HOSPITAL ELECTION MAY 16

## Why Build A New Hospital?

"The only reason we have a hospital today is because a group of concerned men took over the two existing hospitals and consolidated their operations more than two years ago," commented Muleshoe School Superintendent Neal Dillman Monday afternoon.

"The group, Don Harmon, Olan Burrows, Jack Young, Bill Loyd, Harvey Bass and Alex Williams formed a non-profit organization called the West Plains Memorial Hospital Board and acted in the name of the board to purchase the hospital.

"At the time of the hospital purchase, Muleshoe faced a crisis. Green Memorial Hospital did not qualify for federally funded medical programs and West Plains Hospital's medical staff had been reduced to one doctor."

"During the past eight years," continued Dillman, "Muleshoe has dropped from eight doctors to three doctors. The minimum doctors required for any given area is based on one doctor per thousand population. In Muleshoe, the ratio is one doctor for each 3,500 people and that does not even take in the trade area around Muleshoe.

"Also," he stated, "when our school nurses, Mrs. Tiller and Mrs. Davis, attend nurse and medical conventions, they are told that due to the heavy city load on hospitals and because the city hospitals are fast becoming hard pressed to care for their own patients, patient referral will be strictly limited in the near future. In other words, the local overworked doctors will have nowhere to send their own patients from Muleshoe. So, what is the answer, what are we to do?"

Dillman was speaking to the Senior Citizen Organization during their regular meeting at the Fellowship Hall in the First United Methodist Church.

The same words, with slight variations, are being spoken all over Bailey County, as members of the Bailey County Hospital District Board meet with any interested group to explain the proposed hospital plan.

One question Dillman answered was "Can the non-tax-paying voter decide the outcome of the hospital and bond election?" He said that although the Supreme Court ruled that non-property taxpayers registered voters are allowed to vote in the bond election, that particular box cannot carry the election.

For instance, even though the non-property taxpayer box may carry the election, or vote in favor of the project, it will not pass unless the taxpayer voters approve the issue.

He was also questioned as to why there will only be two polling places in Bailey County. "It is simply a matter of economy," he stated, "The Bailey County Hospital District has no funds of any type at this time. We simply could not afford to have more than two voting places. These vote workers have to be paid, you know, and we don't have the funds to pay them."

The superintendent told that much of the money spent to date has been spent out of the Bailey County Hospital District Temporary Board member's individual pockets. There is no source of income for the board unless and until the hospital election is approved, he continued.

Further questioning, by the interested Senior Citizens brought forth the information that in the event the hospital district and bond election is approved, the doors to the present hospital will close the day the new hospital would open. The entire present facility would be converted to a 100 bed nursing home.

Funds from the nursing home would be used to pay off the notes presently due on the 1967 hospital purchase and consolidation. It was noted that the present balance on the notes is \$380,000. This amount is being paid in monthly payments to eight individuals who owned the two hospitals at the time the West Plains Memorial Hospital Board purchased the two Muleshoe Hospitals.

The owners of West Plains Hospital were Dr. B. O. McDaniel, Eddie Faust and the Birdsong Estate; while owners of Green Memorial Hospital were Dr. W.M. Dean, Dr. B.E. Sanderlin, Roy Kelley and Marshall Cook.

After the notes are paid off, present plans are to use the funds to pay on the hospital bond issue, with the possibility of reducing taxes in the future.

It has been emphasized that bond money cannot be used to remodel or renovate an existing hospital facility when it is matched by Hill-Burton federal funds. The entire amount must be used for a complete new facility and equipment.

To be voted on Saturday, May 16 are two propositions. One is for the creation of the Bailey County Hospital District and create a taxing power, with maximum tax rate to be set at 75 cents per \$100 valuation and the second is a \$950,000 bond issue to match with Hill-Burton Federal Funds.

## Questions On New Hospital

(As contributed by Journal readers.)

Q. If the bond issue is passed for the new hospital, would the ones who helped build the hospital, (the taxpayers), get a cut-rate on room expenses, etc. or would it still be the same rate or would it be higher rates?

