

Funeral Services Held Here Sunday For Robt. J. Cooke

Pioneer Ozona Merchant Died Friday At Age of 81

Funeral services for R. J. (Bob) Cooke, 81, pioneer Ozona merchant and revered citizen of Crockett county for 53 years, were held at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon from the First Baptist Church. Rev. Troy Dale, pastor, conducted the services, with deacons of the church, of which he was a lifetime member, acting as pallbearers. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Cooke died in the Crockett County Hospital at 8:30 o'clock Friday evening after an illness of several weeks.

Born in Glen Rose, Texas, August 16, 1875, Mr. Cooke came to Crockett county in 1897. He drove a herd of sheep from Edwards county to Crockett county for his future father-in-law, the late T. W. Patrick, pioneer ranchman of this county.

Mr. Cooke won local fame as a meat market operator and as creator of a patented method of cooking barbecue which has made his tasty creations sought all over the country. He first began in the market business at about the turn of the century when he operated a market here for the late J. W. Henderson. He later bought the market from Mr. Henderson and operated the business continuously in Ozona until his retirement in 1936, when he turned the business over to his son, Cleophas, who still operates it under the original name, Cooke's Market.

Along with his meat market business, Mr. Cooke ventured into the newspaper business in the early twenties, purchasing the Ozona Stockman from the late Bill Easterling, and turning publishing chores over to his son-in-law, Jack Sawyer. The present publisher purchased the Stockman from Mr. Cooke in 1926.

Mr. Cooke was married to Miss Lucinda Patrick in Ozona, on Dec. 25, 1898. Mrs. Cooke died Jan. 6, 1920. Seven children were born to the Cookes, six of them surviving. The surviving children include four daughters, Mrs. Jack Sawyer and Mrs. Virgil Odom, both of San Antonio, Mrs. Morris Black of Iran and Mrs. Ben Jones of Tucson, Ariz., and two sons, Green Cooke of Sanderson and Cleophas Cooke of Ozona. Also surviving are three brothers, Will Cooke of Utopia, Frank Cooke of Melvin and John Cooke of Fort Stockton, and a sister, Mrs. Lillie Cartwright of Falfurrias.

Austin, Texas — "Interest is growing and registrations are pouring in to join the mass flight of civil aircraft which will wing its way over 3,000 miles in the Eighth Annual All Texas Air Tour," said Asa Burroughs, Tour Director.

The tour will officially start at Temple, October 13th and will visit 38 cities during the week-long flight with lunch stops at Palestine, Sherman, Wichita Falls, Odessa, Alice and stopping overnight at Beaumont, Shreveport, Louisiana, Brownwood, Plainville, Carlsbad, New Mexico, Fort Clark Ranch at Bracketville, McAllen and ending in Corpus Christi October 20th.

The mass flight is scheduled for a 20-minute stop in Ozona on Thursday, October 18. The flight will come from Odessa, where the group will have lunch, and will arrive here at 2:05 p. m. and leave for Junction at 2:25.

Lions Cop First Victory With 34-14 Win Over Coahoma

Sutton and William Spark Lions Better Offensive Play

The Ozona Lions chalked up their first win of the season last Friday night as they staged a sharp second half rally to down Coahoma 34 to 14.

Four Ozona backs broke into the scoring column during the contest but it was a one-two punch supplied by Stanley Williams and Bobby Sutton that the Lions used as their chief weapon.

The Lions started like they intended to run the visitors out of the park, scoring in their first offensive try after a short Coahoma kick. The score came on an 18 yard ramble by half back Kent Babb and Bobby Sutton picked up a fumbled snap and ran over the extra point to give the Lions a brief lead.

Coahoma came back with a spirited effort and on the third play of their new series Rick Phinney cut back on a trap play and raced 55 yards to the goal line. Don White ran over the extra point and the scoring for the first half was over.

