

GONZALES DRAWS PENALTY OF LIFE IMPRISONMENT

Jury Brings in Quick Verdict After Trial Lasting Seven Days---Defendant Unmoved By Decision.

RANGEL SEES SERIOUS SIDE

After a trial lasting seven days the jury in the case of Jesus Gonzales filed in the Court room Thursday morning at 10.23 o'clock and announced that a verdict had been arrived at. The verdict was handed to the clerk who read: "We, the jury find the defendant, Jesus Gonzales, guilty of murder charged in the indictment and assess his penalty at a life term in the pentitentiary."

Ruling of United States Treasury Department in Regard to Cattle Brought From Mexico in Bond, Changed.

SHEPPARD PLAYS PART.

Judge C. C. Thomas yesterday eceived a letter from Senator Morris Sheppard enclosing a copy of a telegram to the Collector of Customs at Laredo, relative to cattle brought over from Mexico in bond, and which is of much importance to cattlemen along the border especially and to all others who have been dealing in Mexican cattle. The telegram follows:

"Washington, D. C., Oct 22, 1913. Collector of Customs, Laredo, Texas. Referring to my telegram 6th inst., am informed that with exception of thirty-five cows and heifers and eighty-three calves sent to market prior to taking effect present tariff act and on which duty should be collected, two bunches consisting one hundred sixty-three and four hundred ten under bond belonging to Judge Covey C. Thomas are still on range. If satisfied thereof by report your officers and affidavits of owner and employees production of cattle need not be required. Similar action may be taken in similar asts without reference to Department of Applications for relief.





Washington, Oct. 21.-Although latest advices to the state department tonight declared the deputies ar-rested by order of Provisional President Huerta had been released from prison, the dissolution of the Mexican congress and the invasion of the legislative halls by armed troops caused the Washington government practically to lose all hope of seeing a constitutional election held October 26 or the pacification of the country brought about through the authorities in power at present in Mexico.

A crisis is expected in the Mexican capital. Administration officials pointed to President Wilson's reference in his address to congress last August that "the true state of af-fairs in Mexico soon would be re-vealed." Evidence that the federal troops are discussed and and federal troops are disgruntled and on the verge of mutiny because they have not been paid and the comparatively easy success of the Constitutionalists in capturing such an important plac as Torreon, in North Central Mexico were referred to significantly by Washington officials as revelations of the real situation Justifies Action.

The establishment of a virtual dic-atorship by Huerta through the use

military force is interpreted as likely to have the most far-reaching onsequences to the Huerta regime. It was also held as a vindication of the attitude of the Washington administration that military assumption power should not be recognized. nd there is hope now among high fficials that foreign governments which hitherto had recognized the nerta regime would withdraw their apport.
