

Football Final Tonite As Lions Take On Menard

Teams To Battle For Third Place In District Standing

The Ozona Lions will end their 1956 football season tonight as they meet the Menard Yellowjackets at Lion stadium with the kickoff slated at 7 p. m.

The game, which was originally set for Friday night, was advanced one day so that people interested might see the game between Sonora and Eldorado for the district title in Sonora Friday night.

The Menard game will have an important bearing on the final district standing, however, as the Lions will have a chance to pull into a tie for third place while the visiting Menard team can clinch the position, by winning the contest.

Last week, Menard team gave Eldorado a real scare before falling 20 to 7. Menard's big strong line was able to contain the Eagles and it was not until the last stages of the game that Eldorado was able to establish a safe lead.

The Menard team, which has long been an exponent of the single wing, has shifted to the T this season and has progressed steadily and will be favored to take the measure of the Lions this week.

The game will be the last in Ozona High School for six Lion seniors. Three backs and three linemen will be finishing up and all six have been outstanding performers for the Lions this season, even though injuries and illness have sidelined most of them for at least part of the season.

Backs finishing up will be fullback Kent Babb, halfback George Bunker and fullback Robert Martinez.

In the line, tackles Jim Brown and Jess Marley, along with guard Roy Glen Sutton, will turn in their uniforms for the last time Thursday.

Lions Bounce Back To Thump Junction 26-0

Bobby Sutton Sparks Lion Offense; Stout Defense Holds

The Ozona Lions, sparked by the offensive maneuvers of halfback Bobby Sutton and by the stout defensive play of Jake Young, Jess Marley and Roy Glen Sutton, blanked the Junction Eagles 26 to 0 last Friday night.

The win for the Lions was their first in district play and brought their season record to five wins and four losses with one game yet to be played.

The Lions used a stout defense to set up the first score when Junction, with fourth and one on their own 46 yard line, a fourth down try failed and the ball went over to Ozona.

Bobby Sutton, Kent Babb and Robert Martinez took turns gouging out short yardage until a fifteen yard jump pass from Stan Williams to Jake Young moved the ball into the end zone. Sutton's conversion was good and the Lions held a 7 to 0 margin that stood up through the first quarter.

Early in the second quarter the Eagles pushed deep into Ozona territory before Kent Babb picked off Spencer McDonough's pass on the Ozona five yard line.

Robert Martinez popped through the left side and moved forty yards before being hauled in on the forty-five. Kent Babb then added five and eight yards on two carries and Sutton streaked 42 yards into the end zone with a fine blocking by Babb and Roy Glen Sutton shaking him free at the line of scrimmage. Bobby Sutton again converted to bring the score to 14 to 0.

Following the kickoff, the Eagles moved to their own 33 where Bert Mansfield fumbled and the Lions pounced on the ball. This time the Lions just needed four plays to rack up the score with Sutton covering the last nineteen on a quickie up the middle. This time Charles Fox blocked the extra point try and the score climbed to 20 to 0.

The third period was scoreless as the Lions muffed an opportunity and to make it even more unusual he was tackled all seven times by Humberto Cervantez.

Another strange factor in the game was the failure of Junction to punt a single time even though they lost the game 26 to 0.

Cubs Beat Del Rio To Wind Up Perfect Season

Womack's Crew Overcomes Deficit For 19-7 Victory

In a game played here last Thursday night, the Ozona Junior High Cubs came from behind to win 19 to 7 over the Kittens from Del Rio Junior High School. This win, the tenth of the year, left the Cubs with an undefeated record.

Del Rio received to open the game and picked up only six yards on the first three tries and punted to Ozona on their own 39 yard line.

The Cubs failed to gain and on an attempted pass the line failed to hold and the passer was rushed so that the ball was knocked from his hand and recovered by Dil Rio on the Ozona 25 yard line.

It took Del Rio three plays to move the 25 yards with a dash over Ozona left tackle good for twenty yards; and the TD. The extra point was good and Del Rio was out in front 7 to 0 over half of the first period left to play.

Only one other time during the game did Del Rio get inside Ozona territory and then they were stopped on the Ozona 32.