The Lions wasted little time after the intermission as they took the kick off and went 71 yards for the score. Big play on the drive was a 60 yard pass and run play from Sutton to Williams. George Bunger plunged into the end zone from the two and Sutton kicked the extra point.

The Lions increased their edge and really sewed up the game in short order when Stanley Williams fielded a Coahoma punt on his own thirty and threaded 70 yards for the score with some fine blocking clearing the way. Sutton kicked the extra point again and Ozona owned a 21 to 7 edge.

Coahoma, suffering from the loss of its star back due to injury, was unable to get anything started in the third quarter and it was the Lions who broke into the scoring column first in the fourth period.

The Lions rushed David Barr hard as he attempted to kick and the little Coahoma back was forced to run, being pulled down on the 39 with the ball going over to Ozona. The Lions did not waste the chance and Bobby Sutton climaxed the short drive by going over from the four. Sutton then added the extra point by picking up a high snap and racing into the end zone untouched.

Trailing 28 to 7, Coahoma took the ensuing kickoff back all the way when Rick Phinney raced eighty yards for his second score (Continued on Last Page)

Continental Strike In World Field Area Good For 337 Barrels Daily

The World, West (Strawn) field of Crockett County has been extended one location southwest with completion of Continental Oil Co. No. 14-C C. T. Harris, in 1-BB2-N. A. Miller, 13 miles south of Texon. It was completed for a calculated, daily flowing potential of 337 barrels of 49.8 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio 1,564-1.

Potential was based on a 20-hour flow of 280.56 barrels of oil through a 25-64-inch choke and perforations between 8,108-140 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing set at 8,145 feet, the total depth.

Pay section was acidized with 3,000 gallons.

Tubing pressure was 400 pounds, casing pressure, 1,000 pounds.

Stanolind Oil and Gas Co. has filed application to drill the No. 1 Albert Faltin, 3/4-mile north of production in the Noelke, Northeast (Queen) field of Crockett County, five miles east of Iran.

It will be drilled to 2,700 feet with rotary.

Location, on a 480-acre lease, is 722 feet from the south and 694 feet from the east lines of 3-0, Marshall survey.

WHAT IT TOOK!

Nearly 100 Telephone Calls, Telegrams Sent In Campaign For Dams

It takes a heap of long distance gabbing to get something done in Washington and there was a heap of such communication between Ozona and Washington, between Ozona and Austin and Temple during the months of June and July of this year while local backers of the Johnson Draw flood control project were desperately prodding the powers that be in an effort to get the project approved before Congress adjourned.

Counting only the telephone calls and telegrams sent from Ozona and charged to a flood control fund set up by the Ozona Lions Club and the county telephone account, the total toll bill for the period was \$127.39. But besides this, there were a large number of privately financed calls and telegrams sent by individuals and organizations and countless numbers of calls and telegrams received from various government agencies, Congressmen and Senators. Nearly 100 calls and telegrams are estimated to have gone out of Ozona and that many more received in the frenzied effort.

The Johnson Draw project, now in process of planning looking to letting of contracts in early January, was approved in the last days of Congress and won final approval only through the passage by Congress of an amendment to the original upper watershed control act cutting the waiting period before Congress 45 days to 15. And that took some more doing.

Location, on an 80.88-acre lease, is 1,081 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east lines of 50-1-1&N.

The Half field produces from the Queen sand at an average depth of 1,679 feet.

Trucks, Men Set For Tuesday Move To New Hospital

Operation To Continue With Only Slight Interruption

Eight men, manning four big stock trucks, plus the men of the staff, are all set for a one-day move of the entire Crockett County Hospital, equipment, patients and furnishings, from its present location to the beautiful new hospital recently completed on the northwest edge of Ozona.

The move will be made next Tuesday, September 25, Manager J. B. Post said. The movers will gather up all furnishings and non-technical equipment with as little disturbance to the pieces as possible and make the short haul across town to install each piece in its new location ready for use.

