No modern market researcher in his right mind would name a cigarette Camel or an automobile Chevrolet. The products sold in spite of such unlikely names.

In truth, no manufacturer whatever his resources or advertising budget sells the public what it does not want. Advertising at best only informs the public on goods and services available.

W. H. Caldwell Honored After Thirty Years Of Service

William H. Caldwell was honored last Saturday at Area 14 Soil Conservation Service annual picnic, held at Lakewood Recreation Center on Highway 36, East of Cross Plains.

Caldwell received a 30-year length-of-service award certificate and a Federal Civilian Career Service Emblem. These awards were presented to him by E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist, SCS, headquartered at Brownwood, while fellow employees, their families and friends looked on.

Caldwell is a Soil Conservation Technician with the SCS on Baird WU staff. He entered the SCS December 15, 1935 at Garland, and worked on Duck Creek erosion project.

In April, 1939, Caldwell was transferred to Abilene to work in the water facility office there. In 1941, when Soil and Water Conservation Districts were organized, he was one of the Abilene work unit staff that assisted the district in providing technical assistance to farmers and ranchers in carrying out their conservation plans.

He entered the Armed Forces

in May, 1943, and served with the 35th Combat Engineering Battalion in the European Theater. After being discharged as a Corporal in December, 1945, Caldwell returned to the SCS in Abilene January 2, 1946, and worked there until July, 1946. He was then transferred to Baird to help set up a SCS office, and is presently located in Baird.

FOUR PEOPLE RECEIVE INJURIES IN ONE CAR ACCIDENT SAT.

Four people were injured late Saturday night when a tire blew out on the car in which they were riding. The accident occurred about six miles east of Baird.

Injured in the one-car mishap were A2c Larry Washington and A2c Bob Goode, both of Dyess AFB, and Miss Judy Graham and Miss Kitty Anderson, both of Abilene.

The airmen were taken to Dyess AFB hospital where they were listed in fair condition. Both suffered lacerations and Washington had a possible broken jaw.

Miss Anderson was taken by a Godfrey Funeral Home ambulance to Callahan County Hospital, where she was held for observation. Miss Graham received minor injuries and was taken home by her parents.

The accident, on IH 20, occurred about 11:25 p. m. Saturday when one of the car's tires blew out. The car skidded 180 feet while straddling the median, then jumped a 6-foot

deep culvert 25 feet wide and skinned 164 feet further. Investigating the accident were Baird Deputy Sheriff Hoot McGowan, Clyde Deputy Luke Taylor, Baird Constable Glen Curtis, Highway Patrolman H. D. Welch and Cross Plains Deputy J. H. Cox.

SPENCER APPOINTED TO HOME ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE

Mr. Frank P. Spencer of Rt. 1, Cross Plains, has been appointed to the three man Callahan County Farmers Administration Committee, it has been announced by Mr. John H. Curvey, County Supervisor. The appointment is for a three year term beginning July 1, 1967.

Mr. Spencer succeeds Harold Holden of Clyde, and will join the other two members of the committee, who are, Robert L. Hicks of Rt. 1, Clyde, and Ernest M. Higgins, Star Rt. 1, Baird. The three member committee serves in an advisory capacity to the County Supervisor and makes determinations as to eligibility for loan advances for the Agency. They are also frequently called upon by the County Supervisor to render assistance in the servicing of loans and the development of other community services.

The Farmers Home Administration does not compete with private lenders in the field of agricultural credit; however, they supplement such sources of credit and make loans on a long term basis for the development of farms and ranches as well as improvements of community facilities, and provide housing for rural residents. One of the most important programs is the family-type loan to young farmers in ever-increasing numbers throughout the State. Recent authorizations have been given the Agency by Congress to make loans for recreation facilities for rural residents as well as financing multiple housing for senior citizens and labor housing association. Another of the more extensive

loan programs include that of making small loans for small towns and communities for the establishment or improvement of water and waste disposal systems.

Callahan, Coleman and Runnels Counties are serviced by the Farmers Home Administration office located in Coleman County State Bank Building, at Coleman. Office hours are 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Monday through Friday, except on legal holidays. Mr. Curry is in the Callahan County office on each Monday from 10:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon. The Callahan County office is located on the 3rd floor of the Courthouse in Baird.

nity estate you do not have to
file a Federal estate tax return
unless the estate has a fair mar-
ket value of \$120,000 or more on
the date of death of either
spouse.

The Federal gift tax rules al-
low you to give anyone — in-
cluding an heir — \$3000 tax free
each year. A husband and wife
can give \$6000 to each heir tax
free. You also have a separate
\$30,000 lifetime exemption for
each spouse. You can give this
amount to one person or many
persons.

There are many ways that you
can give your estate away, but
you must do it three years be-
fore the date of your death to
avoid IRS questioning the gifts.

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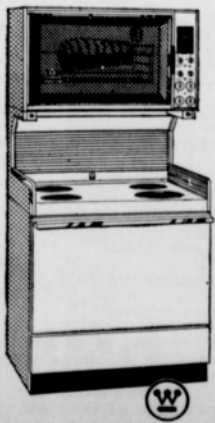
