THE WELFARE COUNCIL'S FIRST YEAR RECORD


About a year ago a group of local people organized the Crockett County Welfare Council. It has had a rather impressive record. Many cases of emergency need have been met.

southwest of the Tippett (Wolfcamp) field of Crockett County, 11 miles southeast of McCamey, was continuing to test.

The project flowed 10 barrels of cil and 103 barrels of water through tubing and perforations between 4,195-4,350 feet in 211/2 hours. Operator acidized with 3,-000 gallons. The project flowed 20 barrels of load oil and 18 barrels of acid water in one hour, then died. After being swabbed one time, the well kicked off and flowed eight barrels of oil and 158 barrels of water in 91/2 hours. Gas-oil ratio was 78,050-1.

Total depth is 6,911 feet; plugged back depth, 4,617 feet. -000-
