## Voters Approve \$250,000 Bonds For Water Dist.

### Ten-Year Water, Sewer Expansion Plans Given Voters Okay

Ozona voters, property owners living within the bounds of the Ozona townsite, boundary of the Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District, Saturday approved by a one-sided vote a proposal to issue \$250,000 in bonds over the next ten years to take care of water and sewer expansion needs in the city.

The vote was 121 for the bond issue and 18 against. The election was set for the same day of the Democratic run-off primary but was held in a separate voting place in the courthouse. A total of 531 votes were cast in the primary election, but many voters overlooked the special bond election.

The big bond issue was proposed by the board of directors of the water district after a study of the possible long range needs of the district for expanding its water and sewer service in a growing Ozona.

The directors have announced that they plan to issue only about \$70,000 in the bonds in the immediate future, this to take care of indebtedness incurred in recent extensions into new additions to the city which sprang up after the 1954 flood and to meet the costs of providing additional storage and new water sources.

The district this week is making a test on the new well drilled last year on the hill on the west side of Ozona. The well was acidized last week and efforts were being made to rig up a pump this week to test the results. The well, tested soon after drilling, did not measure up to the capacity of the wells on the east side but a showing of around 200 gallons a minute left hope that by acidizing the well it could be made a good enough producer to meet needs of additional storage which is planned on the west hill.

Should the west side well fail to measure up, directors indicate that a new well may be drilled near the present three producers on the east hill, with a booster pump to provide satisfactory pressure to the new hilltop developments and to equalize and improve the pressure and supply on a townwide basis. Sewer expansions which go along with water extensions are also in the budgeted expenses.

Another item in the immediate planning is a \$25,000 item to pay the local part of the cost of adding to one of the new flood control dams to provide a reserve water supply for Ozona in the event town growth should outrun the present underground supply or there should be a failure of this supply or its pollution.

Soil Conservation Service engineers have indicated that a municipal supply of impounded water sufficient to meet needs of the city, on the basis of present consumption rate, for a period of ten years can be provided by adding to the dam on Gurley draw east of Ozona. This additional dam height can be purchased by the water district at a cost of \$25,000 now, whereas if it were later attempted after the dam, which would be designed as a retardation structure only, was completed, the cost would be nearer \$100,000.

The balance of the \$250,000 issue, authorized by the voters, will not be sold unless and until rapid city growth presents a need for expansion of the system beyond its financial capacity from current receipts.

Maskey confessed to disrobing in daylight outside a local tourist court. Another incident involving indecent exposure was confessed by the prisoner but no charge has yet been filed in connection with this incident.

Meanwhile, Sheriff V. O. Earnest said an intensive investigation is being made into the man's background and he may be taken to Austin in the near future for a lie detector test to determine his possible connection with a recent major crime here.

## George Sauer To Speak At Annual Grid Banquet Here

### Posse Banquet Honors Players And Dads On Tuesday Night

George Sauer, Athletic Director and former head football coach at Baylor University, will be the featured speaker at the Ozona Sheriff's Posse Barbecue to be held in honor of the football team and the male members of the Ozona school faculty at the girls' gym Tuesday night, Sept. 4, at 7:30 o'clock.

Mr. Sauer was an All-American fullback at Nebraska during his college days and is considered to have turned in the best performance for a fullback in the history of the East-West Shrine game held each year.

As a Coach Mr. Sauer started at New Hampshire where his teams at the normally unrecognized school won national recognition. From New Hampshire, Sauer moved to Kansas where the Jay Hawkes managed to whip Oklahoma and go to the Orange bowl.

After his outstanding success at Kansas, Mr. Sauer went to the Naval Academy where a dispute about who would hire his aids caused him to resign.

A few days after his resignation at the Naval Academy he became head coach at Baylor University succeeding Bob Woodruff who had moved to Florida.

During his tenure as football coach at Baylor the Bears played in the Orange Bowl in 1952 and did not finish less than third until the 1955 campaign when a training scandal wrecked the team.

Following the 1955 team Mr. Sauer became Athletic director at Baylor and Sam Boyd who spoke at the football banquet last spring became football coach.

Coaches Fred Hickman and Byron Cleere will introduce the football squad before the program begins. Posse President Frankie Jones has expressed the hope that as many of the Posses as possible will be present for the annual affair.

An added attraction for the program will be the music of a band composed of Bill Cooper, Jim Ferguson, Corbett Smith and Jimmy Carroll.

## Drought Emergency Program Extended

Walter T. McKay, State Director Farmers Home Administration, last week advised George H. James, County Supervisor, of the extension of the Emergency Feed Grain program in Crockett, Reagan & Sutton counties. Farmers Home Administration county committees may now take applications from farmers and ranchers through October 1, 1956 to provide feed for basic livestock herds through October 31, 1956.