Ozona took the kickoff after the Del Rio score but could not move the ball, at least not forward. After an exchange of punts Del Rio took the ball on their own 23 and began a drive that looked like they might increase their lead.

At the thirty-two yard line Ozona took over and began a drive of their own that was stopped on the nine yard line, not by Del Rio, but by the clock as the first half ended with Del Rio in front 7 to 0. During this Jimmy Freeman broke over right tackle and was caught from behind after a gain of 42 yards.

To open the second half Ozona chose to receive and Jim Williams took the ball on his own five and returned it to the Ozona 31. On the first play of the second half the Cubs came out in the Chick Womack spread and, with unity to score with a fumble deep in the Eagles' territory.

With Charles Fox and Bert Mansfield doing most of the damage, the Eagles finally got started in the fourth period and rolled to the Lions seventeen yard line. With second down and seven yards to go for the first down the Eagles went into the air and this time Bobby Sutton picked off the pass on the Lion 10 and raced to the Eagles 13 before being hauled in.

The run covered 77 yards and the Lions quickly counted again with Kent Babb covering the last thirteen yards in two sprints. The conversion was no good and the final count was 26 to 0.

Only 35 Voters Cast Ballots On Tardy Amendment

Legislative Error Estimated Cost \$3 Per Ballot in County

Only 35 voters out of around 1400 eligible in Crockett county cast their ballots in Tuesday's special election to pass on a constitutional amendment increasing welfare benefits to the totally disabled.

The amendment, one of nine proposed by the last legislature, eight of them voted on in the general election, and all approved, was approved by a wide margin in an extremely light vote over the state. The special election on this ninth amendment was made necessary because of a date error by the legislature, setting this amendment for the second Tuesday in November instead of the first Tuesday, date of the general election.

County officials estimated the special election, held in only one voting place in the county, at the courthouse, nevertheless cost something over \$100, or at a rate of about \$3 per vote.

Budget Set For Ten Counties Composing Girl Scout Council

The Frontier Scout Council was organized in Ozona in 1951, with ten counties included. In order to have professional help for the various troops, each county was assessed 15 cents per person on a basis of the 1950 census. In 1955, with a new census, this was lowered to 14 cents per capita.

The ten counties in the Council area are Concho, Crockett, Irion, Kimble, Mason, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher, Sutton and Tom Green. With population increases in all of these counties since 1950, with the exception of Concho, Irion, Kimble, Mason, Menard and Sutton, the reduction in per-capita assessment will bring approximately the same budget as that based on 1950 census.

The Crockett county suggested budget this year was set at \$595 against \$594.45 from the 1951-55 figure. Budgets from other counties in the Council area, based on the new population and 14-cent per capita assessment are: Concho, \$602; Irion, \$196; Kimble, \$560; Mason, \$686; Menard, \$476; Reagan, \$555; Schleicher, \$462; Sutton, \$524, and Tom Green, \$10,220.

In addition to the money which each county pays into the Frontier budget, each county supports its own local Girl Scout house and organization. They pay their janitor, utilities, breakage about the house, and also furnish books to

help their leaders to give good programs to the girls. They buy equipment which is not shared with other counties and support program and promotion activities available only to their local group. The over-all Frontier budget covers:

Salaries: two professional workers and an office secretary; Travel: throughout the council; Office Expenses: postage, telephone, stationary, mimeograph supplies, etc.; Insurance; liability on all leaders, compensation, and retirement. (Not on local property); Training: all adults throughout the council; Public Relations; Program Promotion; Miscellaneous.

Drove out to see how they're getting along with the new super-highway that's going to pass through town.

