#### MORE ABOUT INCOME TAX.

Unmarried men and women who are bread-winners for others are granted exemptions on their earnings before figuring the Income Tax now being collected. Although a return must be filed by every unmarried person, and by every married person living apart from wife (or husband); who had a net income of \$1000 or more during 1919, carried by millions of such persons, and relief from excessive taxation is especially provided.

In addition to the ordinary personal exemption of \$1000, and additional exemption of \$1000, is granted to "heads of families:" and there is also prounder 18 years of age or who is mentally or physically defective.

The \$200 for each dependent may be claimed by any taxpayer who is the chief support of such dependent. This is not confined to dependents who are members of the family or relatives. On the other hand it does not include servants or others who are earning their living. And it does not apply to the wife or husband of the married taxpayer, even though such person may have become a total burden.

It should be remembered that the peron who claims exemption as "head of a family" must in length. qualify for it. Two single persons who divide between them, more or less equally, the financial and other responsibilities of a household cannot claim that either one is the head of the family. But if a single person actually assumes the total having one of his brothers or sisters support himpractically be codsidered more than his board, such trivial circumstances must not be allowed to interfere with his clear claim for exemption.

A single person is the head of a family if by December 31st he had become the sole support of close relatives (by blood, marriage or adoption) living in the same house with him and looked upon as to exercise a greater or less amount of control in the matters affecting the support and main-

tenance of the household. The phrase "sole support" is here used in the deper 'ente are looking for a substantial portion shing and warch will select the three naupnal of their support. There may be another source of income (such as interest on bonds, dividends on stocks, pension) which, if meagre enough to still leave the recipient dependent, should not interfere with the claim for exemption. Such meagre income of dependents, as well as the inconsequential profit on the board of any self supporting member of the household, must however be included in the return of the head of the house-

But a division of responsibility will in every case exclude the parties from the claim for the additional exemption. Article 302 of Regulations 45 defines that a head of a family is "a person who actually supports and maintains in one household or more individuals who are closely connected with him by blood relationship, relationship by marrage or by adoption, and whose right to exercise family control and provide for those dependent individuals is based upon some moral or legal obligation."

Once the existence of the fact that a taxpayer is the principal cause for the creation or maintenance of a home is established it cannot be destroyed by his mere temporary or unavoidable absence from it. 



We were in a canyon that was 60 miles long, and spies reported to him that some Carranza troops were approaching the outlet. This was about 11 o'clock and immediately Villa ordered 200 men to proceed to the mouth of the canyon, 20 miles distant, telling them he would join them in his report to the District Sup- & Floral Company of Dallas in by daylight. The moon rose about 3 o'clock, when the camp was awakened and breakfast had. While waiting for the moon to rise higher, Villa approached me and asked if I was the owner of the ranch. I replied not. He asked me who was the owner, where he lived and if he was a good man. I told him. He then asked if I was married, how many children I had and where my family lived. He was very pleasant in his conversation and told me that he would talk to me again later.

"We moved out of the canyon and upon the plain overlooking the City of Chihuahua, and struck camp again Saturday evening about four o'clock. I was the only American prisoner, but there were several Mexicans that had been taken at Musquiz. that had been taken at Musquiz. Villa came to us that evening and told us on what terms he would release us. He told me that he wanted \$1500 and I gave him a written agreement that I would deposit that amount in a certain place."

Hugo said he was not mistreated at any time while held a prisoner. Villa's lieutenants were courteous and while in Musquiz a guard was sent with him when he went to a resturant to get his meals, yet the guard was sometimes out of his sight. Through the mountains he was given the freedom of the camp at night, and never was confined or tied.