Eight rooms in the new hospital are completely furnished and ready for patient occupancy and all patients in the hospital will be moved by ambulance and put to bed in the furnished rooms. Meanwhile, furnishings from the old hospital will be moved and the balance of the rooms in the new hospital outfitted for use. The autoclave, or sterilizing machine, in use in the old hospital, will be completely reconditioned by factory experienced men and re-installed in the new hospital. An expert X-Ray supervisor will be on hand to move the X-Ray machine to its new location.

Operation of the hospital will not be interrupted by the move, except for the few minutes it will take to move patients to their new rooms.

Ozonan, 13-Year Naval Veteran, Captains Big Tug Boat In San Diego

Ed. Note — the following was written by a Navy public relations officer, name not signed, at the San Diego Naval base.

We met Alejandro B. Lara, boatswain's mate first class, U. S. Navy, when he was captain of a Navy tug boat. Al's job was pushing millions of dollars worth of fighting ships around in the harbor of San Diego, Calif.

The Ozona, Texas, man welcomed us aboard one day when his huge tug went out for a trial run after overhaul. He handled the big machine just about as easily as you and I would handle a car — that tug weighs 415 tons. As a matter of fact she's the largest Navy or civilian tug in the port of San Diego. She can handle just about any hauling job the Navy can dream up. And besides that, Al's tug is the main battery of waterborne fire-fighting equipment. This consists of an eight-inch "fire monitor" which can deliver 4,000 gallons of water a minute and spray it a distance of 200 feet. Besides that she has three other 5-inch fire monitors. She's available to protect both Navy and civilian property.

Duty in the tug boat fleet is just one small part of the variety that Al has found during thirteen years

in the service. "It's not the kind of a job you can have and be able to tell your girl that you'll meet her at a certain time," says Al. "The hours are pretty long some times."

In addition to being a competent skipper, Lara is also responsible for procuring ship supplies, training the crew, rigging tows and navigation both in port and on the high seas. And — in the tradition of the sea — if anything goes wrong aboard the tug, Al's responsible.

But being a good tug boat skipper, Al wouldn't want it any other way.

Capt. Robert Dean, medical officer attached to the Headquarters, 33rd Air Defense Command, at Oklahoma City, was in Ozona this week looking over local medical and hospital facilities in connection with the establishment of the radar station east of here, now under construction. The station will have no medical officer nor hospital facilities, Capt. Dean said, but will use the facilities in Ozona.

Junior Fire Marshal Program To Emphasize Fire Prevention Week

Ozona school children in the third through sixth grades will join nearly 3,000,000 Junior Fire Marshals throughout the country next month in a nation-wide fire prevention and safety education program sponsored by the Hartford Fire Insurance Company.

Participation in the program was announced jointly today by Coralie Meinecke Insurance Agency, local Hartford Fire representative; School Superintendent L. B. T. Sikes, and Fire Chief Joe Tom Davidson.

"This new, year-round Junior Fire Marshal program is an expanded version of the popular public service campaign which the Hartford Fire Co. has sponsored through its 15,000 agents since

1947," Mrs. Meinecke said. "Ever increasing interest by parents, teachers and fire officials prompted expansion of the program which now is a year-round basis for the first time in nine years."

Scheduled to open throughout the country in conjunction with National Fire Prevention Week, October 7-13, the new program gets under way locally on 10-8-56. At that time a new 12-page Junior Fire Marshal Magazine will be distributed to boys and girls in participating schools.

The Magazine, first of four to be published throughout the year, contains stories, pictures, and suggested Fire Prevention activities and games for children. The Magazine's feature is a home inspection report for boys and girls to use in locating and eliminating fire hazards in their homes.

Completed home reports, signed by parents, are returned to teach-

ers. Schools with satisfactory records of participation will receive School Achievement Banners, Honor Roll postens, and Junior Fire Marshal badges and firemen's helmets for children.