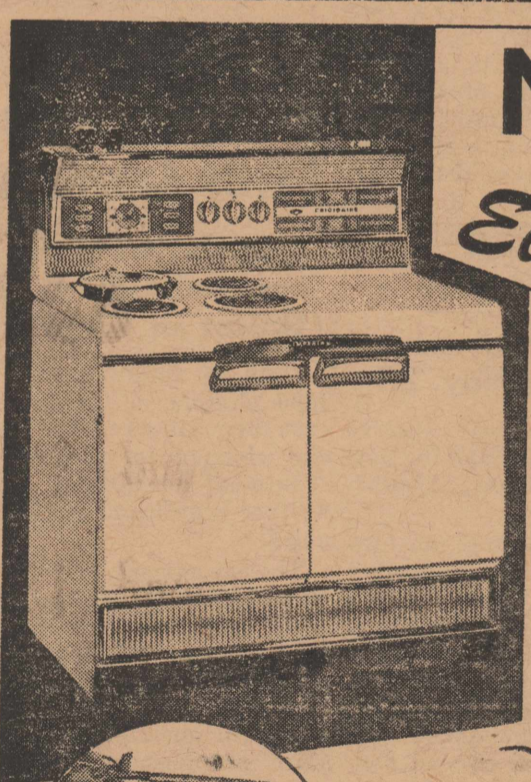

AUSTIN, Texas — General election results, nationally, have added new suspense to the already tense issue of who will succeed Texas' Gov-Elect Price Daniel as U. S. Senator.

At stake is whether Democrats or Republican will control the U. S. Senate, when Congress convenes on Jan. 3.

Democrats now have a precarious 49 to 47-member advantage. But it would be 48 to 48 if a Republican replaced Democratic Senator Daniel.

GOP Vice Pres. Richard Nixon can vote in case of a tie. Therefore this one vote which Texas could bestow upon him . . . in a round-about way . . . could determine the balance of power. Most important of all, it could decide which party could organize the Senate and appoint the all-important committee chairmen.

This possibility puts Gov. Allan Shivers in the national spotlight again. And Senator Daniel.

Texas' conflicting election laws have clouded the issue as to whether Governor Shivers legally can call a special election before Jan. 15. That's when Daniel takes office as governor. This because Daniel's letter of resignation from the Senate specifies Jan. 15 as the effective date of his resignation.

Shivers contends that inasmuch as Daniel did not resign, effective immediately, there is no vacancy until Jan. 15. Daniel argues that Shivers has the power to call an election. Both point to different provisions of the poorly drawn election code.

Unless Congress is in session, a governor cannot make an appointment to fill a vacancy. Therefore, should Senator Daniel resign effective today, Shivers could not name a successor until Jan. 3 . . . opening day of the new Congress.

Shivers feels that Daniel should resign outright, thus paving the way for an immediate election. The governor is required to call an election within 90 days from the effective date of the resignation, and not before 30 days have elapsed. This means that the governor could call for an election

in December — or he could designate a January or February date.

Whatever course Daniel pursues, Shivers undoubtedly will have a chance to appoint a temporary replacement. First, because Shivers is not likely to call for a December election. Second, if Daniel submits a new resignation before Jan. 3, effective immediately, Shivers automatically can name a successor on Jan. 3. And third, if Daniel sticks to the Jan. 15 date, Shivers will have from 12:01 a. m. on the 15th until Daniel is inaugurated at 12 noon, to name a successor.

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Nov. 17, 1927

A romance which had its inception a year ago when Chas. E. Davidson, Jr., of Ozona was a patient in a Temple hospital, culminated in his marriage Tuesday morning to Miss Edna Barron, his nurse, whose personal charms and tender care won his heart while he was recovering from an operation in the fall of 1926.

A petition urging Ralph Watson, county commissioner from Precinct 4, to continue his post as county commissioner, at least until the end of his present term, was being circulated in Ozona this week by John W. Bailey and was signed by several citizens. Watson's resignation was submitted to the Commissioner's Court, the commissioner assigning the press of private business as the reason.

The long "wait for the new Ford" is just about at an end, ac-

ording to information reaching Bill Grimmer of Grimmer Motor Co., local Ford agents. The first of the new models is expected to reach dealers Friday or Saturday of next week. The local Ford agency has 29 orders on file for the new models when they become available.