A. The taxpayers would pay the same as anyone else and the rate would be governed by the prevailing rates at the time the new hospital would be opened.

Q. Will the nurses get higher wages?

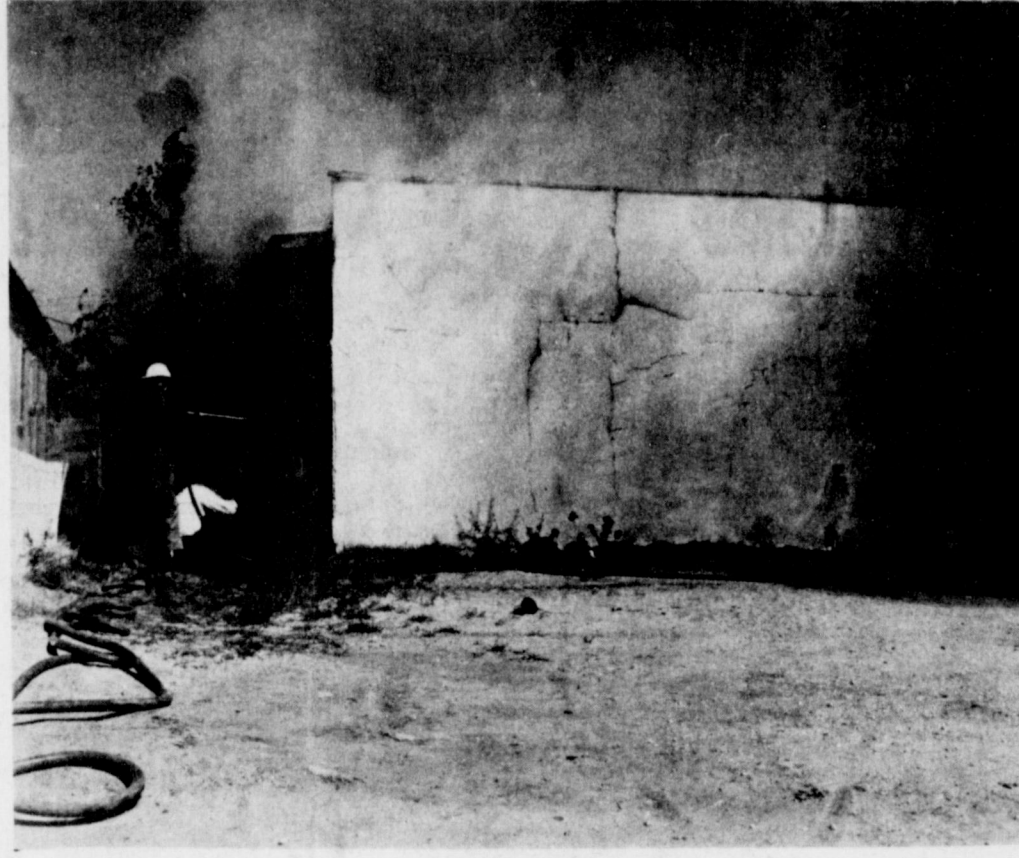
A. The hospital district will have nothing to do with the administration of the hospital as far as wages are concerned.

Q. What will happen to profits?

A. Any profits will be used to reduce the bond balance, with the eventuality of reducing taxes.

Q. Can the non-taxpayer voters decide the bond election for the hospital?

A. No. Although by a Supreme Court decision, non-tax paying voters may vote in a bond election, the taxpayer voters must approve the bond election or it will not carry.

## SPAG Representative Gives Future Plans

The Criminal Justice Advisory Committee of the South Plains Association of Governments recently held two special meetings at Lubbock. Glen Williams, the Bailey County representative, attended both meetings, and made this report.

