The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Oct. 18, 1928

With appropriate ceremonies, ground was broken shortly after 6 o'clock Wednesday evening for the new \$35,000 First Baptist Church to be erected on the lot north of the courthouse. The first turn of the earth marking the start of construction was made by H. O. Word, chairman of the board of deacons, with Ira Carson, chairman of the building committee next.

Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Adams and children spent the week-end in San Angelo visiting their son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Otho Adams and their new daughter who arrived two weeks ago.

W. M. Johnigan, deputy sheriff and jailer under Sheriff W. H. Augustine, was named justice of the peace for Prec. 1, at a called session of the Commissioners Court Monday. Mr. Johnigan succeeds Nelson Hawkins, who was killed recently in an automobile accident near San Angelo.

Word was received Thursday

night that Mrs. F. E. Piner of Ozona had died in a Temple hospital where she had gone for treatment. Ray Piner and Mrs. Joe T. Davidson were at their mother's bedside. Funeral arrangements had not been announced.

Considerable excitement but little damage resulted from an outbreak of fire in the belfry of the Ozona High School building Thursday morning. The blaze started when the flue ignited birds nests in the belfry. The fire was extinguished with chemicals, high school boys turning volunteer fire fighters.

Discovery of a Texas fever tick on a cow shipped from Crockett county to the Fort Worth stock pens will result in a minimum of damage and inconvenience to stockmen of this section, according to reports to B. B. Ingham, local commission inspector. Quarantine of a small pasture on the P. T. Robison ranch and the lane from that ranch to the loading pens at Barnhart was recommended by Judge J. A. Whitten of Eldorado, a member of the state Livestock Sanitary Board.
