## Baby Contest To Feature Musical Home Talent Show

### ESA Sponsored Event To Choose King and Queen of Tots

The titles of King and Queen, Prince and Princess, and Duke and Duchess will be at stake for scores of the Ozona infant and small fry set with the baby contest to be held in connection with the ESA Sorority sponsored musical, "Fortunes for Faney." The benefit on the show and contest will be the Sorority's Youth-Welfare Projects which include the Girl Scouts, Polio Fund and Crippled Children's Hospital at San Angelo. The show will be presented at H. S. Auditorium Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 24 and 25. The contest opens next Saturday morning and will close the last night of the show (Tuesday, 25th,) at the auditorium with a ceremony on stage, in which the winners will be crowned and presented with awards. There will be 5 runners-up.

The winners will be determined on a basis of 1c a vote, and vote containers will be placed around at various places of business, with a limit of two jars to a business house. The members of the committee will count the jars each day and a standing list will be posted on the baby contest display window in a downtown store by noon each day.

All babies of Ozona are urged to enter the contest. It is pointed out that the contest is all in fun, but for a very serious purpose; however a very valuable grand prize will be given the parents of the overall winner. The six winners will all receive, loving cups with prizes going to the five runners-up. The age limit is five years old and under. More than sixty babies have been entered to date, with the entry list still climbing. Anyone wishing to enter their child to assist this benefit should call Mrs. F. W. The committee announces that, even though the members of the sorority will count the votes each morning, the routes will be switched, so it will be impossible for anyone counting to keep track of the number of votes any one child has. This information will be kept on a Master Sheet by the two directors, and will be available to no one else until the night of the ceremony, when the amounts taken in by the winners will be announced.

## School Enrollment Climbs Past 900 Mark

Total enrollment in the Ozona schools went over the 900 mark, a new record, this week, enrollment gaining 30 pupils over that for the opening day of schools, Supt. L. B. T. Sikes reported. The total for all schools yesterday was 905 pupils.

The largest gain in enrollment was in the South Elementary, which has added 12 since the opening day. Junior High gained 8, the North Elementary 5, High School 3, and Lockett school 2.

The enrollment by schools this week was: High School, 175; Junior High, 140; North Elementary, 316; South Elementary, 238, and Lockett school, 28.

## Auxiliary Supply Of Water Thot Possible In West Hill Well

Tests under way this week at the water well drilled some months ago on the hill west of Ozona gave promise that an auxiliary supply, independent of the source of water from wells on the east hill, may be made available to augment the supply presently being pumped into the mains and storage.

Although tests were still under way, operators were hopeful that the well would maintain a pumping rate of at least 200 gallons a minute, which would be a sufficient yield to justify rigging the well and pumping into the mains from the west side to stabilize pressures and add to the available volume of water.

The well was given a dry acid treatment Monday and on first tests, the well pumped at the rate of about 125 to 150 gallons a minute. The pump was lowered in the hole by another section and for 40 minutes pumped at the rate of approximately 275 gallons a minute. The water suddenly muddied and after that settled back to a steady production rate of about 200 gallons a minute. Further testing was under way.

### Big Lake Clips Lions 46-19 In Season's Grid Opener

It was a case of too many big Big Lake Owls and too many mistakes for the Ozona Lions last Friday night as they opened their 1956 season by taking a 46 to 19 pasting before a crowd of over 2000.

The win was a sweet revenge for the talent-laden Owls who last year took a 25 to 0 pasting from the Lions.

For Ozona all was not dark despite the score. Bobby Sutton paced a Lion second half offense that gave the big Owls headaches and sore feet constantly. Sutton ran and passed brilliantly and gave real promise of living up to his advance billing.

Coach Pete Hickman was able to use only fourteen men in the contest and some of them played as little as one play while Big Lake was able to almost play by platoons with each sub being fully as big or bigger than the one whose place he took.

The first score in the contest came in the fading seconds of the first quarter when Big Lake pounced on an Ozona fumble on the Lions own 31 yard line. James Matlock made the first of four tallies for the night by plunging over from the four yard line. Johnson converted and the score was 7 to 0.

The Lions did not wilt and roundly outplayed the Owls through the second quarter but again a costly fumble, this time of a kick on the Lion sixteen yard line, put Big Lake in position to score.

