RABB NAMED AS COLLECTOR.

Brownsville Man to Get Laredo-Corpus-Brownsville District---Reasons for Appointment.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 28. Very unspectedly to most Texans, the President sent to the Senate late today nominations of Frank Rabb of Brownsville to be collect or of customs for the Laredo Brownsville-Corpus Christi dis-triet, and Zach Lamar Cobb of El Paso to be collector of customs of the El Paso district.

The appointments were made at this time owing to the emergency situation which exists along the Mexican border, where are understood to be in accord with his administration politically and generally. That is the explanation given at the White House and by Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo and Postmas-General Burleson. The understanding is that Senator Culberson, who has been recuperating in a Connecticut resort nearly all summer, was decidedly opposed to the selection of Mr. Rabb for the Laredo collectorship, but that he had made ne explicit recommendation concerning the filling of that place.

Postmaster General Burleson, who, with Chesley Jurney, Senator Culberson private secretary, has been representing the senir Senator in patronage matters, made this statement to The Express correspondent tonight:







ORDINANCE Prohibiting Running at Large of Live Stock and Providing for the Impounding of

Be it ordained by the City

Council of the city of Cotulla. Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, being the owner or keeper or persons in charge of any cattle, horses, jacks, jennets, swine, sheep or goats, to permit the same to run at large within the corp ate limits of the city of Cotulla, after being notified by the fity Marshal to put the same up.

Anyone violating section one of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall b fined in any sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars.

Section 2 It shall be the duty of the City Marshal, at any and in the Sunday School-By W. E. Earnest, Millett Texas. all times to take up all cattle, mules, jacks, jennets, horses, sheep or goats found running at large within the coporate limits of the city of Cotulla, and confine them within a secure pen or pound, to be by him provided for that purpose.

Section 3 Whenever any cattle or other animal is impounded under the provisions of Section 2, the Marshal shall proceed to sell the same to the highest bidder for cash, after having given ten days notice of the time and place of such sale by posting up a written or printed notice thereof in three public places in this such cattle or other animals may redeem the same at any time before the sale thereof, by paying one dollar per head for impounding fees, together with the reasonable expense of keeping the

The bugbear of city life for boys and girls is that they have too many idle hours uninspired for useful training. This fact is fully recog-nized by leading educators of the country, and many cities in different sections of the United States are endeavoring to cope with this problem in part by the establishment of school gardens. During the past year the city of Los Angeles, Cal., has made her first elaborate experiment along this line. The results achieved have been satisfactory to the school department, and promise much of future development, not only in the system of instruction and the interest manifest by the children but in their significant bearing upon social and economic problems. recent number of the California Out look, Will H.