The South Plains Association of Governments embraces fifteen counties and serves as a coordinating unit between local (City and County) governments, and State and Federal Governments. In the years to come it will probably be indispensable so far as state and federal cooperation with local governments is concerned. Its functions cover the whole spectrum of local government. Bailey County and the City of Muleshoe are both members. Alex Williams, City Councilman, is a member of the Board of Directors.

The Criminal Justice Advisory Committee was created to study the several facets of criminal justice and assist, if possible, with needed improvements. No authority will be taken from local governments and no attempt will be made to impose upon them. Several priorities may be listed under

Criminal Justice, such as, 1. Law Enforcement 2. Crime Prevention 3. Court Procedures 4. Adult and Juvenile Probation.

And under each of these, numerous sub-topics lend themselves to study. For example, under "law enforcement" one might consider (a) Police Training, (b) Communications, (c) Salaries, (d) Expert Professional Assistance, etc. It is likely that objective studies, with cooperation by all concerned, in any county or city, would reveal ways to make improvements that would contribute to a winding down of the crime rate. And do so with very little added expense on the local level.

Recent legislation requires that all police officers employed after September 1, 1970 must have at least one hundred and forty contact hours of structured and certified police training. And they will be given one year in which to obtain it. It is to this matter, police training, that the committee has thus far directed its efforts. If all officers must be formally trained, then formal training must be made available, and to

## Council Endorses Hospital Election

In a resolution at their regular meeting Tuesday morning, the city council of the City of Muleshoe unanimously voted to go on record as being 100 per cent behind the upcoming Hospital District and Bond Election.

The resolution reads in part "We are in favor of and will vote for the Hospital District and Bond issue on Saturday, May 16."

The motion for the resolution was made by Councilman Frank Ellis and seconded by Councilman Kenneth Heathington, with unanimous approval by the other council members.

The councilmen discussed the need of a new hospital facility in Muleshoe prior to the resolution.

Under lengthy discussion was the proposed park on West Avenue D. Rev. Walter Barthol, chairman of the park and recreation board gave an estimated cost for preliminary improvements in the park area and asked for approval to submit a plan to Housing and Urban Development for matching funds for the development.

The first improvement estimate, including excavating the lake, paving 4,000 feet of park

roads, seeding with grass, planting trees and other improvements at \$53,000.

Tentatively named to the Board of Equalization by the council were Curtis Walker, Bob Stovall, James Glaze, Glen Williams, Jim Cox, and Vance

## Voting Precincts For Primary Named

Clarence E. Mason said the Republican Primary for all four Bailey County Precincts will be held in the commissioners' courtroom in the Bailey County Courthouse on Saturday, May 2.

The precinct convention will be held Saturday night at Vic Benedict's office at 224 West Second Street.

Harvey Bass, Democratic Chairman of Bailey County, said Democratic voting boxes will be unchanged for the May 2 primary.

Although the four commissioner precincts in Bailey County have been redistricted, Bass said voters will go to the polls in the locations where they have voted in the past. For instance, if you voted in Precinct One at the Bailey County Courthouse, you will still vote in that box even though you may now live in Precinct Two, Three or Four by the newly drawn precinct lines.

Voting places will be as follows: Box One, Bailey County Courthouse in the District Courtroom; Box Two, the old city hall, now the Bailey County Volunteer Fire Department; Box Three, West Camp Baptist Church; Box Four at the Longview Church; Box Five at the Three Ways School; Box Six, at the Needmore Community Building and Box Six at Bula School.

Democratic conventions will be held at 7:30 p.m., Saturday at each of the six polling places. The county Democratic convention is slated for Saturday, May 9.

If you live in the new Precinct Two and vote at the Bailey County Courthouse, your vote will count for the Precinct Two County Commissioner and you now live in Precinct Four and vote at the Bailey County Courthouse, or the old city hall, your vote will count for the Precinct Four County Commissioner.

Bass concluded that by law, voting boxes cannot be changed until August or September of each year, thus the decision to vote in the same locations as the past.

## Land Bank Reduces Rate

Ernest Kerr, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe, received word today that The Federal Land Bank of Houston has reduced the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to eight one half per cent.