The emergency feed grain program is now authorized in 185 counties in Texas, Mr. McKay advised.

## Daniel & Wilson Favored By Voters In Run-Off Here

### Less Than Half First Primary Voters Cast Run-Off Ballots

U. S. Senator Price Daniel, apparent winner in a closely contested run-off race for governor of Texas over Ralph Yarborough, Austin attorney, who was making his third try for the high state office, was favored by voters of Crockett county Saturday in the Democratic run-off primary.

Local voters, about half the number who voted in the first primary in July, picked another winner in Will Wilson of Dallas, former Texas Supreme Court justice, who was nominated for Attorney General of Texas over Tom Moore, Waco district attorney. The vote was 404 for Wilson to 125 for Moore. The voting for governor was a bit closer, 294 for Price Daniel to 237 for Ralph Yarborough. Lieut. Governor Ben Ramsey, unopposed on the ballot for the office of Lieutenant Governor of Texas, was given a vote of 451 in this county. The Lieutenant Governor failed to win a majority in the first primary but his run-off opponent, Senator Aikin, withdrew from the run-off race.

One Crockett county voter apparently didn't cotton to the idea of a fellow breezing through a run-off primary without an opponent so he scratched Ramsey's name from the ballot and wrote in his choice for the office.

But even if a lot of other voters in Texas had caught Ramsey, it would have been a little difficult for the winner to have attended to the duties of the office. The write-in candidate was Bascomb Giles, former Texas land commissioner, who is down at Huntsville serving a six-year sentence for his part in the veterans land scandal.

But then Giles was re-elected term after term for 19 years as land commissioner and maybe the dissident voter just couldn't feature a Texas ballot without his name on it.

## Ellenburger Discovery Results From Attempts To Increase Gasser

Crockett County has gained an Ellenburger oil discovery with the reworking of Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1-127 University, former gas discovery, in 7-56-University Lands, in the Northwest edge of the County.

The project was finalized for a daily potential of 31 barrels of oil, gravity unreported, with gas-oil ratio of 6,450-1.

Production was through a 1/4-inch choke and perforations between 8,236-68 feet which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons.

The project originally was completed March 14, 1954 as a shut-in gas well in the Ellenburger for a calculated daily flow of 2,400,000 cubic feet of gas. Production was through perforations between 8,236-68 feet.

Unable to secure a gas outlet, operator re-entered the project in March, 1956, trying to increase gas production. Retesting resulted in the oil production.

## Kerr-McGee Slates Stepout In Crockett

Kerr-McGee Oil Industries, Inc. of Midland has filed application to drill the No. 3 University, one location east of production in the Farmer (San Andres) field of Crockett County, eight miles south of Big Lake.

It will be drilled to 2,550 feet with rotary.

Location, on a 305.45 acre lease, is 1,650 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of 1-50-University.

## Soil Conservation Officials To Meet On Dam Plans Fri.

### First Step Toward Construction Taken In Meeting Here

Three officials of the United States Soil Conservation Service will meet with members of the Crockett County Commissioners Court, supervisors of the Crockett Soil Conservation District and members of the local Flood Control committee here Friday for the initial step toward start of actual construction of flood retardation dams on Johnson Draw watershed.

The meeting is scheduled to begin at 9:30 a. m., in the local office of Rob Scott, Work Unit Conservationist, stationed here.

Bob Peery from the Washington office of the SCS and W. T. Moon and Harold Baker from the state headquarters of the Service at Temple will compose the group to meet with local officials.

One of the purposes of the meeting will be to sign final agreements between the SCS, representing the government agency through which federal funds will be made available for the local project, and the local sponsoring agencies, the Commissioners Court and the Soil Conservation District.

The local sponsoring agencies will have the responsibility of letting and administering contracts for construction of the dams and the final maintenance of the installations when they are completed.

Approval of the Johnson Draw final plan was obtained in gress and under amendments to the small watershed control law, Public Law 566, formerly stipulated waiting periods before the Congress were reduced to make the local project finally approved before adjournment of Congress. The Poage amendment, which was signed by the President after adjournment of the Congress, reduced the local cost share proportion of the flood control projects, to the extent that all actual construction costs will be borne by the government. This amendment saved Crockett county \$175,000 of a \$200,000 bond issue approved as local cost-share part of the dam construction.

