



There can be no higher consecration of the Ameri-can citizen who is not act-ually engaged in serving the colors than a genuing re-sponse to the cause of food saving.

Enough movements have been started. The thing now needed is team work to finish what has been begun.
Food saving takes second to no issue, unless it is the issue of the men in arms. All the wealth in the world is no wealth if there is no food; and no front can be held and no battles be fought unless there is food to sustain the men who shoot the guns, throw the grenades, land.
The rise and fall of relativistics.

The rise and fall of ministries, the sinking of transports, the devastation of communities through explosions and fires—all are redolent with tragedy that staggers the imagination.

with tragedy that staggers the imagination.

But let there be an absence of bread, a restriction of sugar beyond what the body needs and craves; let the mest ration shift to a grain diet; let hunger become rampant and famine pregnant, and there is no calamity so great, so awesome, so appalling.

If there is to be a sporadic saving of food and not a constant one, just so much has the enemy been aided. To deny oneself of staples needed by the allies and our own men in arms, is not a sacrifice, but an opportunity to be of real service.

If there are the thoughtless and the heedless.

If there are the thoughtless and the heedless, let them now be appraised of an attitude, not dissimilar to an alien who openly espouses the cause of the Vaterland, the business of adapting oneself to substitute foods is not recommended, it is imperative.

Let there be no minimizing of the part that the housewife plays in her kitchen. Her work is now as sacred as that of the priest at the altar.

It has betion of the ruling made by Washingon in order that the farmer who is ow embarking on his 1918 year of roduction will not begin discouraged y a program which did not take into count originally the fact that he had stitutes on hand.

Administrator Peden has received ommunications from all over the tate indicating that the plan of fiftyty for distribution of wheat flour sald work an extreme hardship upon the farmer. Many messages have passed between his headquarters and the national headquarters on the sub-

The ruling as it now stands and aplies to farmers of Texas is as fol-

Present Rule Works Hardship Realizing that the rule requiring at consumers who buy wheat flour all at the same time buy an equal umber of pounds of specified substities works a serious hardship on ose farmers who have an ample supbly of home-grown substitutes, and at many farmers have grown these ebstitutes upon the urgent request of the government, the following modification of the rule in its application to rmers is hereby authorized, effective

Retailers may sell to their farmer trade 70 per cent of their normal requirements of wheat flour without subtutes, provided the farmer furnishes the retailer a written statement that has on hand an adequate supply of ome-grown substitutes, showing apoximate quantities.

This is the only exception made to the pound-for-pound rule, and applie. only to the farmer having on hand his nome-grown substitutes.

However, a farmer or other con-sumer must not purchase or use over 79 per cent of his normal requirements wheat flour each month. Dealer Must Explain Rule.

If in February, 1917, he consumed 00 pounds of wheat flour, in Febuary, 1918, he must not consume over

70 pounds,

If in March, 1917, he consumed 100 pounds, in March, 1918, he must not consume over 70 pounds.

If in April, 1917, he consumed 100 pounds, in April, 1918, he must not consume over 70 pounds, and so on, month by month.

The retailer in selling the consumer.

The retailer in selling the consumer must explain this rule and assure himself that it is being strictly lived up to.
It is desired and strongly urged that the retailer confine his sales of wheat flour to his regular established trade and not seek new customers. Unless the retailer pursues this course he will later find that he is unable to secure a sufficient supply of wheat flour to take care of his regular customers, as a retailer can only buy and dis-tribute 70 per cent of his normal sup-Federal Food Administrator for Texas.

Nature has implanted in every human being a sense of justice. This sense of natural consciously, and those who justice does not emanate from would lay restraining hands any religion or creed; it is the common possession of human- mortal and immortal enemies. ity. While the most enlightened teachers of humanity are telling us that man by aspiration and effort can raise himself to partake of the Divine nature. Germany is teaching and practicing the doctrine that man should invert the theory and ake his place amongst the lowest types in the animal world. They hold forth as the goal of human ambition, after centuries of upward struggle, the figure, type and mentality of a east rather than that of a God. The animal which lives on the tesh of others, whose right to trength and its ability to rush its prey, would appear to e the German ideal.

It is largely because the Ger an idea is so repugnant to u enlightened Americans, bese their practices send a hudder through every fibre of our bodies and produce such sousea in our souls, that we are at war with Germany to ay; and it is because of these onditions that every decent, onorable, thinking man must ledge, if necessary, his forte this unspeakable thing which has fallen like a curs
