Hundreds Drawn By Open House

Mules Pull Hornet Stingers

Final Season Game At Hereford Friday

Tulia's hornets got their stingers pulled, but good, Tuesday night by the inspired, fired-up Muleshoe Mules. It was basketball homecoming in Muleshoe and a full house turned out for the action in Muleshoe Junior High School gymnasium, Tulia toppled before the Mules, 72-49.

The crowd was on its feet during much of the game and the roar surely could have been heard for many blocks. Adding spice to the game was the fact that the Mules defeated Tulia in a previous game by a score of 66-56. The previous win over the Hornets was at Tulia.

Muleshoe trailed by one point at the end of the first quarter, having a score of 17-16. By halftime, the Mules had pulled out to a 34-26 lead. They were held to 12 points in the third, and at the end of the third, the scoreboard showed 46-39 and a steady pull by the Mules brought the final 72-49 score.

Fourteen fouls during the game kept the Mules at a low minimum and in no serious foul trouble throughout the game. Playing one of his better games of the season, Lionel Patterson lobbed at total of 17 points through the basket. He was followed closely by Jim Putman, with 15. Next on the list was Dennis Beene with 12; Jesse Clemmons, with a good 10; Jerry Putman, nine; Don Heathington, five; Randy Field, four and Jerry Scoggin, two points.

At halftime in the boys' varsity game, the homecoming queen and king were named. Candidates for the honor were Mulettes Ricki Richardson, Gayetta Gable and Debra Hays, and for the Mule varsity team were Lionel Patterson, Jim Putman and Dennis Beene. Debra was crowned homecoming queen and Dennis Beene basketball king.

The Muleshoe Mighty 'M' Band performed between games and during halftime activities. They were under direction of Bandmaster Jim Harvey and Drum Major Delton Bass; Vicki Julian introduced the Tulia Mulettes and the Muleshoe Mulettes prior to their game and Leland Ferris introduced the Tulia Hornets and Muleshoe Mules prior to the varsity game.

Congressman Price Holds Town Meet

Saturday morning, Congressman Bob Price was in Muleshoe for a town hall type meeting. The meeting was held at 10 a.m. in the community room of the Muleshoe State Bank. The major portion of Price's visit to the area was regarding present and future farm and agriculture legislation.

He commented, "Despite all the talk of bringing industry to rural America, agriculture will continue to be our most important industry in the foreseeable future."

"We on the House Agriculture Committee have begun our second year of discussions on what the shape of Federal agriculture policy will be in the 1970's. As you can tell by the fact that we have begun our second year of discussions on new farm legislation, this is no easy talk."

Price continued, "The Committee has held 22 meetings with Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin and his staff, as well as listening to countless hours of testimony from representatives of various farm and commodity organizations."

"This week, we have begun work on a bill which has evolved from our discussions with Secretary Hardin. It involves dairying, cotton, wheat and feed grains. Of course, the latter three are of primary interest to our area."

"Three major features of the bill include: Tighter control by Congress on spending; More crop flexibility for the farmer and \$110,000 ceiling on per-acre payments."

"The bill includes the set-aside concept, which like the present program provides for the diversion of a portion of land. The amount to be diverted would be calculated on the basis of the cotton and wheat allotments and feed grain base for each individual farm. The farmer would have greater freedom to plant the remainder of his land to whatever crop he wished. One result of our discussions with the Secretary has been an increase from an eight million acre domestic cotton allotment to 10 million acres in the latest bill."

"The farmer would receive support payments on the basis of what he produced instead of diversion payments," added the congressman.

On receiving a plant award for more than a million accident-free man-hours, plant manager Bob Drake said, "The safety record was set by you fellows."

"By your being responsible and keeping your fingers out of the hammer and your foot on the ladder, you won this plaque. I think it is real nice that I can accept this for the crew and appreciate you fellows who put out the effort to make it

Approximately 40 persons attended the Southwestern Public Service Company Plant 'X' Award Dinner at the Corral Restaurant in Muleshoe Friday night.

The banquet was held to honor workers from the plant five miles south of Earth, who completed more than one-million man hours of accident-free operation in late 1969.

Special guests included plant supervisors, maintenance foremen, production technicians and electrician foremen. From Amarillo, Cliff Morrow, plant safety supervisor attended and Roy Thomas, production superintendent for the electric company, and Phil Sterritt, Amarillo, had parts in the presentation. Special guests introduced during the dinner were Brian Maconi and Clela Williams, both of Muleshoe.

Several awards were presented at the dinner. Cliff Morrow was master of ceremonies for the meeting and awards were presented by Phil Sterritt and Morrow.