The variable rate loan plan, which was introduced by the Houston Bank last July, lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. In large measure, therefore, the rate in any specific year will reflect the changes in the price which the Bank must pay for the money it makes available for farm mortgage loans. all units of local governments. This training must be structured and certified. And for that reason the informal training that many officers have had will not count.

The Committee has formally recommended to the Board that, (1) The Association of Governments employ a Training Coordinator, and a Training Director, (2) that they obtain the necessary equipment for holding training schools, and (3) that such schools be held in the most convenient locations, and at such times, as may be needed and desired. The actual cash outlay will come from the State so the only local expense involved will be transportation.

salaries, and subsistence, of the trainees.

Another phase of police training is education at the college level. And funds are available for that also. In fact, under education when his college work is ended, if a person actually takes up law enforcement as a profession, then the student loan can be written off at the rate of twenty five per cent per year with no repayments at all. This is of course designed to encourage law enforcement as a career.

The Committee will next give attention to crime prevention, and will meet again May 7th. In that connection Williams expressed the opinion that the best cure for crime is to prevent it. And he said the best place to begin is in the home, with our children, and on a

personal basis with our fellow-men. Things will be better when we really want them to be---- when we ask for it through our elected representatives----by the way we live, and the way we teach our children.

If parents drink, gamble, frequent places of ill repute, refuse to pay honest debts, etc, then they can expect their children to do likewise. But a greater contribution by each of us in setting better examples, teaching better values, in providing more and better trained officers, better salaries, better communications, better crime detection equipment, and such like will pay handsome dividends. It will pay with reduced court costs, less jail and prison expenses, less property destruction, fewer hospital bills, and the relief of much human suffering.

## Latimer Tells MSC About Medicare

J.J. Latimer spoke briefly on Medicare and Medicaid, Thursday afternoon, to the Muleshoe Study Club. After his talk, he answered questions and explained government health insurance, administered by the Social Security Administration. Latimer is field representative, headquartered in Lubbock.

He ticked off the main provisions of the plan, as follows: 1. Both Medicare and Medicaid help pay medical and hospital bills of participating citizens, age 65 and over. 2. Medicare and Medicaid are part of the Social Security Act. 3. Medicare and Medicaid work together. 4. Medicare and Medicaid are not the same. 5. Medicare is an insurance program. 6. Medicaid is an assistance program. 7. Medicare is federally administered. 8. Medicaid is a federal-state partnership. 9. To apply for Medicare, go to your nearest Social Security office. 10. To apply for Medicaid, go to your Welfare office. 11. At age 65, or older, nearly all persons in this country are eligible for Medicare. 12. Some, 65 and older, are eligible for both Medicare and Medicaid.

Latimer pointed out that Medicare became effective, October 1966, throughout the 50 States and four territorial jurisdictions. Its purpose is to assure health care for persons 65 and older. It pays a portion of hospital costs and physicians' fees. Medicaid is operative in 44 of the 54 jurisdictions, including Texas. Its purpose is to insure those who cannot pay any portion of the premium costs of Medicare, and is implemented through federal and state cooperation.

"The way I see it, we must clean up the air and water of our land now. Although this problem took many years to create and will not be solved overnight, we dare not delay in seeking solutions."

"With this in mind, I have introduced legislation to redesignate the Department of the Interior as the Department of Resources, Environment and Population and to transfer to such department certain programs and functions currently being carried out by other Federal departments and agencies."

"This is no mere name

change. The aim of this reorganization would allow this agency to monitor all of the nation's natural resources and to develop and support programs for their use and conservation. Also, the department would be responsible for the continued and improved quality of the nation's physical environment."

"At present, there is not a House Committee on Environment; most environmental problems are under the scrutiny of several different committees. This is inefficient. I am sponsoring legislation to create such a single standing committee--so that we can have the coordinated leadership which the nation and the world need in focusing on the changing aspects of our environment."

