Thursday morning at 10.23 o'elock and announced that a verdict had been arrived at. The verdict was handed to the clerk who read:
the defendant, Jesus Gonzales, guilty of murder charged in the

Arguments in the case were
concluded at ten o'clock Wednesnight and the case turned over to the jury, but owing to the
lateness of the hour the jury retired. Thursday morning at nine o'clock the jury announced tha

clear on one or two points of testimony and requested that witness Buck be put back on the stand. Buck was questioned as to the identity of the men com ing out of the creek at the time Ortiz was kiiled and asked if he saw defendent eject a shell from
