Kerrville Attorney To Seek Post Vacated **By Joe Burkett**


James E. "Jim" Nugent, prominent Kerrville attorney, announced today his candidacy for State Representative from the 78th Representative District.

Nikita Khrushchev's grandstand play before the Supreme Soviet the announcement that the USSR as the most formidable military force in the world would cut its armed forces one third and add "incredible" new weapons to its arsenal — achieved the necessary headlines to rock the free world But the purpose or purposes of this tour de force and evaluation of the Kremlin master's boast of strength are still to emerge. That this was an elaborate bit of window dressing to impress his fellow conferees at the forthcoming summit is a reasonable surmise. That Khrushchev expects this massive gesture to be accepted as an honest and forthright move to end the cold war or to lure the western powers into disarament on his own terms is less likely. What we may be sure of is that there will be no unemployment among the 1,200,000 Russian soldiers, sailors, marines and flyers if, as and when they leave the services. The Eagles has a hot night shooting as they hit better than 50% of their shots greatly aided by a tremendous weight advantage under the boards.