Presidential citations were presented James L. Lambert, who has worked at the plant for 18 years; Edgar Woolver, plant employee for the past 29 years; Leroy Robertson, plant employee for 12 years and D.W. Williamson, employee for 24 years. Those four employees have worked a cumulative 83 years without a lost time injury.

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Former Publisher, J. M. Forbes Dies

Joseph Melton (Scoop) Forbes, 73, who was a former editor and publisher of the Muleshoe Journal, died around 9:30 a.m. Saturday in West Plains Memorial Hospital in Muleshoe. He had lived in Muleshoe since 1945, moving here from Plainview.

He was born September 27, 1896 in Blum, Tex, and had lived in Plainview from 1920 to 1945. He was associated with the newspaper in Plainview. From 1945 to his retirement in 1961, he operated the Muleshoe Journal. Following his retirement from newspaper work, he was manager of the Muleshoe Federal Credit Union until his death. Forbes was a member of the First Baptist Church, the Muleshoe Masonic Lodge, a charter member of

the Muleshoe Rotary Club and a past member of the Muleshoe Lions Club.

Forbes attended the University of Texas, and was quite active in local civic affairs prior to his retirement. He was a veteran of World War I, having served in the U.S. Navy.

Funeral services for J.M. Forbes were held at 2 p.m. Monday in the Muleshoe First Baptist Church with the Rev. Wayne Bristow, Baptist minister from Lubbock, officiating. Burial was in Bailey County Memorial Park under direction of Singleton Funeral Home. Survivors include his wife, Mary Leona 'Tiny'; one sister, Mrs. Clara Tyson, El Paso; three brothers, Hillard Forbes, Hamilton, Colo.; L.N. Forbes, Liberty Hill, Tex. and Ben Forbes, Arlington.

Lieutenant Governor Gives Main Address

Sunny Skies, Warm Weather Greets Dignitaries, Guests

Through the combined efforts of the Commissioners' Court of Bailey County, whose members included County Judge Don Cihak, Commissioners Matt Dudley, Loyd Stephens, W.H. Eubanks and R.P. McCall, and the Muleshoe City Council, Monday was a big day in Muleshoe.

Muleshoe City Councilmen Alex Williams, Frank Ellis, Kenneth Heathington, Lindal Murray, former Councilman Irvin St. Clair, Mayor W.B. LeVeque and City Manager Albert Field joined county officials in paving the way for Monday's dedication of the combined city, county and state law enforcement and new city hall building.

The Commissioner and Councilmen had worked long hard hours to secure passage of a bond issue on September 10, 1968, for the construction of the new City Hall and Chamber of Commerce offices and the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center.

In the forefront for passage of the issue were all the local government officials involved. Approved by voters in Bailey County by a margin of almost six to one, the \$175,000 tri-law enforcement center was completed and occupied in late November, 1969. Bailey County voters approved the construction by a vote of 675-168. Officials expressed the opinion that those who voted against the bond issue, were probably as pleased with the complex as those who voted in favor of the issue.

In the City Hall and Chamber of Commerce vote, a total of \$105,000 was approved by city voters, 308-216. The new building was completed and occupied in November, 1969. Funds in the amount of \$89,000 were spent on the city building.

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Burglars Hit Three Local Businesses

First to report a burglary Wednesday morning was Mary DeShazo Elementary School. Sheriff Dee Clements and Deputy Sheriff Ken Petree answered the call. They found an outside window broken in a door to gain entry. Once inside the burglar or burglars entered the office of Principal Bill Taylor by breaking a window from a door. They jimmied open the desk in the reception office and jimmied open the coke machine in the teachers' lounge.

An undetermined amount of money was taken from the coke machine.

Second to be investigated was a break-in at the Sixth Street Texaco Service Station. The intruders broke out a window in the rear of the station and entered there.

The sheriff and deputy found that a \$5 bill was missing from the cash register and possibly some cigarettes. The sheriff reported an apparent witness to the burglary of the service station. Pictures have been made of the witness and Sheriff Clements is hopeful he can identify the burglar or burglars.

Third on the list to check was Mohawk Auto Supply. The burglars broke out a rear window in the garage and entered the building. They broke the lock from an inside door to reach the front.

Once in the front of the building, they took the money box and lifted some \$71. Sheriff Clements, Deputy Petree and Chief of Police Harold White investigated.