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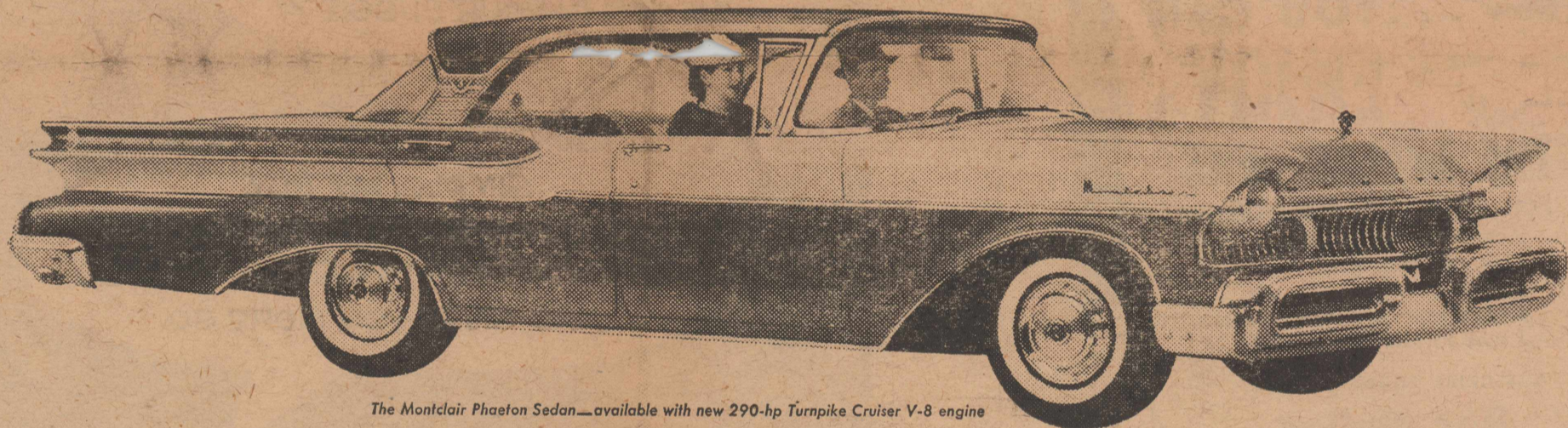
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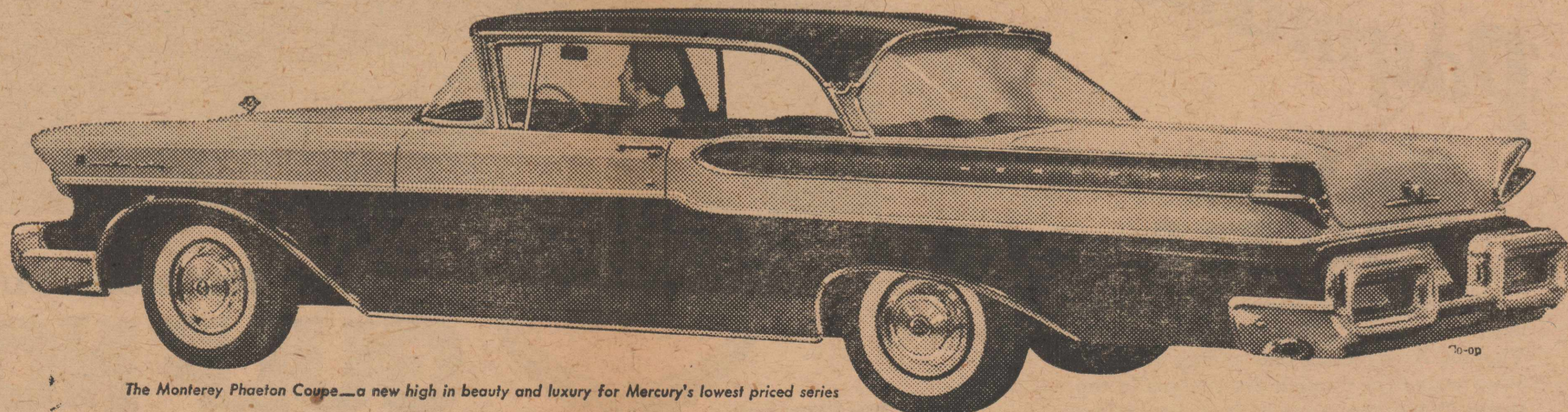