In addition, elementary school teachers both here and throughout the country are receiving special teaching units, complete with suggested classroom activities, for instructing fire prevention and safety.

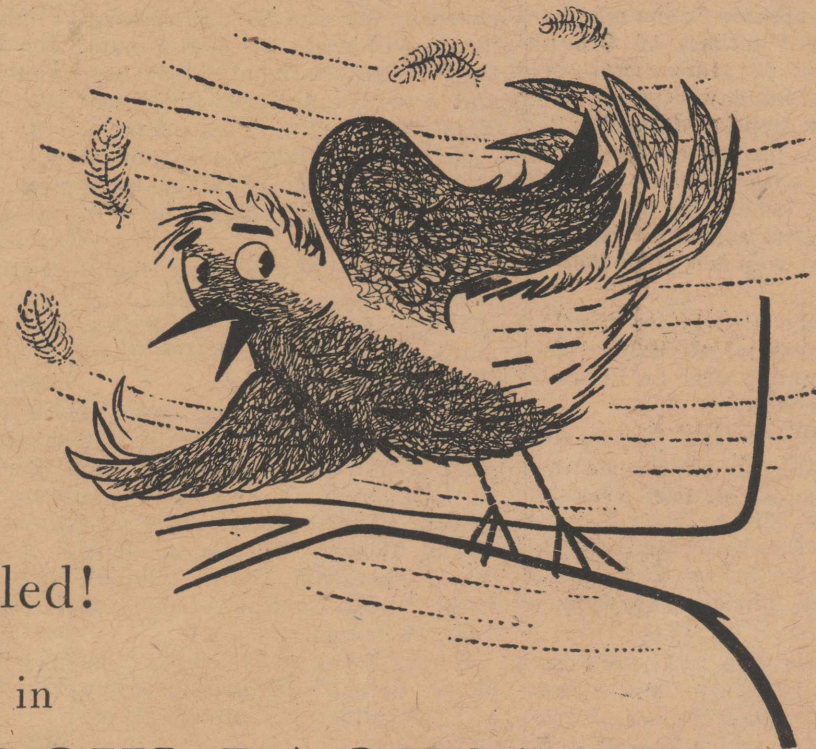

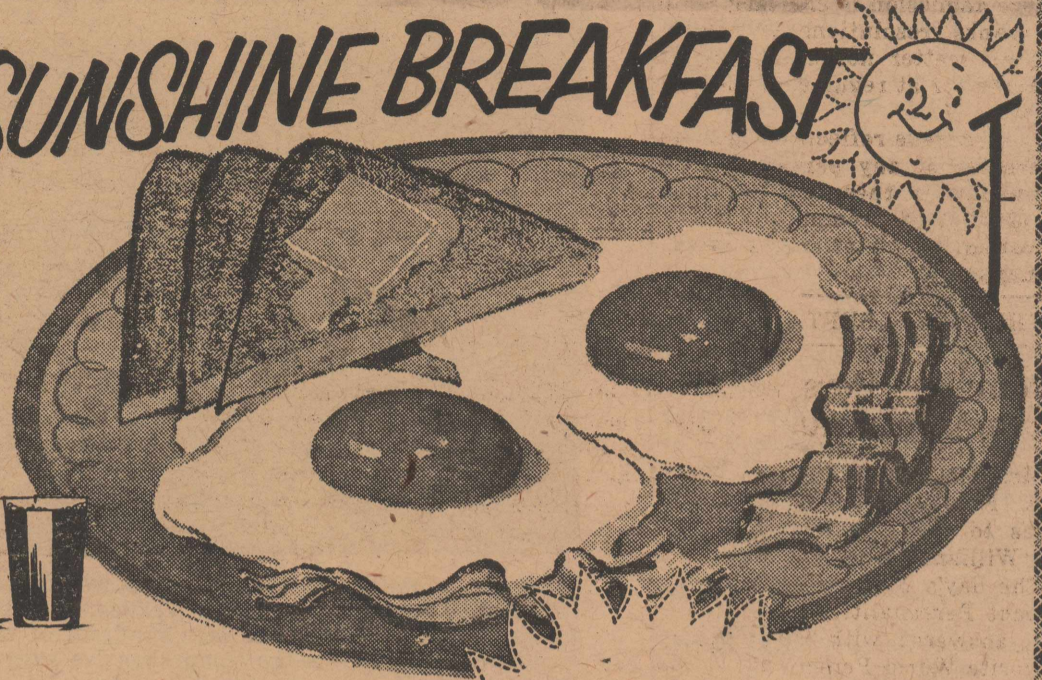

1/4 cup sugar

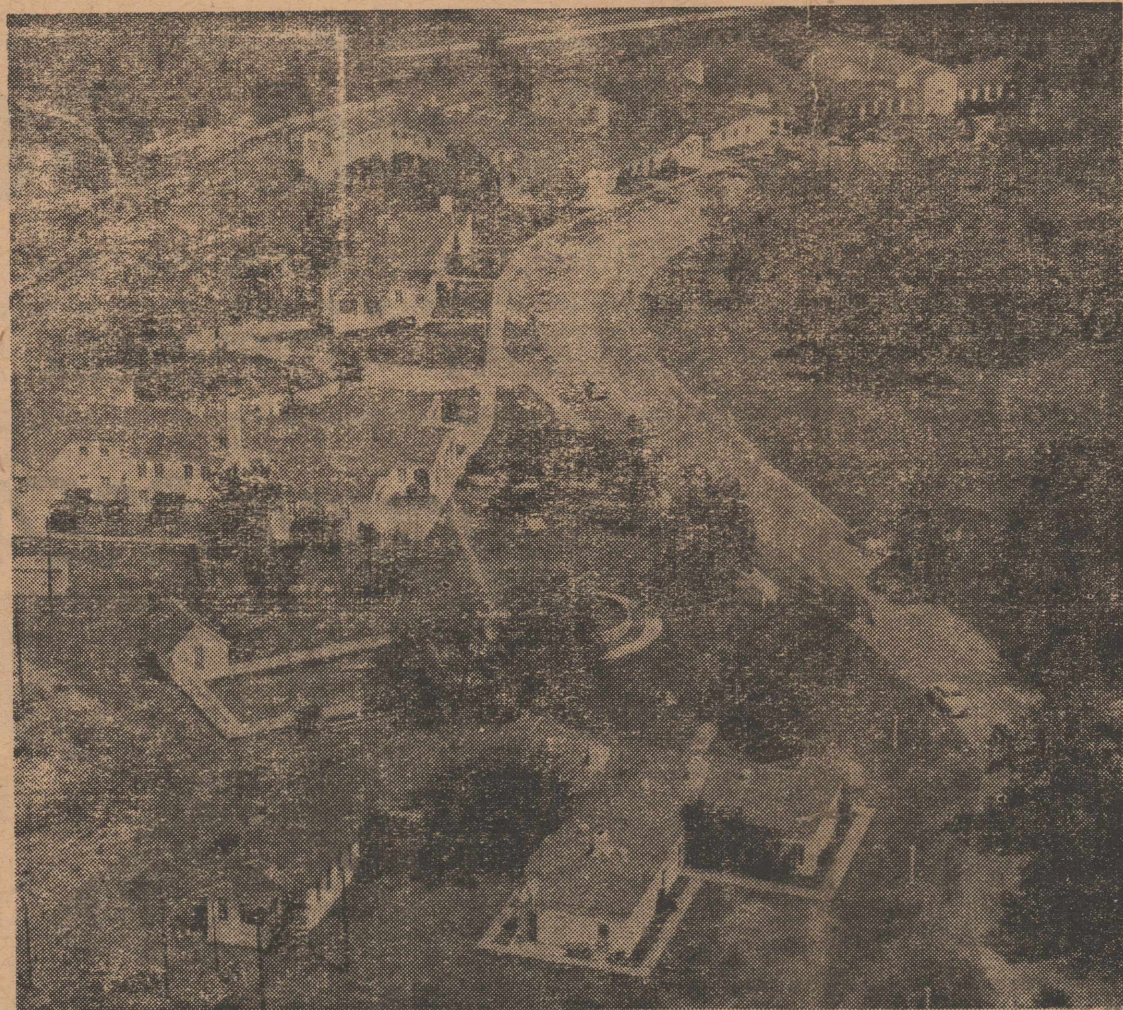

All farmers who wish to participate in 1957 should work out their plans with the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announces. Payments will be made to compensate farmers for loss of net income resulting from crop acreage reduction. These payments will be based on normal crop yield for the reserved land, as determined by the County ASC Committee. Farmers may leave this land idle, or apply soil or water conservation practices on it. This land cannot be cropped or cut for hay during 1957 calendar year, and may not be grazed unless the Secretary of Agriculture determines an emergency exists. Farmers also may participate in the Soil Bank's Conservation Reserve for which all farm land regularly used to produce crops is eligible.

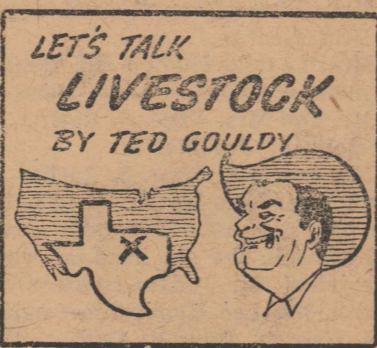

