Last Thursday, a demonstration of some of the badly-needed equipment was given local doctors, nurses and hospital personnel. At the time, it was noted that although a little more than \$950 had been contributed, that was slightly less than one-third the \$3,000 needed to secure the equipment.

> 1 graham cracker crumb crust, browned 2 8oz. packages cream cheese 2 eggs


2/3 c. sugar 1 t. vanilla