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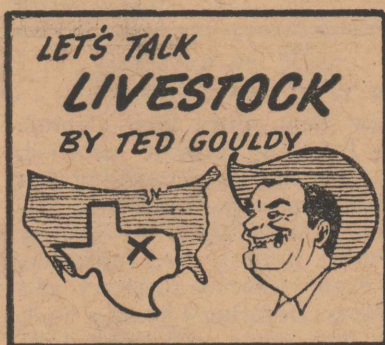
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Cattle Trade Slow, Weak As Holidays Approach

FORT WORTH — Movement of all classes of livestock rebounded back to normal seasonal numbers at Fort Worth and around the major marketing circle Monday. Most slaughter classes of livestock found a slow, weak trade as packers eyed the calendar and noted the approach of the Thanksgiving period in which poultry all-way upsets the red meat trade. This year the trade will get a double dose, as the two "Thanksgivings," November 22 to some and November 29 to others, will extend this holiday turkey feasting period to twice the normal span. At Fort Worth Monday the bright spot in the trade was on good or choice quality stockers and feeders in the cattle division. These classes sold in an active and strong trade, however the plainer replacement were again slow and weak. Slaughter classes of cattle and calves were very slow and mostly unevenly lower, with some interests bidding sharply lower, especially on fat calves and fed cattle. Comparative prices included: Good to choice steers and yearlings \$16.50 to \$23.50; common and medium \$10.00 to \$16.00; fat cows \$9.50 to \$12.50; canners and cutters \$6.00 to \$9.50; bulls \$8.00 to \$13.00; good and choice slaughter calves \$14.00 to \$18.00; baby beef heavies when choice and scaling over 550 pounds sold up to \$19. Cull, common and medium kinds \$8.00 to \$14.00. Stocker steer calves ranged from \$19.00 down;

stocker steer yearlings \$17.50 down. The traditional Thanksgiving holiday will be observed at the Fort Worth stockyards on November 22. This date coincides with the national observance and was selected to fit in with holidays of allied industries including the major packers.

Livestock received over the holiday will be yarded as usual and shown for sale the following day. **Lambs Weaker, Top \$19.50; Older Sheep Steady**

Most bids were weak to lower on lambs at Fort Worth at trade got underway this week. Slaughter interests pointed out that lambs, as a rather exotic or speciality meat, was always harder hit by the turkey season than most red meats and so packers were braced for a weak dressed trade on lamb and mutton.

By the time the slow trade had effected a clearance Monday prices were steady to 50 cents lower. Older sheep held steady.

Good and choice slaughter lambs cashed at \$16.50 to \$19.50, the top figure paid for some strictly choice shorn lambs with . . . 1 pelts. Cull, common and medium slaughter lambs sold from \$10.00 to \$16.00.

Stocker and feeder lambs were quoted from \$12.00 to \$17.00 and slaughter ewes cashed at \$5 to \$5.75. Old bucks sold around \$5. Old wethers drew \$8 to \$12. Yearlings cashed at \$9 to \$16.

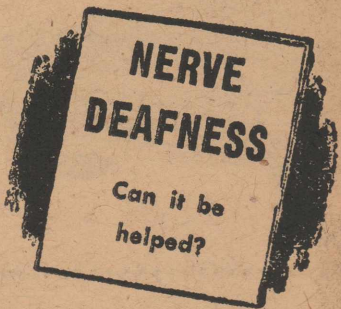
projects.

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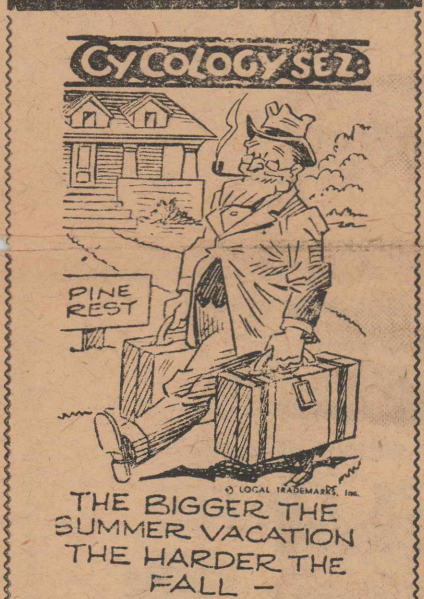
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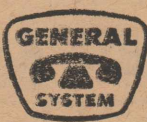