"Two bills I recently introduced have now passed both houses of Congress. Each of these bills, I feel, will have a significant effect on pollution control efforts. The first was an amendment to the tax reform bill providing tax incentives to businesses constructing air and water pollution abatement equipment. This should help relieve these bus-

inesses of the competitive disadvantages which occur when they install this expensive equipment. The other is contained in the key section of the Water Pollution Control Act that requires those responsible for oil spills to pay the clean-up costs."

"The Republican Task Force on Earth Resources and Population, of which I am Chairman, has just started our 1970 hearings on pollution. They will result in sound legislative suggestions. But no government alone can bring this under control. It will require substantial sacrifice and cooperation between government, industry--and you, the concerned citizen. It is a sacrifice we cannot afford to neglect."

## Flying the Stars and Stripes? Get Acquainted With Etiquette

Flying from home flagpoles, in front of office buildings or uniforms and automobile windows, the flag of the United States becomes familiar to more Muleshoe area residents each day.

The banner, in full-sized silk or in miniature, shows up daily in places where it has not flown before.

"It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flagstaves in the open." The flag, however, may be flown at night "upon special occasions when it is desired to produce a special patriotic effect."

The flag, according to law, "should be displayed on all days when the weather permits," especially on such holidays as New Year's Day, Easter, Independence Day, Labor Day and Christmas.

"The flag should not be draped over the hood, top, sides or back of a vehicle, or of a railroad train or boat. When the flag is displayed on a motor

car, the staff shall be fixed firmly to the chassis or clamped to the radiator cap."

Subsections of the law outline American flag height and position in groupings of different flags.

In a procession with another flag or other flag, says Section 3, "(The flag) should be either on the marching right . . . or if there is a line of flags it should be in front of the center of that line."

\*\*\*

Only during church services

conducted at sea by Navy chaplains may another flag (in this instance, a church pennant) fly above or to the right of the American flag, according to the law.

Another subsection states, "The flag of the United States . . . should be at the center and at the highest point of this group when a number of flags . . . are grouped and displayed from staffs."

When flags are flown from adjacent staffs, "the flag of the United States should be hoisted first and lowered last."

When the U.S. flag is displayed with the banner of another nation, the flags "are to be flown from separate staffs from the same height."

\*\*\*

Other sections of the law state that "the flag should never be used for advertising purposes," and "should not be . . . impressed on . . . anything that is designed for temporary use and discard, or used as any

portion of a costume or athletic uniform."

Also, "the flag should never have placed upon it, nor any part of it, nor attached to it any mark, insignia, letter, word, figure, design, picture, or any drawing, of any nature."

\*\*\*

When an American flag becomes worn out or "in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display," the law says, it "should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning."

The "Flag of the United States of America" brochure, distributed by the National Service Foundation of the American Veterans of World War II, provides a condensation of the complete law.



The only changes in flag conduct rules, states the final section of the law, "may be prescribed by the Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, whenever he deems it appropriate or desirable . . ."



# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex.—Experts on moods of the voters think that fewer than half the 4,100,000 Texans who registered to vote will take part in the primaries, Saturday.

Precinct conventions, also slated for both parties Saturday, haven't produced a ripple of controversy.

Since there is no contest for the governorship in the Democratic primary for the first time since primaries were begun, less attention is being given to statewide races. The Texas Election Bureau is estimating that 1,800,000 Democrats will vote.

Main attention has been going to two contested races, Lloyd Bentsen Jr. of Houston is trying to oust Sen. Ralph Yarborough, State Rep. Bob Armstrong of Austin and Fred Wil-

liams of Houston are trying to defeat Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler.

The Yarborough-Bentsen race has proceeded at a fairly cool level.

Little attention has been paid to the effort of David Brown of Sherman to defeat Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin, or to the campaign by Connie Lawson of Taylor against Railroad Commission Chairman Ben Ramsey.