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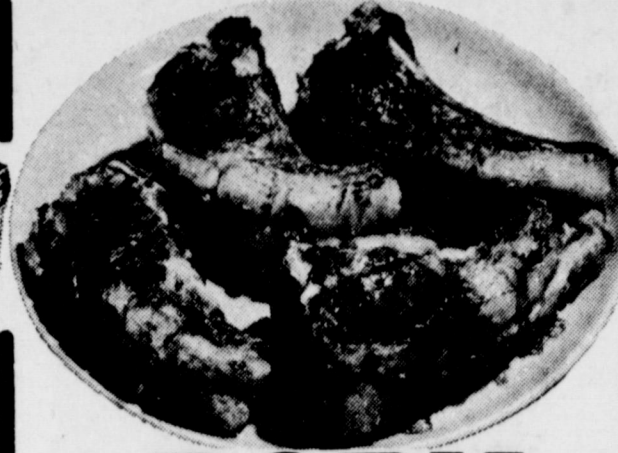

In the receiving line with Mr. and Mrs. Cannon were Mrs. Marvin Gaddy, Albert Cannon, and Aubrey Cannon.

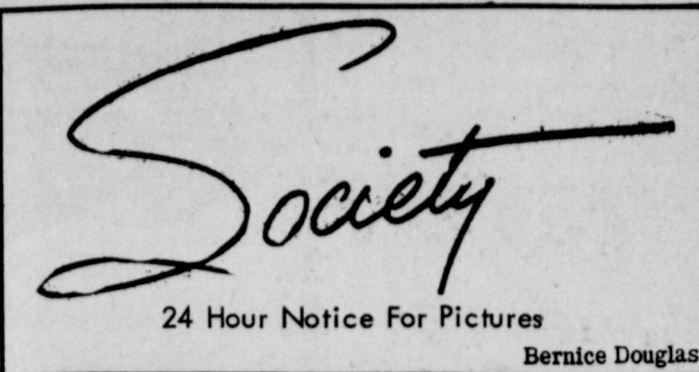
A granddaughter, Joni Cannon of Muleshoe, registered 91 guests.

