FERGUSON PLANKS ALL IN PLATFORM.

Convention Buries Bailey Resolutions Under Vote of Six to One-Bailey Candidate for Senator.

THOMAS ON COMMITTEE.

The State Democratic Convention which met at El Paso on 12th inst., transacted its business and adjourned in the briefest space of time of any previous State convention. It was a Ferguson convention and everything went just exactly as the nominee wanted it to go. All of the Ferguson planks went into the platform, and there was no opposition from any source except from Joseph Well-done Bailey, and the well oiled and splendidly manipulated steam roller did its duty.

The National administration and also the State administration was endorsed. Resolutions deploring the death of Mrs. Woodrow Wilson were adopted and a telegram of sympathy was sent to President Wilson.

One interesting feature of the convention was the closeness of the race between McLemore and Land for Congressman at Large. McLemore was declared the winner by 159 votes, but later returns from San Saba and Reeves county were wired in which gave Lane a majority of 56. 

When she read of a firm in a distant city that wanted agents "that no one would know were agent" for the express purpose of forming community clubs in saving co-operative buying, she was in just the mood consider the plan. It sounded alluring, for convincing ad assured Mrs. Wisewoman that buying not only the necessities of life such as flou and shoes, as well as the luxuries of furniture carpets, she could save forty per cent. She busy with pencil and paper and in a few moment had it all figured out that she could save at l one hundred dollars a year if she availed herse of the club plan of buying enough to half pay f a selfplayer or a trip to Europe!

It never occured to Mrs. Wisewoman to have a compunctions about sending away for goods as t own tradespeople had not been giving her w she considered a "square deal.,' She and h friends, too, felt that it would serve the gror and merchants "just right." So they made their lists, ordering everything they required the time being for themselves and their fan from soap and canned goods to underwear hose. The order went forward with a gener check toward which they had all "chipped in." In due time the club organizer received by press COLLECF, a box about the size of an right riano. This little incident, however, lost sight of for the moment in the excitemer opening and unpacking the box. But alas! stead of the goods to which they had been a tomed, the "just as good" soaps were of cheapest scented grades; the canned goods w. prepared from over-ripe fruits and vegetables; even the coveted petticoats and hose were impossible in texture and quality. When they added the cost of expressage, an item of six dollars or so, to their original check, they found they had paid about twenty per cent more for their out-oftown purchases than they would have for stand advertised goods bought at home. In taking count of stock they found that there was no single standard article included in the list; in fast, all the goods were inferior and bore the nameof the mail-order merchant, and not that of the m nufacturer.






