Two Hospitalized Following Tragedy

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon for two area children who died of exposure in the Friday night sneak snow and ice storm.

Judge J.R. Thornton of Farwell ruled that the two youngsters died Friday night at an indefinite time after they left their car which had stalled in the sudden storm.

Luis Rodriguez Jr. was born July 12, 1961 at Port Lavaca and was a second grader in the Bovina Elementary School and his sister, Micaela Rodriguez was born March 4, 1963 in Brownfield. She was a first grader in the Bovina School. They had lived with their father Luis Rodriguez Sr., two sisters and a brother on Route One, Bovina for the past five

By High Plains

A cooperative study by the High Plains Research Foundation and the Texas Water Development Board of the effects of using runoff water in recharging wells on the High Plains has been agreed upon by the Foundation and the Board, Tom Longnecker, director of the High Plains Research Foun-

dation, announced today. The objective of the study, Longnecker said, is to deter-mine the effects of recharge of surface water into the Ogallala groundwater reservoir. The study, Longnecker added, would determine the effect of the recharge on the movement of water to and from the well, the effect of suspended solids The fourteen census workers on the aquifer characteristics, The study will be carried out by personnel from the High Plains Research Foundation at Plainview. The recharge and observation wells to be used in the study are located on the Paul Stukey farms northeast of Plainview. The 61st Legislature ap-

propriated \$20,000 to the Tex-Water Development Board as for its share of the costs of the two-year study. The remainder of the funds, \$28,264, will be provided by the Foundation during the study period. Longnecker said a progress report on the study will be made to the Foundation and the Board by the end of this year. The final report will be sub-

and a brother of the dead children around 8 a.m. Saturday. He had gone to a field to shut off an irrigation well and heard voices calling for help. He said he found Lupe Rodriguez, 22; Eva Rodriguez, 11 and Romero Rodriguez, 10 in an old barn. The elder girl told Shelby and Ambrose Flores, who accompanied him, that two younger members of the family were missing. Flores, who works for the telephone company out of Hereford, had been stranded during the storm and Shelby was attempting to get him out to the highway at the time they discovered the tragedy.

The snow covered body of Micaela was found in a ditch and the body of her brother, Luis Jr., was discovered a few minutes later in a field. Both bodies were near the old barn where the elder children had sought shelter.