Cattle Price Weaken: Weak To 50 Cents Lower.

Fort Worth — One of the largest offerings of grass cattle and calves of the year arrived at Fort Worth Monday and most classes reflected weaker prices. Sales ranged from steady to 50 cents lower, with the medium and common cattle and calves showing the larger declines.

Continued dry weather in the Southwest has narrowed the outlets for stockers, especially the plainer kinds.

Comparative prices: Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings \$17.00 to \$26.00; fed heifers \$24 down. Plain and medium butcher cattle \$12 to \$17, with some canner kinds down to \$10. Fat cows \$9.00 to \$12.00, few young choice cows \$13.00 or above. Canners and cutters \$6.00 to \$9.00. Bulls mostly \$9.00 to \$12.50. Good and choice fat calves \$14.50 to \$17.50, baby beef heavies to \$18 or above, one such lot of 15 creep-feds weighed 650 pounds at \$20. Cull to medium slaughter calves \$8.00 to \$14.00. Stocker steer calves \$19.00 down; stocker steer yearlings \$18.00 down.

Sheep and Lambs Strong: Killers and Feeders Active.

The rather small supply of sheep and lambs at Fort Worth Monday was sold and weighed early in a very active market at stronger prices. Good and choice slaughter lambs cashed at \$18 to \$20, strictly choice kinds quotable to \$21, and shorn lambs sold from \$19 downward. Cull to medium lambs drew \$10 to \$17. Stocker and feeder lambs sold from \$13 to \$16.25.

Yearling muttons sold from \$10 to \$16.50. Old wethers drew \$8 to \$12.50. Slaughter ewes sold from \$4 to \$5, with a few emaciated lightweights down to \$3, and some fancy fat ewes to \$5.50. Old bucks

sold around the \$4 marker. U.S.D.A. Buying Spreads To Poultry and Eggs

The recent announcement that the USDA would launch a hamburger buying program to support the live cattle prices this Fall was preceded very shortly by a similar announcement that turkey and eggs were in line for government purchase, too.

Texas' turkey crop is a record one, and the overall supply across the nation is far larger than had been expected earlier this year. The big increase in laying flocks, reported early this year, is creating a chaotic egg price situation, hence the buying programs.

The food will be used in the school lunch program and federal institutions, as permitted
