Washington D. C., March 3 Divisions of the American Ex or return home had an aduled gate strength of approximately 225.000 men February 14, according to figures made public today. They are the seven regular divsions, the 36th (Texas and Oklahoma National Guard), and the Florida (North and South Carolina lorida and Porto Rica Nationa Army) and the 88th (North DaNational Army.)

PAID A BONUS OF SIXTY DOLLARS.

Section 1406 of the Revenue Act approved February 24th 1919 uthorizes the payment of a boield clerks and nurses of the Army upon honorable separation rom active service by discharge. esignation or otherwise. This onus is not payable to the heirs or representatives of any deceasd soldier.