Matlock raced, over from the six with less than a minute left in the half. Johnson's extra point try was not good and the Lions (Continued on Page 5)

## Lions Try For First Win Against Coahoma Here Friday Evening

The Ozona Lions will be seeking their first win of the season Friday night when they face the Coahoma Bulldogs at Lion Stadium. The kickoff is scheduled at 8 p. m. The Lions emerged from last week's clash with Big Lake with nothing more than a few bruises and are expected to be at full strength for the Coahoma contest. Coaches Fred Hickman and Sonny Cleere have been working hard apparent Friday night.

The Lion Coaches were particularly displeased with the way the defense behaved but pointed out that Big Lake's vast superiority in man power was in part responsible for some of the Lions troubles.

The Lion squad was bolstered Monday by the addition of four new members including Jesus Ramos, a junior squadman from last year's team Erwin Reeves an ineligible transfer from Monahans who has two years of eligibility, and Humberto Cervantez and Bobby Rivera who have no previous experience.

Coahoma, according to scouting reports, will field a strong club again this year. Last year the Lions managed a hard fought 20 to 7 win over the Bulldogs in Coahoma with the game being a lot closer than the score would indicate. Leading 13 to 7, the Lions had to put up a goal line stand in the fading minutes of the third quarter to keep the Bulldogs from tying the score or going ahead.

The Lions came back to score again in the fourth period on a long run by Bobby Sutton but until then the game was in doubt.

Advance information is that the two clubs this year will be about equal in reserve strength with Coahoma having a little weight advantage in the first eleven.

Encouraging performance by some of the Lion reserves in the past few days may forecast more reserve strength for the Lions in the games to come. B. B. Ingham in particular has been impressive.

## San Andres Discovery Pumps 30 Bbls. Daily

Texas Gulf Producing Co. No. 1-T University, in 16-47-University Crockett County San Andres discovery located 16 miles southeast of Big Lake and 1 1/2 miles southeast of the Block 47 Shallow field, was completed for a daily pumping potential of 30.16 barrels of oil and 5.80 barrels of water.

Production was through perforations between 1,719-23 feet; 1,732-38 feet; 1,744-56 feet; 1,767-71 feet; 1,790-1,807 feet; 1,810-15 feet; 1,821-29 feet; 1,864-78 feet; and 1,956-68 feet.

Gravity of the oil was 35 degrees; gas-oil ratio, 1,815-1.

## Crockett Block 56 Field Is Designated

The Railroad Commission of Texas, Oil and Gas Division, has announced field designation and allowable for a Crockett County field.

The Block 56 (Ellenburger) field was opened Aug. 29 with re-completion of Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1-127 University-Crockett, in 7-56-University, 6 1/2 miles northeast of Buckhorn, for a daily flowing potential of 31 barrels of oil with gas-oil ratio 6,450-1.

Production was through a 1/4-inch choke and perforations between 8, 236-68 feet.

Daily allowable is 31 barrels of oil.

## Alabama Woman Killed In Crash East Of Ozona

### Two Children Injured; Navy Man Unhurt In Daylight Crash

Mrs. Lucille Strain Campbell, 37, of Mobile, Alabama, died shortly after reaching the Crockett Co. Hospital Monday afternoon from injuries suffered when her car, a 1956 Mercury, was in collision with a Chevrolet station wagon driven by Alexander Joseph Fremer, a Navy man, about four miles east of Ozona on Highway 290.

Mrs. Campbell's two children, Carol Jones, 18, and Nancy Campbell, 4 months, were injured in the wreck and were dismissed from the hospital after treatment. Fremer escaped with only slight injuries.

Mrs. Campbell and her children were traveling east, on their way to Houston from Salem, Ore., after a visit with Mrs. Campbell's mother, Miss Jones was scheduled to enroll in the University of Houston, Texas.

Investigating Highway Patrol officers said that Fremer's car went into a skid at the top of a hill, turned completely around and crossed the highway in front of the oncoming Campbell car, which crashed head on into the rear of the station wagon.

Jack Wilkins of Ozona, accompanied by an employe, was traveling toward Ozona and had just met the Campbell car when the crash occurred. He sent the baby on to the hospital in his pickup and remained at the wreck site until officers arrived. The baby suffered only minor injuries. Miss Jones suffered a broken arm and lacerations.

The body of Mrs. Campbell was sent to Mobile for funeral services by the Cody Funeral Home here.



### The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From Stockman Sept. 15, 1927

Blowing in early Saturday morning at 990 feet with a gush of oil and gas, the Gulf No. 1 George L. Thompson on the western edge of Crockett county extended the wonder shallow oil pool of the world, the Yates field in eastern Pecos county, into Crockett county a short distance. The well was flowing a nestimated 40 barrels hourly from brown-sandy lime, with the tool stuck in the hole nine feet from the bottom.