Lawyers are taking an active part in the two high court races, Hawthorne Phillips of Austin, Judge Matt Davis of Texarkana and Judge James G. Denton of Lubbock are seeking an open seat on the Texas Supreme Court. Judge Truman Roberts of Hamilton and Earl Smith of San Angelo are candidates for an open place on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Other statewide offices are uncontested.

Saturday's Republican primary is expected to draw about 150,000 voters. U.S. Representative George Bush of Houston is favored to win the U.S. Senate nomination over Robert Morris of Plano. It is Bush's second try for the Senate. Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls, although he was ill and unable to campaign for nearly two weeks, is favored over Roger Martin of Gainesville in the gubernatorial race. It's Eggers' second race for governor.

**TUITION RAISE PROPOSED**  
Coordinating Board of Texas College and University System is urging legislation to boost tuition fees in senior institutions from \$50 to \$125 a semester.

Spokesmen said students should pay at least 25 per cent of the cost of education, and that is what the tuition fee hike would produce.

Board at the same time postponed action on a staff recommendation that it place new enrollment ceilings for the University of Texas at Austin (35,000) and for Texas A. & I. University at Kingsville (7,500).

Private and independent college spokesmen, meanwhile, called on the board for aid, including a "tuition equalization program" to place them in a better competitive position with state-supported schools.

Tuition recommendation calls for \$500 a semester fee for out-of-state students. Junior-college local boards would set their own tuitions but not at more than 75 per cent of

senior college fees for in-district students or 90 per cent for out-of-district enrollees.

**GRANTS APPROVED**  
Gov. Preston Smith approved a \$124,996 federal grant to the Kleberg County Community Action Committee in Kingsville. Grant involves \$4,169 in unexpended funds, making a total of \$129,165 for a 12-month program beginning May 1. Bulk of the funds will go to Neighborhood Service Centers.

Smith earlier approved a \$10,090 state regional planning assistance grant to the Golden Crescent Council of Governments. Council serves Lavaca, Jackson, DeWitt, Goliad, Victoria and Calhoun Counties. It is based in Victoria and includes eight cities and seven special purpose governments.

Texas Criminal Justice Council, meanwhile, announced it has \$4.6 million available in action grant money to strengthen law enforcement.

Money will be used by the state and allocated to units of general local government to fight crime and improve police work.

**CONSERVATION GROUP MEETS**

New Texas Conservation Foundation was charged by Governor Smith to work toward providing the state with a top system of parks, scenic points, refuges, scientific and recreational areas.

This Foundation was authorized by the Legislature last year to facilitate state acquisition of lands by gift or purchase and to accept money or scientific purposes.

Smith urged the group at its initial meeting here to function as the "strong right arm" of governmental departments and particularly the Parks and Wildlife Commission.

Foundation named Glenn Biggs, formerly of Abilene, chairman, Reagan B. Cates of Victoria vice-chairman and Ralph D. Churchill of Dallas to head a committee mapping definite projects for the group to undertake.

**WHEN DISASTER STRIKES**

Texas National Guard units drew high praise for aid in storm-hit communities of the South Plains.

Guardsmen drew special commendations for duties in Plainview, Whiteface and Whitarral. About 300 were assigned to security, search, rescue work and traffic control.

Governor Smith notified all state agencies to stand by, and prompt requests for a federal disaster act were made.

State Department of Public Welfare set up an emergency food and medical program for tornado-stricken Plainview.

**EXPLOSIVES**

Texas is one of 32 states where anyone can freely buy

dynamite from anyone willing to sell it to him, but state and national officials are trying to put a stop to such easy access to the high explosive.

There is a state law to stop sales or possession of bombs or dynamite, but the list of exemptions to the law is so broad that almost anyone can fit as a legal dynamite buyer. Attorney General's office is working on a law to curtail the sale of explosives. Proposal will be submitted to the next session of the Legislature.

A bill is in Congress, supported by the Nixon Administration, that also would pose a federal ban on possession.

Other appointments include: State Judicial Qualifications Commission: F. Howard Walsh of Fort Worth and Vernon Butler of Carthage.

