Austin, Texas — Atty. Gen. Will Wilson's drive against overcharging of small borrowers is reaching the "massive resistance" levels.

Goal is to eliminate from Texas a sort of modern-day "debtors prison." Wilson described the "tragedy" in which low-income people borrow a little, then pay back, pay back and pay back, often several times what they borrowed. Yet they remain in debt, unable to get ahead of the mounting charges.

In one day Wilson's office filed 217 injunction suits against small loan companies over the state. This is in addition to 46 other suits filed in recent months.

Involved in the 217 suits, said Wilson, are some \$10,000,000 in loans to about 200,000 borrowers. Interest charges range from 100 to 300 per cent annually. (State constitutional maximum is 10 per cent).

It's the largest drive of this sort ever conducted in Texas, says Wilson, and the only one in recent history in the nation.

But apparently there's room for it to get even bigger. "We suspect 1,000 companies", said the attorney general.

Texas anti-Shylock operation got under way when the Board of Insurance slashed credit insurance rates in half. Before that, said Wilson, the loan companies could make extra profits legally by requiring borrowers to buy high-cost credit insurance.

After this, said Wilson, the loan companies switched to "brokerage plans" which reportedly resulted in the 100 to 300 per cent annual interest. Wilson and his assistants will try to prove in court that these operations are illegal.

If the over-all campaign is successful, said Wilson, by the end of 1959 the only loan companies operating will be using the "certificate plan," which results in interest of about 20 per cent. Wilson regards the "certificate plan" as unconstitutional but says it might be an acceptable interim arrangement until the Legislature overhauls the small loan laws.

**Medical Care Urged** — State Committee on Aging recommends a law that would allow people on the state welfare rolls to receive up to \$6 a month medical aid.

Passage of Constitutional Amendment 8 last month authorized making such payments for the aged, blind, dependent children and totally and permanently disabled.

Committee on Aging estimates this minimum \$6-a-month program would cost up to \$9,000,000 a year. It labeled "prohibitive" the probable cost of paying all medical costs for all persons on welfare.

Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro is chairman of the committee.

**Cities, Employees Square Off** — Renamed and reorganized, the Texas Municipal League is mounting a campaign for laws to ease the cities' growing pains.

Chiefly, say the cities, they need more money to finance the spiraling costs of city services. League-proposed laws would close the loopholes by which many escape the local property tax on autos and give cities permission to levy other broad-based taxes, such as sales or income.

Another League hope: to return control of wages and hours of city employes to the cities. This is one that is already stirring up some sand. State firemen's and policemen's associations, traditionally more potent forces in the Legislature than city officials, have been successful in getting wage and hour laws for city employes set by state laws.

Firemen have been busy circulating petitions, declaring the League plan "would set police and fire departments back 50 years."

League has been busy too. It held 16 regional meetings in December, electing officers and discussing aims.

**John's Barleycorn's Earnings** — A quarter of a century of legalized liquor has brought in more than a third of a billion dollars in state tax revenue.

Coke Etevenson Jr. of the Liquor Control Board said that since the repeal of national prohibition in 1933 Texas has collected \$360,189,896 in alcoholic taxes and license fees. This, despite the fact that, areawise, the vast majority of Texas is dry. But population is concentrated in the wet areas.

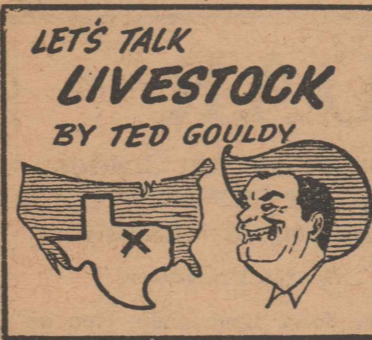

### Cattle Demand Continues Extremely High in Texas

Fort Worth, Dec. 8 — Offerings of cattle around the nation's major livestock markets Monday was about ten percent higher than a week ago and at Fort Worth, the increase was nearer thirty percent. Both slaughter interests and the buyers of stockers and feeders moved in early and cleaned up the supplies at Fort Worth before the noon hour.

Veterans in the trade still find reason to wonder at the continued demand for stocker and feeder cattle this late in the season. The an-

swer, of course lies in the abundant feed supplies both in the pastures and in the barns.

