

FIGURED IN HISTORIC PAST

Representation of Monarch of the Time of Abraham Now in Pennsylvania Museum.

In the dim old days of the patriarch Abraham people looked very much as they do now, judging from the oldest representation of buman figures unearthed by the tolling brotherhood of archeologists. Two striking figures, one standing and one seated, are included in the elaborate design of the clay sed, or "postage stamp," which has excited the enthusiasm of Dr. Legrain, curator of the Babylonian section of the University of Pennsylvania

Dr. Legrain has figured out the in scriptions of the lattle tablet as indicating that it dates from the period when "Ur of the Chaldees." mentioned in Genesis in connection with the history of Abraham, was a flourishing kingdom. And he finds reason to believe that the seated figure, decorated with flounces of beautiful accordeon plaiting, is a portrait of his majesty Ibi-Sin, the last king of Ur and possibly an intimate friend of the Father of Israel.

To the modern eye both figures are remarkably well drawn and lifelike in attitude, especially considering the fact that they were modeled in clay on a very small scale. Dr. Legrain thinks the tablet served the double purpose of a seal and a postage stamp on a sack of money forwarded to a banker named Shulpae by his reverence the high priest of the temple of Ur, at which Abraham worshiped.

After a three-year study of pellagra in the cotton-mill villages of South Carolina, the United States public health service shows that pellagra varies inversely with the family income in this locality. As the income fell the disease was found to increase and to affect more members of the same family. As the income rose the disease decreased, and was rarely found in families that enjoyed the highest incomes, even though this



TO CLIMB MOUNT EVERES

British Royal Geographical Society Said to Be Contemplating Ambitious Expedition.

Enormous interest has been aroused by the announcement that the Royal Geographical society contemplates fit ting out an expedition to attempt the ascent of Mount Everest, in the Himalayas. For not only is this the highest mountain on the globe; but it is also the world's mystery mountain. Although it was discovered 70 years ago, no European has yet succeeded in getting anywhere nearer than about

on its slopes. This is because it so happens that it is situated partly in Nepal and partly in Tibet, and the governments of both these countries object to the presence

fifty miles to it, much less setting foot

of European explorers. Besides this the Nepal base of the giant mountain is in any case practically unapproachable, owing to the dense jungle growth, extending for a width of 60 or 70 miles all round, and into whose depths no white man may venture and live.

The proposal now is to attempt the ascent from the Tibetan side. This is doubtless possible, but whether the summit can be reached or not is another matter.

Most experts say not, and point to the fact that the duke of Abruzzi's attempt to scale Mount Godwin-Austin, Everest's mighty neighbor, and the second highest peak in the world, resulted in failure.

He ascended as far 24,600 feet, but was then obliged to turn back, owing to the difficulty of breathing, due to the extreme rarefaction of the air Mount Everest is more than 29,000 feet high.

India Ink Really Chinese Ink.

The intensely black inks have vari ous sorts of finely divided carbon as their pigment, and the vehicle in mos instances is some type of oil or varnish. India ink is the name often applied to what is in reality Chinese ink. The best of this variety comes from the Anhul province and is made from the lamp black produced when wood oil is slowly burned in one earth tained that had six figures and the enware vessel and the soot or lamp black produced is collected on the sides of a second jar placed above the first. A paste is made with varnish and pork fat and this is then mixed with glue. Some ink is made from the soot of sesame or rapeseed oil, but in any case the paste is pressed into molds. There are, of course, many grades of this ink, the lower being made from the coarser soot and In 1918 the Chinese exported 127,000 pounds of this ink .- Scientific American Monthly.
