AUSTIN — The names of 1524 hunters for public hunts on Game & Fish Managemena areas, have been drawn for this year, according to the assistant director of wildlife management.

There were 12,857 applicants for these hunts. In the Angelina area there were 1566 applicants for 550 permits. On the Black Gap area there were 3437 applicants and 403 permits. The Engeling area drew 2956 applications and 241 permits. On the Kerr area 4394 applied and 250 got permits. There were 504 applicants for the Sierro Diablo area and 80 got permits. One of the lucky 80 Sierra Diablo applicants was A. S. Lock of O-

It is expected the 1524 permit holders will kill 633 deer.