Cattle and calf prices Monday reflected the strength of the market as fed steers and yearlings of the good or choice variety sold from \$25 to \$28.50. Commercially fattened cattle reached \$27 to \$28 without difficulty, and heavy-weight baby beef calves again soared to \$30.

Some weeks ago in the column we reported the trade here speculating on the probability of \$30 fat calves this Winter. The \$30 and better level was reached at least a month prior to those "educated guesses" of last month.

Good and choice stocker steer calves cashed at \$29 to \$34 and some bull calves reached \$32.50. Stocker heifer calves ranged from \$33 downward. Stocker steer yearlings ranged from \$24 to \$31, some 573-pound yearlings at \$31, and some feeder yearlings scaling 660 pounds cashed at \$28.75. A few stocker cows drew \$18 to \$21.

Good and choice slaughter calves sold from \$25 to \$30, the top figure usually for heavyweights of the baby beef type. Plain and medium slaughter calves cleared at \$21 to \$24.50 and lower grade killers ranged from \$17 to \$21.

### Sheep and Goats Sell Well, Heavy Lambs Included

Slaughter classes of sheep and lambs were very strong, quality of much of the offering considered.

Good and choice slaughter lambs cashed at \$20 to \$21, the higher figure for 94-pound lambs with mostly No. 1 pelts, but a sprinkling of No. 2 skins were included. Some woolled lambs sold at \$20, including some around 120-pound wether lambs, and some 110-pound buck lambs scored \$20. A package of very heavy, over 150-pound lambs cashed at \$17. Feeders sold mostly at \$18 to \$19, some bucks, long-tails, etc., down to \$15 to \$16.

A few slaughter ewes drew \$7 to \$8 and a few goats sold at \$8 to \$8.50. Slaughter aged bucks sold from \$7 to \$7.50.

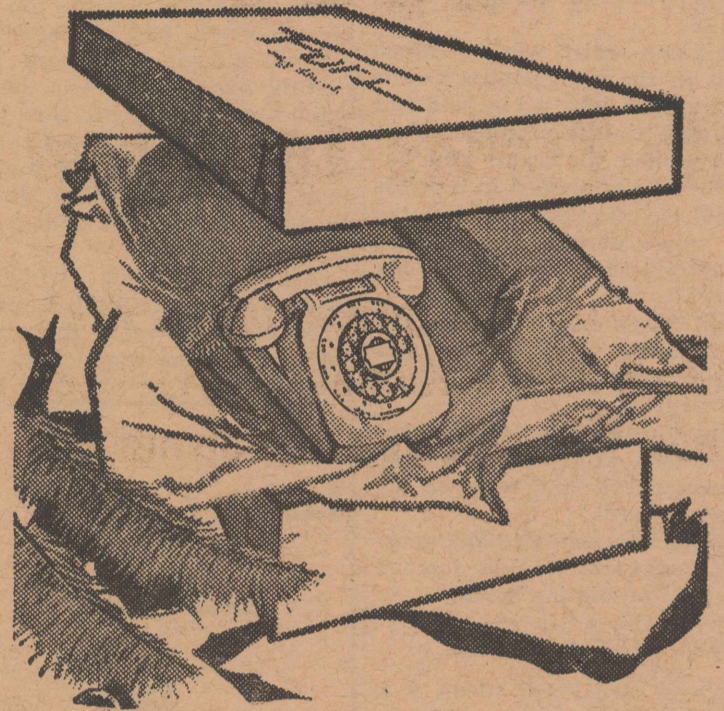

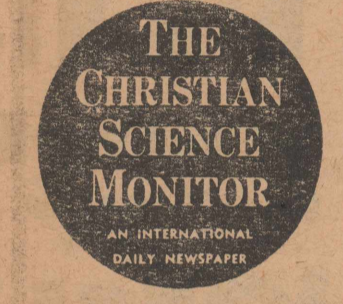

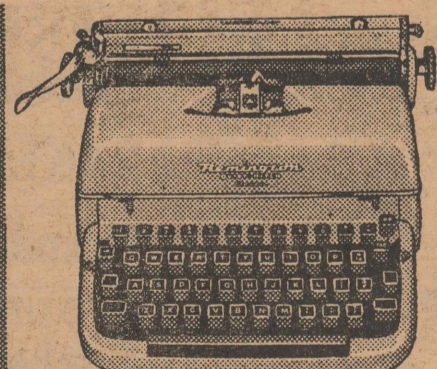