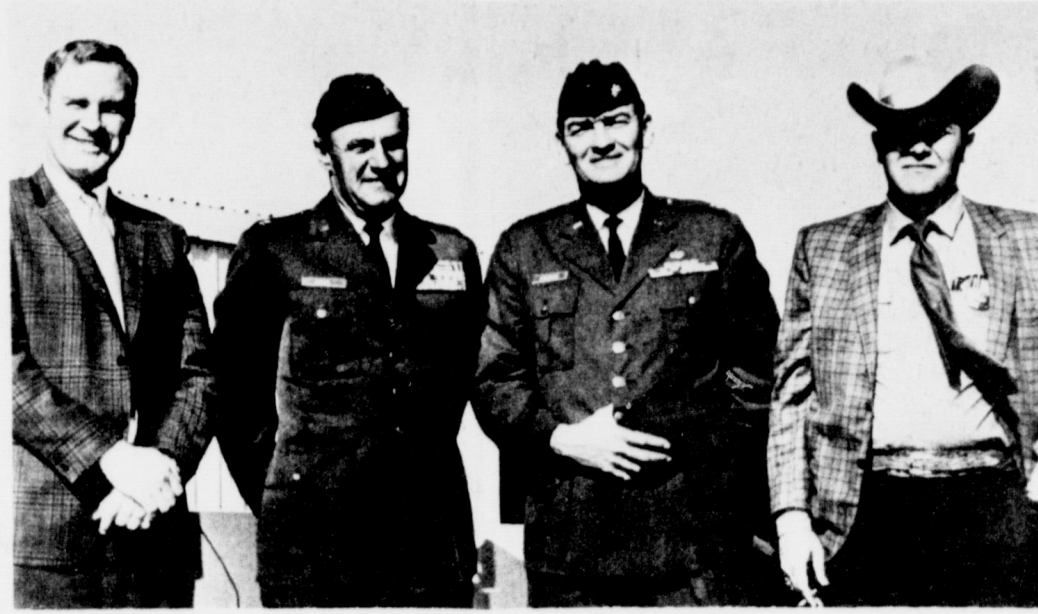

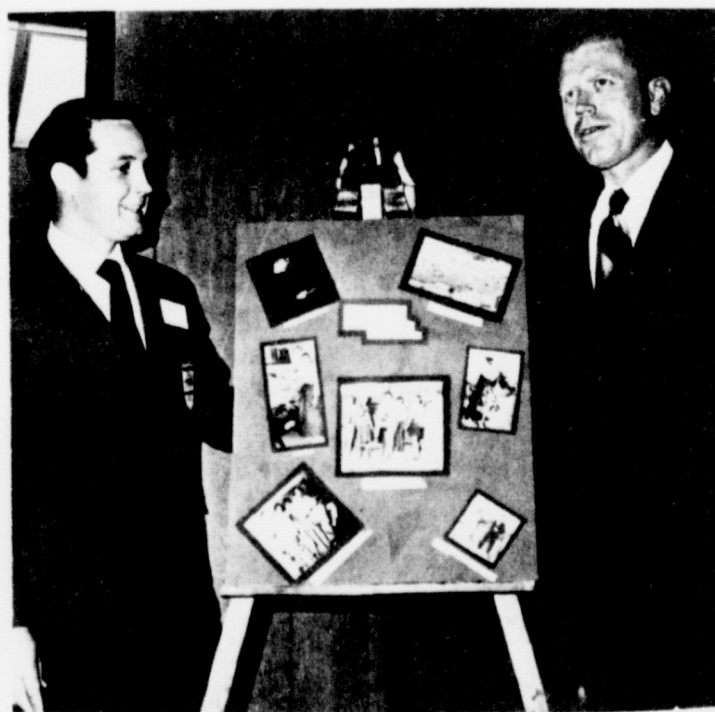

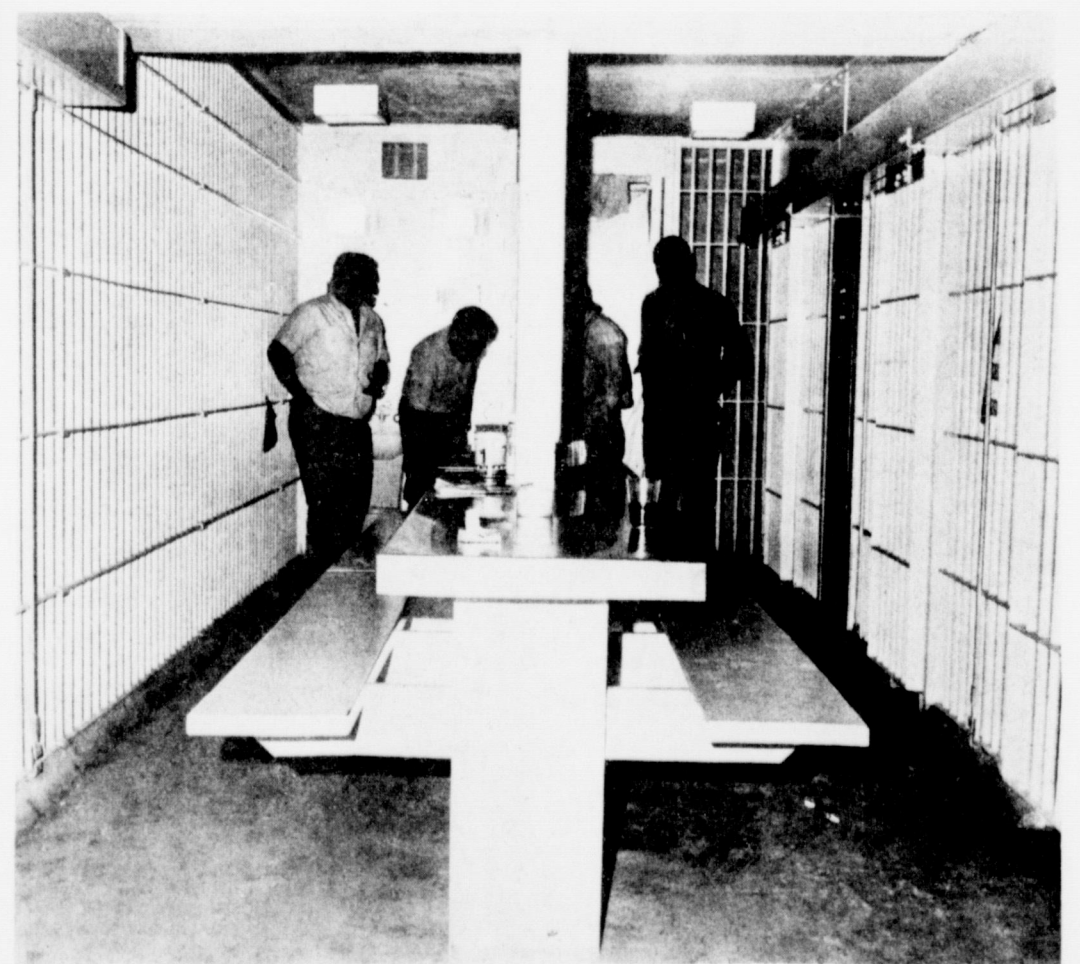

Congressman, "as under the present program, the payments for production can be enlarged to make up for diversion payments not made. It has been pointed out that this legislation might be looked upon more favorably by urban Congressmen because it does not pay farmers for not growing crops. "This program also provides for advance appropriations by Congress for payments rather than the present method of having Commodity Credit Corporation make payments and then have Congress make up the CCC deficit.
"At this point," concluded Congressman Price, "I cannot tell you what the final outcome of the new farm program will be because it hasn't been decided, however, I can assure you that I will do everything in my power to see that farm income is maintained at an adequate level."
During the meeting, Price touched on several other national problems facing the legislators. He briefly told of actions pending to control such problems.