State Board of Examiners in the Basic Sciences: Dr. Paul C. Witt (Ph.D.) of Abilene.

**SHORT SNORTS**

Dr. John Kinross-Wright, commissioner of mental health and mental retardation, has resigned his position.

University of Texas at Austin President Norman Hackerman has resigned his position, and will become president of Rice University on September 1.

Governor Smith's Criminal Justice Council has been notified that its \$4,617,000 application for 50 per cent law enforcement matching funds has been approved by the U.S. Department of Justice.

Out-of-state tourism dropped one per cent in 1969 from the 1968 high of 22.5 million, but spending by the tourist increased from \$1.5 billion to \$1.6 billion, reports Texas Tourist Development Agency, but adds that most states experience a much more substantial decline in visitors the year after a world's fair such as HemisFair.

Governor Smith approved establishment of a residential manpower center in El Paso. Republicans plan a \$500 a plate dinner May 22 at the Shamrock Hilton Hotel in Houston with Vice-president Spiro Agnew as the speaker.

Governor is polling district judges for their views on penalties for marijuana violations.

Public hearing will be held on May 4 by the Texas Occupational Safety Board on safety standards for explosive-actuated tools, mechanical power transmission apparatus and conveyors, cableways and related equipment.

Attorney General's office, Texas Association of Defense Counsel, Texas Municipal League, Texas Trial Lawyers Association of Defense Counsel, Texas Municipal League, Texas Trial Lawyers Association and UT Austin Law School will sponsor a conference on the new Texas Tort Claims Act April 30-May 1 on the University of Texas/Austin campus.

**PARKS**

Parks and Wildlife Commission is being called upon to renovate Abilene and Possum Kingdom State Parks and five historic West Texas Forts. Last Legislature appropriated specific money for each of the projects, and the P & W staff has drawn up proposals which are to be approved by Commission members.

Restoration Project includes Fort Richardson at Jacksboro; Fort Griffin, 15 miles north of Albany; Fort McKavett, 23 miles west of Menard; Fort Lancaster, 14 miles east of Sheffield, and Fort Leaton at Presidio.

**EDUCATION AIDES**

State funds to pay teacher aides, non-professional helpers trained to take over the more routine tasks of classroom and laboratory, will be available for the first time during the 1970-71 school year.