SCS officials have indicated that preparation of detailed plans and specifications and other preliminary work will get under way in the next few weeks and that the way will be cleared for actual letting of contracts and construction to begin shortly after the first of January, 1957. Completion of at least three of the dams during the present fiscal year, ending next July, is already assured, with available funds, and completion of the entire project within the next year is probable, officials have indicated.

## Permian Discovery Made In Crockett

An unidentified Permian discovery was assured in Crockett County with the pumping of new oil at Texas Gulf Producing Co. No. 1-T University, in 16-47-University, 16 miles southeast of Big Lake.

On a 24-hour test through perforations between 1,956-68 feet, recovery was 35 barrels of oil and one barrel of water.

The project is 1 1/2 miles southeast of the Block 47 (Shallow) field, which produces from between 1,965-2,280 feet.

## Shell To Drill Deep Wildcat In Crockett

Shell Oil Co. of Odessa has filed application to drill the No. 1 Aldridge 3/4-mile northeast of production in the World, West (Strawn) field of Crockett County, 18 miles south-southwest of Big Lake.

It will be drilled to 8,500 feet with rotary. Estimated elevation is 2,820 feet.

Location, on a 486.8-acre lease, is 510 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of 55-BB-TCRR.

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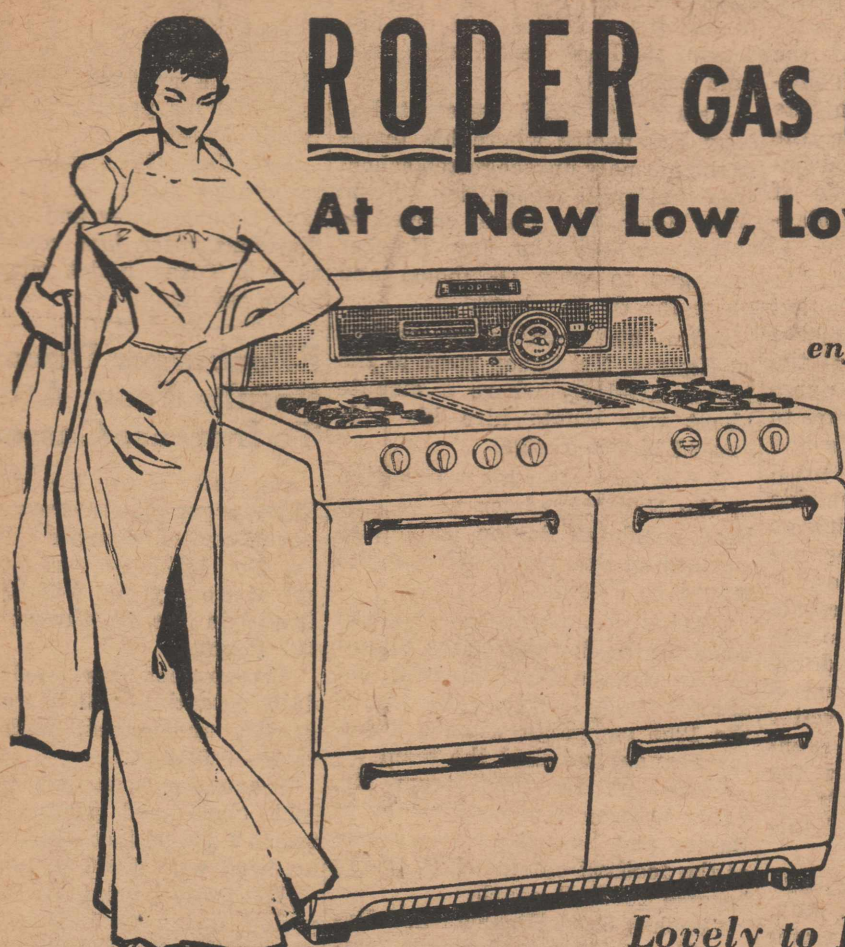
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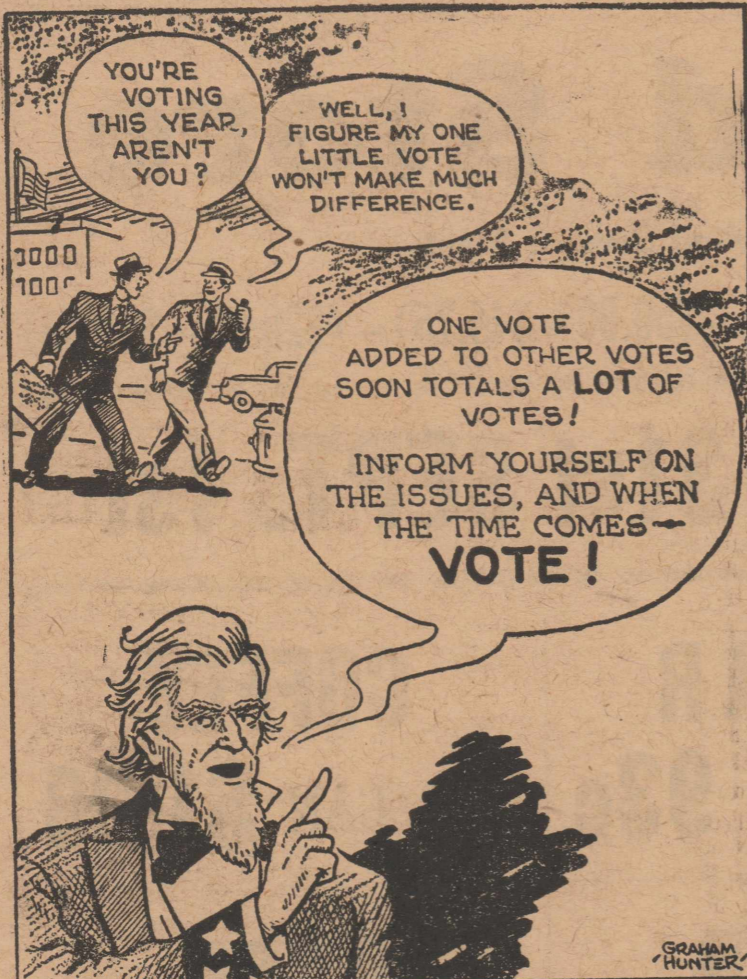

