

The Doctors Prescription for Health

STRETCHING-THE ANTIDOTE TO INACTIVITY!

many people overlook is a routine of stretching. While it is strictly my personal opinion, I believe that routine stretching will enable a person to maintain a very good level of physical activity throughout their life.

Most experts do believe that once a person is older than 35 years of age, that stretching should become a routine part of their lifestyle. By routinely tretching, the body receives a number of age-defying benefits.

First, flexibility is increased by ncreasing the range of motion at all points of body movement. Secondly, due to the increased flexibility and range of motion, we see a significant decrease in joint stiffness.

Thirdly, due to muscle health being increased, and joint stiffness decreased, less muscle soreness occurs as a result of increased physical activity. Since most people curtail their physical activity when soreness occurs, eliminating this problem will prevent inactivity from

So, the next question that most people have is "How do I stretch?"

When stretching, the first thing to remember is this. Just as you do not want to start doing a lot immediately when morning, neither do your muscles. For this reason, a gentle warm-up period is advisable before stretching. A simple thing to do is slightly walking fast, or riding a stationary bike for a few minutes. These types of activities are very helpful.

The warming up period does several very beneficial things. The blood flow to your muscles is increased, which results in the temperature within the muscle increasing. Consequently, because the muscle is warmed up, it will stretch further. Since the goal of stretching is to stretch the muscle, this is a critical preliminary step.

Breathing in and out in a slow and deep manner makes your stretching routine much more effective. Particularly, when stretching your back or abdominal muscles, this is true.

If we think about stretching as a positive healthy activity, what activities would result in the opposite conditions for the human body?








So I stuck, though I'll admit that they is few sensations more onpleasant than having a hoss as big as Cap'n Kidd roll on you nine or ten


