From State Capitol**

Austin, Texas — Foreshadowing many hours of debate in the next Legislative session is the steady build-up of proposals and counter-proposals for improving public schools.

Texas State Teachers Association has voted to push a 19-point legislative program. TSTA will go along on most of the Hale-Aikin Study Committee's recommendations, though its own program omits a few H-A proposals and is lukewarm on others.

Most notable difference is that TSTA calls for larger teacher salary raises. Present minimum starting salary is \$3,204. Hale-Aikin Committee recommends hiking this to \$3,800. TSTA is asking for \$4,000 for bachelor's degree holders, \$4,200 for those with a master's degree.

TSTA's salary increases would cost some \$10,000,000 to \$15,000,000

year more than the Hale-Aikin plan. Overall, enactment of the Hale-Aikin school improvement plan would cost the state an estimated \$110,000,000 a year more than is now being spent.

Other planks in the teachers' legislative platform are specific changes to expand or enrich school programs — driver education, special programs for gifted children, more funds for small schools, etc. TSTA approved the Hale-Aikin proposal for lengthening the school year, but indicated it would not go all-out for it.

Because they call for new spending at a time when the state already is in the red, no one expects smooth sailing for the school proposals. Governor Daniel warned teachers that he could not foresee available money for all the program. Many legislators are haunted on the one hand by the need to dig up new money just to keep the state in business and on the other by campaign promises not to vote for certain kinds of new taxes. They're inclined to view new spending plans like smallpox germs.

On the other hand, advocates of school improvement constitute a large and very active group. And all such efforts gained tremendous new leverage when Sputnik I whizzed into orbit.

For Business Seeking — Texas Industrial Commission is asking the Legislature for a \$100,000-a-year appropriation to be used in attracting new businesses to Texas.

Commission voted not to go in to tourist promotion unless asked to by lawmakers.

Proposed budget allocates \$16,500 annually for an executive director's salary and \$75,000 a year for advertising in national publications. All this activity will be brand new to Texas, made possible Nov. 4 when voters removed an 82-year-old constitutional ban against spending state money for advertising.

Commission also announced that it is opposed to any plan of offering temporary local tax exemption as a sort of "prize" to new industries.

Back to Work — For the first time in 1958, Texas non-farm employment broke the three-million mark in October.

Christmas rush and other gains

may bring the number of workers to a new record high in December, according to the Texas Employment Commission.

and Muggins Good. Coach Dozier hopes to install the tandem post style offense which varies from the double post and single post style attacks used by the Lions in recent years by establishing the two post men more or less in a line in front of the goal extending toward the center line instead of a line extending from one side line toward the other. The formation has been widely used in the area and Ozona fans will recognize it as the style of offense used by Bill Humphries at Menard year before last as well as by Crane, Wall, and others. Under the new system, Jerry Jacobs will probably be used as high post since his jump shot and maneuverability will be of great advantage above the free throw line. The battle for the rebounding post under the goal seems wide open.

David Sikes, who played guard last year but whose height and inside shooting skill fit him for play at forward this year, will probably be at one wing with Bobby Sutton taking over the middle guard post. The other wing will likely go to either Jim Williams, Don Powers, or Diz Reeves, providing Williams does not get the low post position.

A strong group of freshmen and a few promising sophomores round out the squad.

Jim Freeman, one of the last year's best freshman prospects, who was forced out of competition by a stomach disorder early in the season has returned to work.

A more detailed review of freshman and B team prospects will come later since early season work must concentrate to a large extent on getting the varsity ready.

Coach Fred Hickman will carry the B team to Rock Springs for a B team tourney Friday and Saturday for its first competition.

Alien Registration Required In January

Harlon B. Carter, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, stated that aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future.

All aliens, with exception, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month. Only the following classes of a-

liens are excused from this requirement: (1) Accredited Diplomats; (2) Persons accredited to certain international organizations; and (3) Those admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any Post Office or Immigration Office during the month of January. Mr. Carter said that the law provides

severe penalties for failure to comply with the requirement.

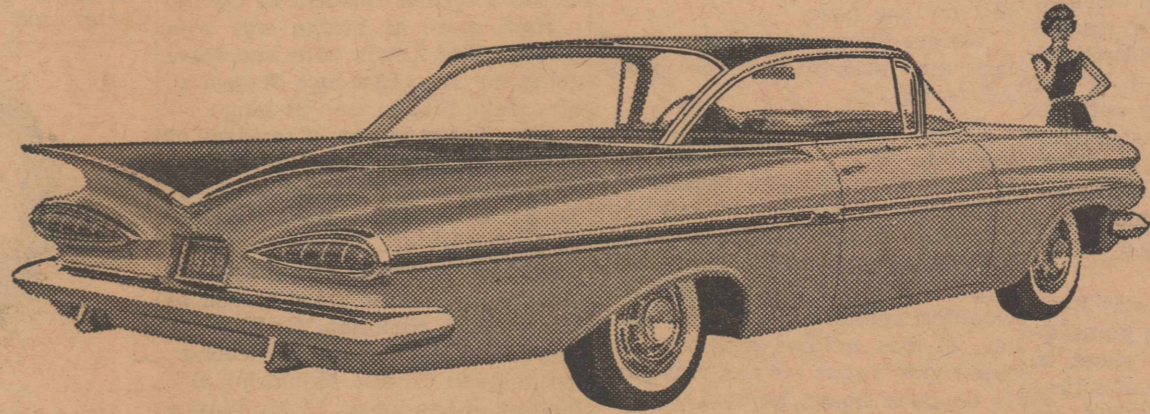

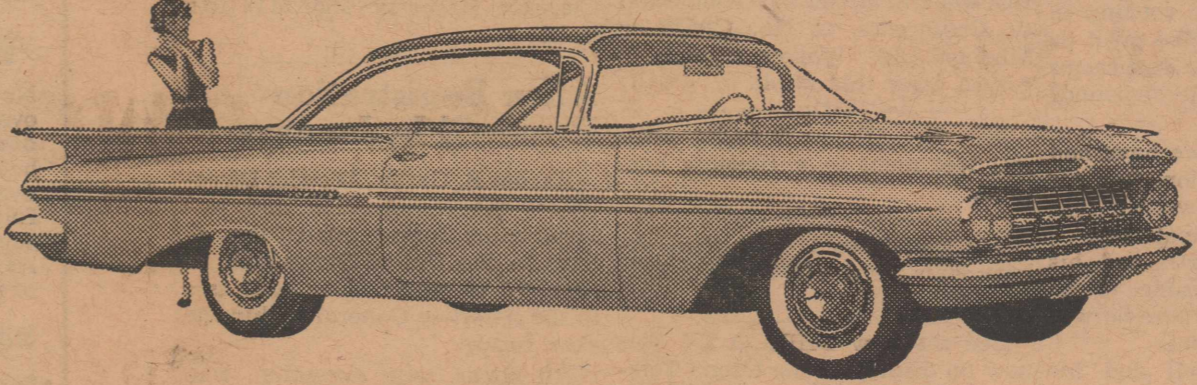