From State Capitol**

Austin, Texas — National party candidates have been decided. State Democratic primaries are over. Texas' political focus now shifts to the upcoming state Democratic convention.

Nervous tension is apparent in Liberal-Loyalist ranks. They are fearful of losing control of the Sept. 11 meeting through the Conservatives' executive committee left in power last spring. That committee decides which of numerous contesting delegations will gain seats.

Navarro County Judge Jim Sewell, Liberal-Loyalist spokesman, asked recall of the "recessed" spring convention on the eve of the new convention.

It was apparently without hope. Permanent Chairman Raymond Buck of Fort Worth said he could see no reason for it. Executive Committee Chairman George Sandlin termed the Liberal demands "the cry of the vanquished." He has promised all contestants a fair shake in credentials hearings.

U. S. Sen. Lyndon Johnson may play a key role again. He has said he will be present. He assured Liberals in Chicago that he will use his influence to install leaders who will work for party victory in November.

Sheffield gets 10 years — B. R. Sheffield of Brady is the second person to be convicted in the veterans land scandals. Sentence was assessed at 10 years.

Former Land Commissioner Bascom Giles is now serving a six-year sentence.

Predecision was made meanwhile that the state may end up making a profit instead of losing money from its veterans land troubles.

Losers in the suits filed by the state are being required to return the money paid to them by the state plus three per cent interest. Texas, however, pays only 2 1/2 per cent interest on the bond issues

which financed the \$100,000,000 lending program.

Recoveries now total roughly \$1,800,000.

New drought plan ready — A new drought aid plan now is ready to help Texas farmers and ranchers buy roughage for livestock.

Applications for roughage should be filed with County Farmers Home Administration officers. If determined eligible by the local FHA committee, the farmer is issued certificates valued at \$7.50 a ton. Certificates may be applied on the purchase of roughage from any dealer.

Another phase of the expanded federal relief program also is moving forward. Texas Drought Emergency Committee has recommended that 106 counties be made eligible for increased aid in grain buying.

Water test case slated — Texas water laws will be tested in a suit filed by the state in behalf of 15 domestic and livestock users in South Texas.

Suit was filed by the State Board of Water Engineers in district court at Karnes City. It seeks to protect riparian owners along Cibolo Creek from withdrawals by irrigators. Hearing is to begin Wednesday.

Board Chairman R. M. Dixon said irrigators have rights only to the storm and flood waters from the creek. These have been non-existent for a long time, he said.

Since the suit is the first of its kind ever filed, the decision is expected to set state-wide precedent.

### Invite Check Social Security Accounts

Social security accounts, as well as bank accounts, should be checked periodically to be sure of proper credits advises Ed Bowers manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office.

Everyone in Crockett county who has worked under social security during the past three years or more should check to see that all of his earnings have been properly credited, Bowers continued. A social security account can be checked by getting a free post card from the Social Security District Office at 307 Federal Building, San Angelo. The statement which will be received as a result of mailing the form can be checked against personal records of wages and self-employment earnings.

In this way, Mr. Bowers concluded, each person can be sure that he and his family will receive all the benefits that they are entitled to from social security.


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
