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

The war having closed some time previous, his relatives presumed that he had been killed. 

me near destroying the entire busess section of this city early this orning when the north side of ain street, between Sixth and Sev ith streets, was consumed by the ames, with a loss approximating 10,000. A fire alarm was turned a 5 a. m. The fire department t the Arkadelphia Milling Company as the first to responde, being rickly joined by the volunteer corp the town. The heroic efforts of these men were seriously hampered then it was found that the water The Arkadelwas very poor. hia Milling Company then connect-d their private stand pipe with the mains and furnished consider-Edditional strength.

The fire originated in the Ayers u bakery and soon enveloped the two adjacent buildings and got entirely beyond control. The report spread rapidly through the city that the fire was of a very serious nature and hundreds of people gathered and large salvage corps began removing mercantile stocks from the doomed row of buildings nearby. The streets were completely obstructed with gro-ceries, dry goods, millinery and jewelry cases. As a last recourse dynamite was used, razing the burning structures, so that the streams from four lines of hose could better cope with the flames. The explosion shook the town, brought low the walls and roofs of the burning buildings and accomplished admirably the purpose intended. The heavy brick walls of adjoining buildings then gave a bar-rier to the flames, which were gotten under control.

Fourteen mercantile houses and shops suffered losses from the fire water and dynamite explosion. The fire, water and dynamite explosion. OBITUARY

Again the inevitable has occured, and the grim reaper has visited our community, plucked, from our midst and launched out on the sea of eternity the soul of our brother and fellow citizen, B. F. Burris. He was born at Galveston, Texas, Aug. 25, 1840; being left an orphan at an early age, he moved with his brotherin-law, William Lewis to Karnes County in 1855; in 1859 he joined the Texas rangers under Wm. Tobin, for service on the frontier against the invasion of Cortinis, left service of rangers in 1860 remained at home until Sept. 1861, when he joined Terrey's Texas Rangers, afterwards known as Co. "C" of the 8th Texas Regiments. He was in some 250 skirmishes and battles. Shortly after the battle of Murfreesbore he was captured by the Federals, and carried to Hart's Island, New York where he was a prisoner for 3 months, or until the close of the war, when he was paroled and furnished with transportation home arriving July 4, 1865. The war having closed some time previous, his relatives presumed that he had been killed. July 6, 1866 Brother Burris and sister Janie Elizabeth Johnson were united in marriage, remained in Karnes County about a year and a half when they moved to Beeville, where they resided for fourteen years, afterwards moving to this place, living on their ranch near here for thirty years, when they disposed of their property and moved to San Antonio, where they lived until January of this year, returning here on account of the physical breakdown of Mr. Burris about a year ago.