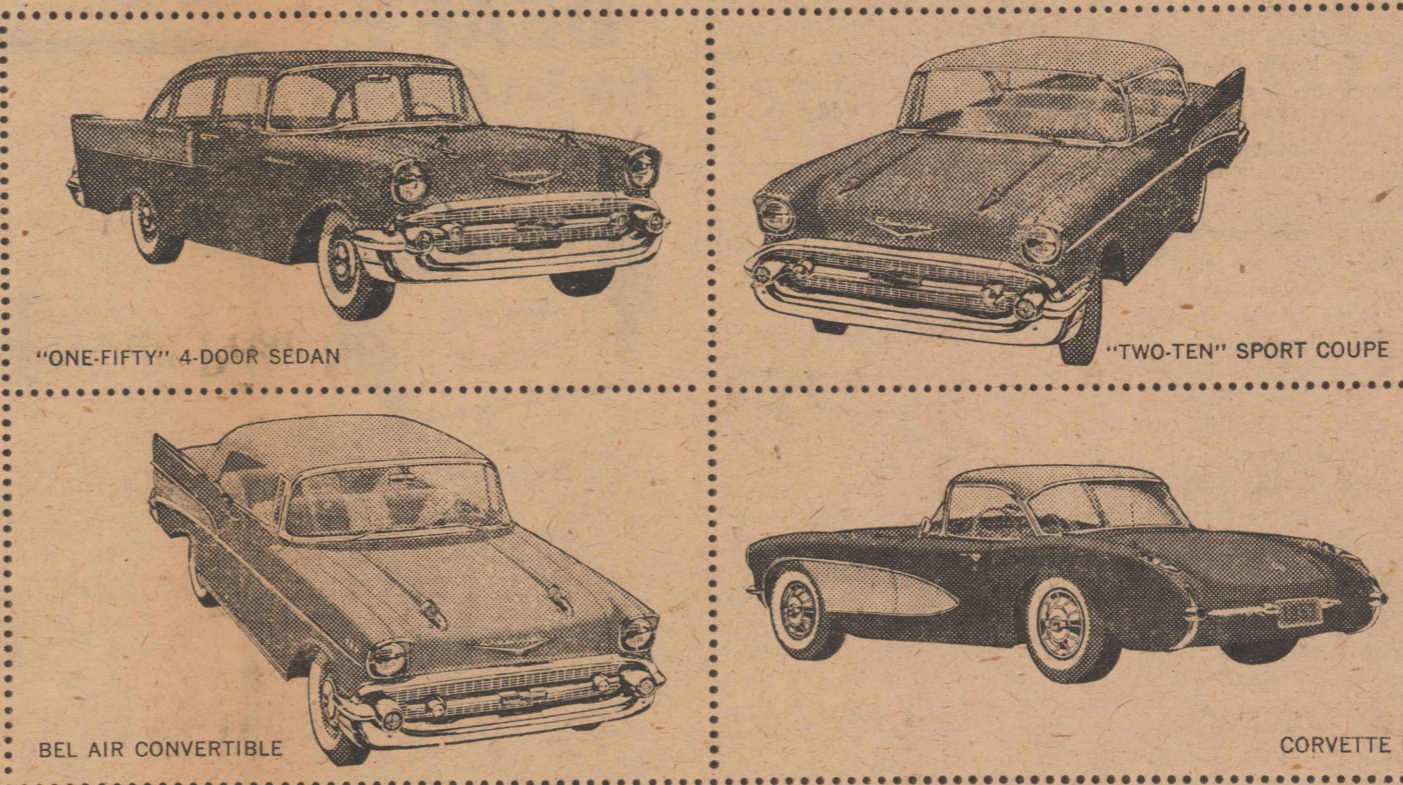