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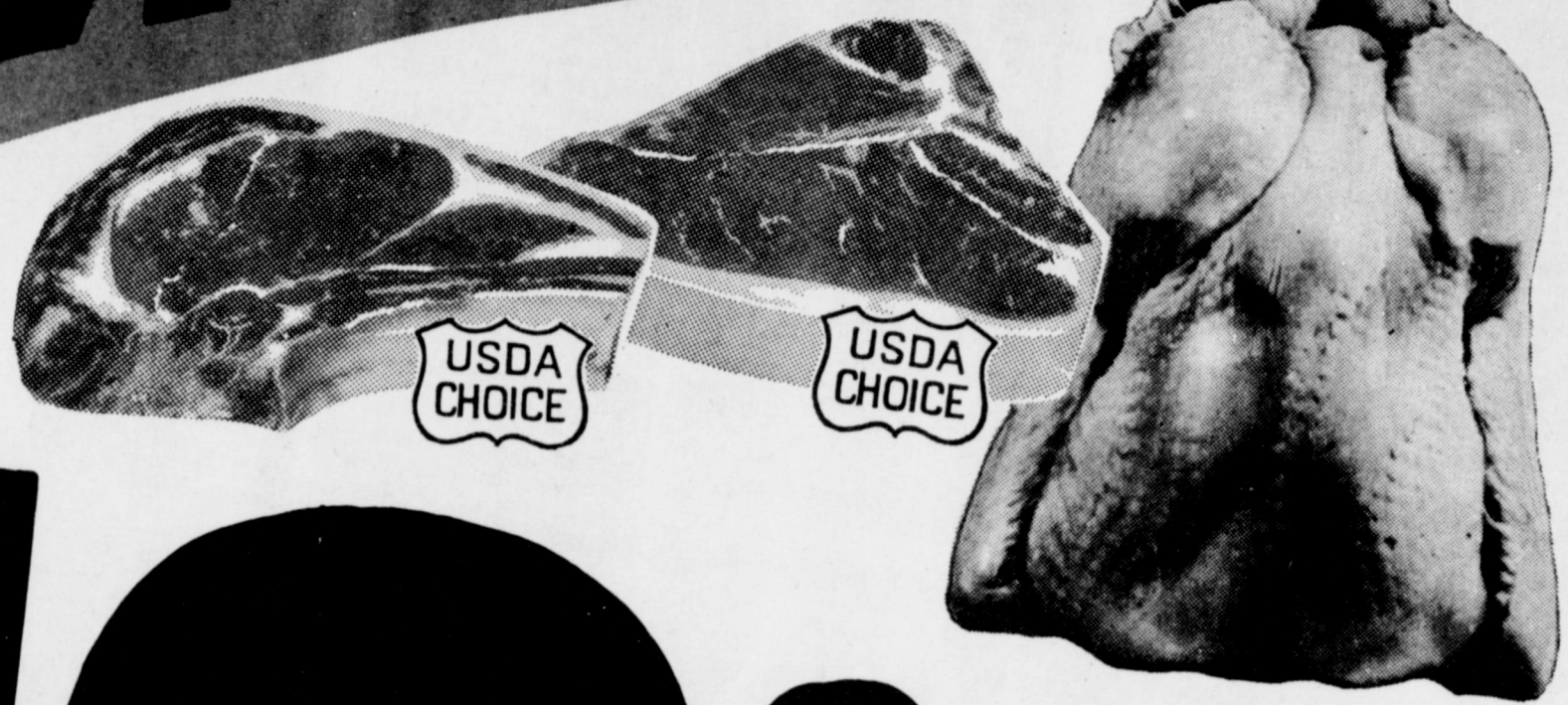
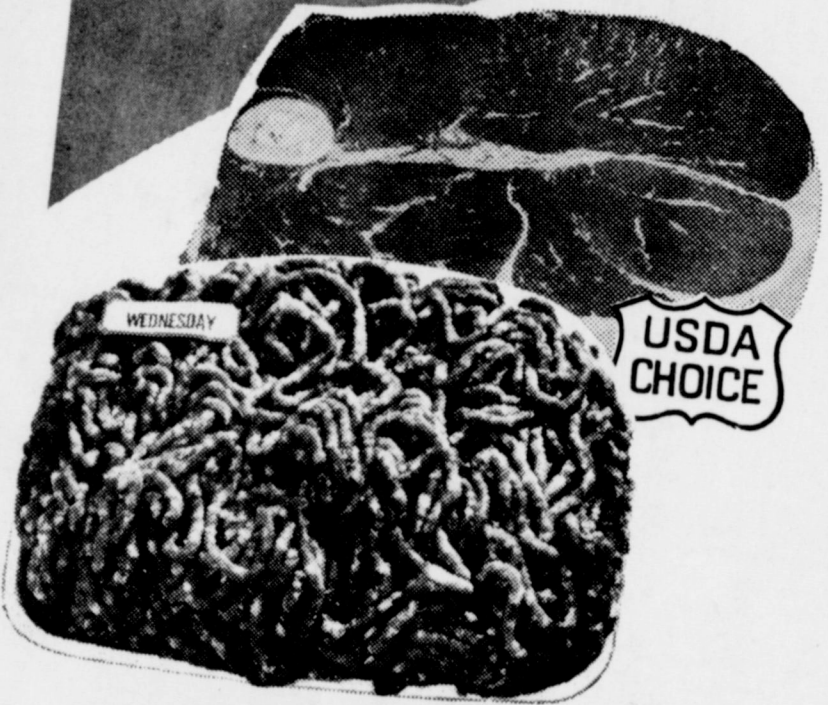








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
