Funeral Services Here Monday For James C. Mitchell

Early Day Resident of Crockett Co. Died In El Paso

Funeral services were held at the Ozona Methodist Church for James C. Mitchell, 65, a former resident here and member of a ily, who died Friday in an El Paso hospital following heart surgery.

Mr. Mitchell, a retired ranchman with extensive holdings in Terrell and Pecos counties, had served as a county commissioners in Terrell county while active in the ranching business in that area. Organization Meeting He and Mrs. Mitchell moved to El Paso following his retirement from active management of ranch operations.

Services were conducted by the Rev. Morris Bratton, pastor, with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery under direction of Cody Funeral Home. Mr. Mitchell's parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. James C. Mitchell, pioneer Crockett residents, are buried in the cemetery. Mr Mitchell, Sr., was a resident here at the time of the county's organization in 1891 and was active in the organization effort.

Pallbearers were Stephen Perner of Ozona, Conley Brooks and Clayton Puckett of Ft. Stockman, Malone Mitchell, Sid Harkey and

C. C. Mitchell, all of Sanderson. Mr. Mitchell had undergone surgery to correct a heart condition and had apparently come through the operation in good condition. Death came suddenly about midnight, however, following the operation the day before.

He was a World War I veteran, member of the American Legion and of the Methodist church.

Tri-County Council P. T. A. Meeting Here