The well is 150 feet from the south and west lines of Sec. 71, block 1, I&GN survey. Gulf No. 1 Thompson is the first Crockett county producer outside the Powell field, discovered late in May, 1924, by the World Oil Co.

Harrison L. Hamer has resigned his position as special officer and inspector for the Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn. He was appointed last winter and has been working since that time.

Work on the foundation for the new West Texas Utilities Co. building here was started this week after the work of filling in the building site with dirt from the street cut in front had been completed.

W. A. Adams, Crockett county ranchmen for 13 years and in the ranching business continuously for the past 29 years, has leased his eight section ranch northeast of Ozona and sold all his livestock on the ranch to Walter Childress of Ozona.

Immunization of all Ozona residents against typhoid fever and especially those who live near homes that have had cases of the disease was urged this week by Dr. G. L. Coates, county health officer, as a means of preventing further spread of the disease.

Congressman C. B. Hudspeth, who has been in Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, for the past eight weeks, will leave today for his home in El Paso from where he will go, under doctor's orders, to northern California. Strain and overwork in attending his duties as Congressman is believed the

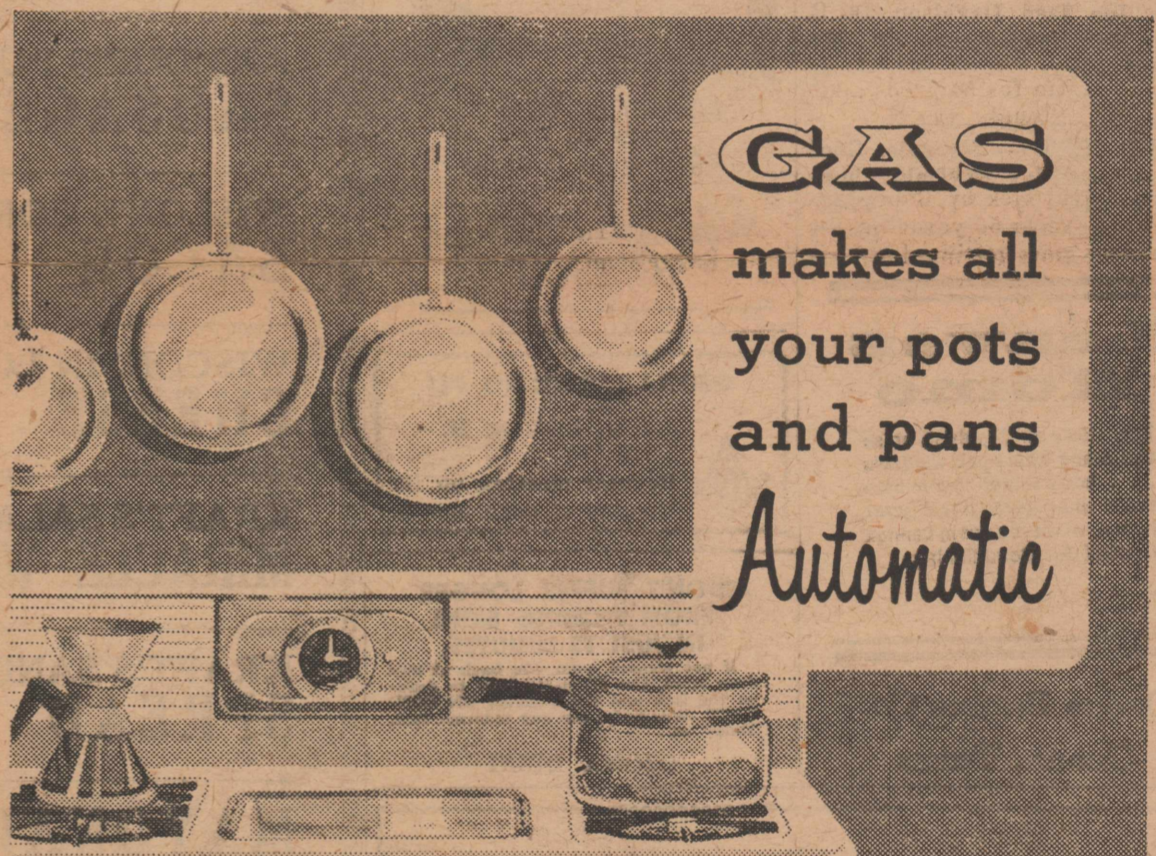
