Saline Conversion Experimental Plant to **Be In Southwest**

At the invitation of Congressman J. T. Rutherford, County Judge Houston Smith planned this week to complete an application form to seek location in this county of a two million dollar government installation.

The government is seeking site in the Southwest for one of five saline or brackish water experimental conversion plants to be built at a cost of approximately 2 million dollars each. Americans are learning more about lamb, thanks to a program of advertising and promotion which the sheepmen of the United States are sponsoring with their own funds.

Many of the misconceptions about lamb are being disproved as lamb producers seek to build up he market for their products through their own promotional orcanization, the American Sheep Producers Council.

G. N. Winder of Denver, Coloraco, President of the Council, said much has been done to combat the false impressions many consumers have about lamb. He cited the mistaken impression that many veterans received overseas. "What they were eating was not lamb as it is produced in this country, but some kind of meat prepared under the

If the shipping department of a factory had not made an error, the world would never have known of Musa-shiya the Shirtmaker and the most astounding advertising campaign in history would never have been launched.


Following World War I an English textile factory was getting back on a peacetime basis. The agent explained the costs of various advertisements and finally Musa-shiya agreed to try the plan and what was destined to be the most astounding and far reaching campaign in the history of advertising was launched.

Two column by five inch ads then started appearing regularly in the Saturday Honolulu Star-Bulletin. The ads were written just the way Musa-. shiya talked - in colorful pidgen English which is used throughout the Orient. Here is an example of one of Musa-shiya's ads:

"Well here come storek again - but Musa-shiya, the shirtmaker, is able prepare. Wonderful accumulation of baby things in dry goods selling corner of Musa shop. Everything for the baby - especially diaper. Exclusive of storek, which find most easily, many persons not finding little shop of Musa-shiya the shirtmaker in King Street, Makai side, between fish market and river."

Tourists started sending copies of Musa-shiya's ads to their friends in many countries. Soon Musa-shiya was receiving orders from all over the world as well as doing a thriving business in Hawaii.

And that is the story of how a well planned, small advertising campaign made an unknown Japanese shirtmaker not only wealthy but world famous.

Your local newspaper doesn't promise to duplicate this story for its advertisers, but it does take your sales message into the homes of your customers where full and careful consideration is given your suggestions. Who knows, perhaps you too can be a Musa-shiya.







It labeled "prohibitive" the probable cost of paying all medical costs for all persons on welfare.

Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro is chairman of the committee. Cities, Employes Square Off -Renamed and reorganized, the Texas Municipal League is mounting a campaign for laws to ease the cities' growing pains.

Firemen have been busy circulcting petitions, declaring the League plan "would set police and fire departments back 50 years."
