperating in a Connecticut resort nearly all summer, was decidedly opposed to the selection of Mr. Rabb for the Laredo collectorship, but that he had made no explicit recommendation concerning the filling of that place.

Postmaster General Burleson, who, with Chesley Jurney, Senator Culberson private secretary, has been representing the senior Senator in patronage matters, made this statement to The Express correspondent tonight:

"In the Laredo collectorship matter Senator Culberson had made no recommendation, and would not be made at this time. Both of these appointments, however, are the result of the emergency conditions created by the decision of the President to withhold arms and munitions from all factions in Mexico. The President wanted men on the border who were thoroughly in sympathy with his administration, and who have his viewpoint of the Mexican state of affairs. The conditions could not be foreseen, and, therefore, the decision to postpone appointment of the Laredo and El Paso collectors are abandoned."

Both of the Texas Senators endorsed Mr. Cobb for the El Paso collectorship but they divided over the Laredo appointment, Senator Sheppard endorsing Mr. Rabb. Senator Culberson is known to have favored the appointment of George D. Armistead of San Antonio, or Roger Byrne of Smithville over Mr. Rabb, but, owing to positive assurances given his representatives here that the Laredo place would not be filled until the expiration of the commission of Collector James J. Haynes, Republican, early next year, the senior Senator withheld any definite endorsement. Mr.

As far as the public is concerned the murder of the farmer is just as much of a mystery as it appeared the day after the tragedy. Just what evidence the officers have collected is not known. The young man and woman are under arrest on charges filed by Walter Caudel son of the slain man. The young woman is a grand daughter of the dead man. She came here from Holcomb, Mo., in the early part of the year and married Wm. McClain about three or four months ago. Her maiden name was Miss Lillie Waddell. She is a bright educated young woman and before coming here was bookkeeper in the Peoples Bank of Holcomb. Her father, A. G. Waddell, arrived here last week, and has been giving the officers every assistance possible in ferretting out the mystery. He went over the ground of the tragedy thoroughly and thinks that there was no intent to steal the mules on the fatal night but that the crime was carefully planned.

A deal was closed this week whereby K. Burwell becomes the owner of the Frost business houses on Front street. The buildings are at present occupied by the Cotulla Merantile Company and as soon as satisfactory arrangements can be made Miss Burwell expects to move her dry goods stock to this place. It is her intention to remodel the building considerably.
